## SCHEDULE OF WHITE HOUSE TOURS FOR 1976

To better accommodate visitors to the White House during our Bicentennial, the following provides information on tour procedures and scheduled events for 1976.

### 1. Tuesday, March 16, 1976 - Saturday, October 23, 1976

A Visitors Waiting Area will be established on the Ellipse in cooperation with the National Park Service. During this period, visitors should proceed to the Ellipse south of the White House -- not to the East Gate.

- (a) Visiting hours will be Tuesday through Friday 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. (most days, schedule permitting) and on Saturday 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The White House will be closed on Sunday and Monday.
- (b) Ticket booths will be open at 8:00 a.m. each day, Tuesday through Saturday. Tickets may be obtained from 8:00 a.m. to 12 noon, Tuesday through Friday, and on Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Each member of a family or a group must obtain a ticket for the tour. Tickets are available the day of the tour only.
- (c) Each visitor after being issued a ticket (specifying the time of the tour) may either leave the park to visit other attractions or choose to view the entertainment program (9:30 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. most days) on the Ellipse. Bleachers will be available. Visitors will be escorted from the Ellipse to the White House at the appointed time.

### 2. Before March 16 and after October 23, 1976

The White House will be open from 10 a.m. to 12 noon Tuesday through Saturday and closed on Sunday and Monday. Visitors should come to the East Gate on East Executive Avenue.

### 3. Garden Tours

As a special program for the Bicentennial, Mrs. Ford has asked that the gardens and grounds be open to the public on the following days:

Reservations are not required, admission is free. The tour includes the grounds and the State Floor of the White House. Each visitor receives a brochure as a guide to the grounds.

Special Note: On Saturdays the hours will be 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. and the Visitors Waiting Area will be used. On Sundays the hours will be 2:00 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. and the Visitors Waiting Area will not be used. Visitors should come directly to the East Gate on East Executive Avenue.

### 4. Easter Egg Roll

Children 8 years and younger, accompanied by an adult, are invited to participate on Monday, April 19, 1976 from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. There will be entertainment and an egg rolling contest. Reservations are not required, admission is free. Participants should come to the Southeast Gate which is located at the intersection of East Executive Avenue and Alexander Hamilton Place, N.W.

### 5. Holidays

The White House will be open the following Monday holidays:

September 6 Labor Day
October 11 Columbus Day

Visiting hours will be 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Ticket booths on the Ellipse will be open 8:00 a.m. to 12 noon.

A painting which has hung previously in the Yellow Oval Room has been placed above the secretary on the south wall of the Green Room. It is entitled "The Mosquito Net" and the artist is John Singer Sargent (the same artist who painted the portrait of Theodore Roosevelt in the East Room). It dates from about 1908 and was in the personal collection of the artist and sold shortly after his death in 1925.

The subject is Marion Alice (Polly) Barnard, a close friend of Sargent and the subject of many of his watercolors.

The painting was a gift to the White House in 1964 from Mr. Whitney Warren, San Francisco, California. Previous to its donation to the White House, it was widely exhibited in this country and in Europe.

In the West Wing Reception Room has been hung the plainting "Cannonading on the Potomac" by Wordworth Thompson which replaced "Merced River, Yosemite Valley" which was returned to the Metropolitan Museum of Art. It was painted in 1861 and depicts a Vivil War battle near Edward's Ferry and Ball's Bluff, Virginia, October, 1861. The painting was a gift to the White House in 1962 from Mr. and Mrs. Edward Warburg, New York, New York.

A very beautiful ormolu and crystal chandelier has been hung in the Green Room today. This chandelier is French and was made circa 1810. The Committee for the Preservation of the White House approved this chandelier at its last meeting as beling appropriate to the period of the furnishings of the Green Room which all date between 1800 and 1820. This chandelier is typical of what was used in American rooms of the Federal period. Chandeliers were not made in America at that time and were imported from England and France.

The 18th century English chandelier which had previously hung in the Green Room has been moved to the Family Dining Room on the Second Floor.

There has been a change in a painting in the Red Room. The Jasper Gropeey painting "Under the Palisades in October" which hung over the north door has been removed from the room and is now hanging in the President's Dining Room on the second floor,

Now, hanging over the door is a inndscape by Thomas Cole entitled. "River in the Catekills." It was painted in 1843 and is on loss to the White House from the Boston Museum of Fine Arts. Cole was born in England and emigrated to the United States in 1819 and settled in New York. He is considered the founder of the Hudson River school of American Art.

A very handsome pair of pier tables have been placed at the west end of the Ground Floor Corridor. These tables were made in New York in the American Empire style circa 1820. They are mahogany with ormolu decoration and black and white marble tops. These tables were acquired for the White House Collection in 1973 but they have been in New York for restoration work until this month.

We have made several changes in the Library and the Vermeil Room. The drum table which was in the Vermeil Room has been moved to the Library. This table which is smaller in scale than the table formerly in the Library is a mahogany drum table with a dark green leather top. This table was made by Duncan Phyfe, the prominent New York cabinetmaker, circa 1810-1815. The table which had been in the Library has now been placed in the Third Floor Corridor.

In the Vermeil Room, we have added a very handsome pier table which is on loan from the American Wing of the Metropolitan Museum in New York City. This table replaces the pier table which had been placed against the south wall. This table is rosewood with gilt bronze mounts and was made between 1800-1815. This table was made by C.H. Lannuier of New York and bears his label and is branded with his name.

In the center of the Vermeil Room, we have replaced the Duncan Physe drum table with a round mahogany table with a white marble top and ormolu mounts which was made in France circa 1817. This table was among the furnishings which were ordered for the White House in 1817 by President James Monroe. It is in the same classical style as the American furniture in the room.

A portrait of James Monroe has been placed in the Blue Room to the right of the door leading to the Green Room. This portrait replaces the portrait of Mr. Monroe by G.P.A. Healy which had been temporarily lent to the White House by the Diplomatic Reception Rooms, Department of State. The new portrait is a contemporary copy by Mr. Adrian Lamb of New York City of the beautiful portrait of Mr. Monroe by Gilbert Stuart circa 1820. The original Stuart portrait had been lent to the White House for use in the Blue Room by the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York but the portrait was recently recalled by the museum for a travelling exhibition during the next year. This copy will hang in its place but we expect to have the original portrait lent to the White House again when the exhibition is completed.

There have been changes in the paintings in the Roosevelt Room.

Over the mantel has been hung an unfinished painting of "The Signing of the De claration of Independence" by a French artist Edouard Armand-Dumaresque (1826-1895). It is a sketch for a larger painting completed by the artist. The painting dates from 1873. Many of the figures are partially completed including Benjamin Franklin who is standing at the table in the left foreground.

The oil painting "The First Naval Action in the War of 1812" by William J. Huggins has been moved from the south wall of the room to the north side.

Flanking the equestrian portrait of Theodore Roosevelt by Tade Styka now on the south side of the room are portraits of Theodore Roosevelt on the right and Franklin D. Roosevelt on the left. The portrait of Theodore Roosevelt which has been moved from above the mantel was painted by Philip Alexius Laszlo de Lombos in 1910. The portrait of Franklin D. Roosevelt was painted in 1945, shortly after his death, by a Polish-American artist Stanislav Rembski. It is on loan to the White House from the Franklin D. Roosevelt Library, Hyde Park, New York.

The marble bust of Joel Barlow by Jean-Antoine Houdon has been removed from the east niche in the Cross Hall. The bust is being lent to the National Gallery of Art here in Washington for one of its bicentennial exhibitions "The. European Vision of America." It will return to the White House in March, 1976.

In its place, a marble bust of George Washington after Cerrachi has been put in the niche. This bust of Washington was purchased for the White House in 1817 from Benjamin Lear, son of Washington's secretary Tobias Lear. It cost \$100. For many years the bust was referred to as "The Unknown Man" because of its lack of resemblence to Washington.

"Michael's Bedroom" - Second Floor

Following up on our very pleasant telephone conversation of the other day, I am trying to improve the furnishings of the room on the second floor that we refer to as Michael and Gayle's room. I am looking for an inexpensive rug for the room but in the meantime I thought I would leave the Aubusson rug on the floor temporarily that you liked until we could find something suitable but somewhat larger.

The tables that were by the two beds were these rather unattractive "decorator" tables covered with fabric and very soiled. I have replaced them with two very beautiful tables which we own placed on either side of the bed. I thought that we would put glass tops on them to prevent any possible damage.

I think we may be able to find a better sofa (from stock) than the one presently there. I expect to upgrade the paintings in the room. The thing that stands out most in my mind that needs immediate attention is the painted chest of drawers which should be replaced. I have one or two very beautiful chests which we own that I can put in the room. I am enclosing a photogtaph of the one that I strongly recommend. If it meets with your approval, we will have it moved in right away. I would also like to replace the mirror but if you are attached to it of course we should keep it.

We might in time (with your approval) change the draperies and bedspread as the rather spotty flower print seems distracting to me. I think we could find something even prettier at very low cost.



Please let me know if the suggested improvements meet with your approval. We can proceed with them promptly. I would like for you to see the suggested objects in the room so that you can make decisions.

The Heriz runner rug will be put down in the Entrance Hall as soon as the pad to go under the rug can be cut and placed.

After the last meeting of the Committee for the Preservation of the White House, it was thought that we should do only the very necessary things to the Lincoln Bedroom and not change anything else. Mr. Jones and I planned only to replace the draperies (which are in shreds) in time for the possible royal visit in July.

No one was more startled than I when the draperies arrived with overly heavy valances. We had planned originally to use gilt wood cornices (which we have had for some time) which are identical to what was in the room during Lincoln's day, and relatively simple draperies which would be made to draw under the cornices retaining the lace curtains which have been there for some time. The cornices could not be used, however, without changing the existing window frames. Consequently, we did not proceed with changing the window frames. Instead, Mr. Jones was to design a very simple valance to cover the top of the new opaque draw curtains. Unfortunately, (probably due to lack of communication between Mr. Jones in Georgia and Mr. Byers at Brown Decorating Company, Atlanta, and myself) the valances came designed to fit under the gilt wood cornices eventually but in the interim to cover the top of the windows up to the freize to make a better proportioned window in scale with the period of a Victorian room. This was a temporary suggestion until the cornices could be used perhaps, at a later date if and when we agreed on it. The work in the room went so late in the day yesterday that we did not have a chance to invite you down to the room as we had intended to explain to you what we had intended as well as what went wrong and get your opinion on what to do next.



I was going to inform you that Mr. Byers and I had already agreed to take down the valances and redesign them to be much shallower (or shorter) as they are too overpowering for the room at the present without the gilt cornices in place. In my work things have to be set up together to really get the impression.

The bedspread and pillows were an after thought to try to dress the room up for the possible royal visitor so as to coordinate the present rug, the draperies, and the bedspread. It was never intended to use the green and gold bedspread permanently but instead to use the White bedspread that has been there all the time using the green and gold bedspread only for special occasions such as when having a state guest in the room.

Apparently you and the President saw the room before I could explain to you what had gone off the tracks. I certainly didn't want you to think we were proceeding on something like that without your seeing it with the proper explanation.

My suggestions for your consideration, approval or disapproval are as follows:

- 1. That we leave the draw curtains in place, but take down the overpowering valances. Mr. Byers can reduce them considerably in size and make better proportioned ones for the existing windows and get them back by the end of June if we take them down promptly. The draw curtains are made of the same material as was there previously. We did feel that the replacement curtains should be made to close to obscure light for sleeping comfortably in the room. (See drawing #1 attached)
- 2. We can take down the valances which we are planning now to do anyway and have them reduced in depth without under lampas pleats and hang inside trim. (See drawing #2 attached)
- 3. Make a very simple valance out of the same material as draw curtains and swag inside trim. (See drawing #3 attached)
- 4. Clean old fringe and reuse on new valance hung inside the trim of taffeta as used before over nothing but lace curtains. These would not close nor obscure light. (See drawing #4 attached)

Also attached are old views of Lincoln Bed Room (please return) and Jones/Byers sketch of proposed draperies with cornices.




#### Treaty Room Drapery Renewal

For your information we have taken down the velvet draperies in the Treaty Room as the velvet was badly faded. We have been given by the Lister Company (British) who were interested in doing the draperies in the East Room new red velvet material made of Qiana.


Replacement draperies are being made in exactly the same design merely substituting new red velvet material for the old velvet. The trim consisting of braid and tassels on the old Treaty Room draperies are being taken off, cleaned, and will be put back on the new velvet. As you can see, this means that we will have exactly the same thing as before but made with new velvet using the old trim over again. These draperies will be back in place by the end of June.













They are:

Dear Gary:

We were all sorry that you were not present at the meeting on the Committee for the Preservation of the White House on March 22nd. It was a delightful meeting and very well attended. I noted, as well as other members of the Committee, that considerable concern was expressed about redecoration of the bedroom on the third floor known as the Lincoln Bedroom. The members of the Committee expressed reserve about restoring the appearance of the room to the days of President Lincoln's using it as an office. The dark tones and heavy decorative features of the suggested patterns for curtains and floor covering would not comport with the present use of the room as a bedroom. A number of the members of the Committee spoke of the charming and slightly worn appearance of the room as a bedroom, feeling that this was a welcome relief from the heavy redecoration of the rest of the rooms, which has been going on so steadily now for some years. I point this out to you as I am sure you will be willing to assist Clem Conger in scheduling a review of any suggested patterns of textiles for curtain materials of that room, or any changes to be adopted, so that the members of the Committee for the Preservation of the White House may have a chance to review such suggestions before they are carried out. I am sure that I am speaking for the other members of the Committee in this regard, as there was essentially unanimous sentiment expressed at the informal meeting in the bedroom.

Dear Dillon:

I have held your letter of April 22 for some days until I was off the lecture circuit and had time to write a suitable response.

Our distinguished architect-designer, Mr. Edward Jones, who is one of the greatest authorities in the country on 19th century American architecture and decoration, and I were surprised at the very strong opinions expressed by you and Clare Booth Luce about our suggestions for putting the Lincoln Bedroom back to more or less the way it appeared in the 1860's when Lincoln used the room as a Cabinet Room. Admittedly, it was not then a bedroom. We have engravings of the room showing President Lincoln meeting with his cabinet which shows exactly what the general appearance of the room was at that time with such details as the cornices, draperies, the rug and even some of the paintings on the walls. They also show the style of woodwork and the mantel. This is one of the few White House rooms that can be put almost exactly back the way it was in the 19th century.

I wish to assure you that we were trying to take what is generally considered the normal "preservation and restoration" approach to restoring the general appearance of the room to the Lincoln era, although it is now a bedroom and not a presidential office. The use of this room as a bedroom began in the Truman Administration when Mr. Truman started collecting Victorian era furniture some of which was associated with Mr. Lincoln. The entire present decoration of the room dates from the Truman renovation 1950-53 and was a part of the very disappointing and frequently incorrect renovation (not restoration) of the White House accomplished by the U. S. Army Corp of Engineers and others at that time.

You were not present at some of the previous meetings where we outlined in detail what little we know about what various rooms in

the White House were like in the 19th century. All of our restoration efforts have been to put the rooms back to what they might have been had all Presidents and First Ladies had the best taste of the period and plenty of money with which to decorate and furnish the White House. Most rooms have consciously been restored to what they might have been in the first quarter of the 19th century. However, we definitely recommend that the Lincoln Bedroom and the adjoining Treaty Room be kept in the Victorian style of the time of Lincoln's presidency. I value your opinion highly, but it is a very debatable point in restoration of a room as to whether a rug for a bedroom would have been very different in the Victorian era from that of a Victorian rug for an office. We have studied all the Victorian rug samples at the Smithsonian and several other sources. Victorian era rugs all are similar in being colorful and having "busy" patterns. After all we know about the design and the colors of the rug in that room in Lincoln's day, it seemed to us like a good idea to try to reproduce as closely as possible the same rug. This had been mentioned in a meeting of the Committee for the Preservation of the White House during the Nixon Administration.

There is certainly no real reason to get nostalgic over an interior of 1953 in a room relating to Mr. Lincoln. I think most of your experts on the Victorian era in the Smithsonian would probably agree with the approach which we were taking. As a matter of fact, I think most of the members of the Committee were so surprised by the approach which you and Mrs. Luce took at the very beginning, that we never really had a satisfactory opportunity to explain what our suggestions were about and why we were making them. At least five of the nine members of the Committee present were sympathetic to our suggestions but hesitated to discuss the matter further that day.

The legislation setting up the Committee for the Preservation of the White House states that the Committee is responsible for the Ground

Floor Rooms and State Floor Rooms. The second floor rooms are not mentioned. However, it has always been my concern to keep the Committee and the First Lady informed by having them concerned with the whole house particularly the several rooms on the second floor which are treated like State Rooms - Quéen's Bedroom, Lincoln Room, East Sitting Hall, Treaty Room and Yellow Oval Drawing Room. Although the Lincoln Bedroom is admittedly in what we normally call the private quarters, the matter of the rugs, upholsteries, etc., for the Lincoln Bedroom naturally will be brought to another meeting of the Committee when hopefully there will be more members present and we will have more time to consider them. In the meantime, we are proceeding only with the essential work of new draperies in the Lincoln Bedroom (of the same green material as at present) for the windows, and holding everything else in abeyance. The draperies will close so as to darken the room properly which they do not presently. The draperies will be quite plain without tassels. etc.
