#### Cincinnati Background

Cincinnati is the home of Senator Robert Taft Jr., and the city has been the family's political base since the days of President William Howard Taft. Taft has a tough re-election fight against Democrat Howard Metzenbaum. Assessment of the race from The Post is attached.

Of the Nation's 25 largest ciites, Cincinnati is one of the most consistently Republican. The city has fewer blacks and fewer ethnics than most industrial centers. Many of the migrants from Kentucky and Tennessee came from the Republican strongholds in Appalachia.

The 1st district of Ohio is the eastern and more prosperous half of the city and suburban Hamilton County. The 1st has been represented by several men who went on to state or national prominence. Former Democratic Governor John Gilligan, Senator Taft and newspaper publisher Bill Keating have represented the 1st. Keating retired from the seat to become president of the Cincinnati Enquirer. \*Keating will be involved in your press conference.

The incumbent is Willis Gradison, Jr., who won a full term in 1974 after losing out in a special. Gradison has a Democratic opponent, but he is expected to win.

The 2nd district is the western half of the city with some of the older and poorer sections of Cincinnati. This district also includes the industrial area with industries like Proctor and Gamble, General Electric and machine tool makers. Like the 1st, this district is predominantly Republican. The incumbent is GOP Representative Donald Clancy, who was first elected in 1960. Clancy's opponent is Thomas A. Luken, and this race could be close. Luken won the special election against Gradison early in 1974, and then was defeated by him in the general. Now Luken is running in the other Cincinnati district against Clancy.

# Taft Running Hard To Meet Challenge From Metzenbaum

The Republican candidate's problems in getting his campaign back on track that day with a faulty helicopter compass produced some bright newspaper accounts—and a happy reaction from one Taft aide:

### Why the Salute?

It is especially fitting to remember older Americans in this, our nation's Bicentennial year, since they are our living heritage. But even as Americans have focused their attention during the Bicentennial on our collective past, an interest in senior citizens, who represent those years in a more personal way, has been overshadowed by society's preoccupation with youth.

The ranks of senior citizens are increasing at a rate of 350,000 each year, much higher than the national overall population growth. At the dawn of the 20th century, persons over age 65 made up four percent of the population. Now, they number 20 million, or nearly 10 percent of our nation.

In the words of a leading sociologist, citizens over 65 are regarded as "yesterday people — unproductive, naive and ultraconservative. In our society, they are resented."

"No Greater Love" is determined that this shall not be, and recommends the Thanksgiving period as a special time to give thanks to these citizens who have contributed to the building of our nation, to pay them personal tribute as a tangible evidence of our caring and appreciation.

No Greater Love believes Thanksgiving, the traditional

day of togetherness, is a most appropriate time to renew our national commitment to these builders of America, not only on this day alone, but for the entire year. Let us join together in giving thanks — to them.

President Gerald Ford's Thanksgiving Proclamation, in a mention requested by No Greater Love through National Advisory Council members Senator Hugh Scott and Congressman Thomas O'Neill, echoed the same thought:

"I call upon all Americans on this day to gather with family and friends in homes and places of worship and join in offering gratitude for this Nation's countless blessings. I ask that we share with our senior citizens and with those less fortunate than ourselves this special day that brings us all closer together."

# **History of the Salute**



#### New Jersey Background

Monmouth County is the site of some of the Nation's first beach resorts. Today the shore continues to attract thousands to the summer homes in the area, but more and more people are living there year-round and commuting to North Jersey and even Manhattan. The flatlands behind the beaches have been the area of greatest growth recently.

Most of Monmouth County is in New Jersey's 3rd district, which traditionally has been Republican. However, since 1964, the district has been represented by Democrat James Howard. He has generally down well despite his liberal record. His GOP opponent is Ralph Siciliano, a 34-year-old electrical engineer from Red Bank. Siciliano is described as a good candidate, but a long-shot to win. He has a B.S. from Manhattan College and a master's from New Jersey Institute of Technology. He is married and has two children.

Democratic Senator Harrison Williams is seeking his fourth term. His GOP opponent is David Norcross, a 40-year-old Trenton lawyer. Norcross is a graduate of the University of Delaware. He attended law school at the University of Pennsylvania. He is married and has two children. An attractive candidate, he is not given a very good chance of winning.

The PFC contact in New Jersey, Tony Chiatello advises against any comment about casino gambling. The issue is very hot, and it is on the ballot in the state. Also, a state income tax recently went into effect, and the voters are very sensitive about taxes in general and big government. He also says it is very important to emphasize the President's consistency and dependability.

#### Michigan Background

A poll this morning (10/25) shows Marvin Esch within one percentage point of Riegle (43 to 42), and this poll was taken <u>before</u> the revelations about Riegle's extracurrila activities.

A Sunday newspaper poll showed the President's lead over Carter had been cut to about four percentage points.

The Rochester rally is designed to pull people from Oakland and Macomb Counties, the second and third largest counties in the state.

On that program will be Dan Murphy, Oakland County Executive (who has a tough race); David Serotkin, GOP candidate in the 12th; Bill Broomfield, incumbent Republican in the 19th, and Marvin Esch.

Serotkin is running a very close race against Democrat Jim O'Hara, who was first elected in 1958. Serotkin, a lawyer from Mt. Clements, ran a strong race against O'Hara in 1972. Macomb has almost no blacks. It is an area of neat suburbs and new shopping centers. This has been a fastgrowing area, and many of the residents are Polish and Italian immigrants from Detroit's East Side.

Bill Broomfield represents about half of Oakland County. The largest city in the 19th is Pontiac with a population of 85,000. The real political center of the 19th is described as the suburbs of Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills. Broomfield has an opponent (a woman), but despite the Post revelations Sunday on money from Korea, he isn't expected to have any re-election problems.

"Jerry"---the puppy of Liberty's that was given to the Rochester Leader Dog School for the Blind will be at the Rochester rally.
