

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



Wolf Trap Associates

Status Report since September 1974

The Associates are currently putting on a lecture luncheon series "February with the Arts" at the Shoreham Hotel on consecutive Mondays. Anthony Bliss, the new Executive Director of the Metropolitan Opera started the series on February 10, Gunther Schuller, President of the New England Conservatory of Music spoke on February 17th, and Edward Villella, of the New York City Ballet will close the series on February 24th. This event, under the chairmanship of Mrs. C. Swan Weber, has continued the outstanding success of last year's "February with the Met." While not intended as a fund raising enterprise, this Associates activity has generated considerable interest in, and exposure for, Wolf Trap.

The fund raising efforts of the Associates are directed toward support of the Wolf Trap Company. At its January meeting, the Associates Board reaffirmed its intention to work for the full financial support of the Wolf Trap Company. Last year's contribution was \$25,500 for 17 fellowships. Mr. Ralph A. Beeton is heading a committee to explore ways of raising an additional \$12,500 in order to make the needed increased donation for the 25 fellowships in 1975.

The major fund raising activities since September 1974 have been a very successful trip to Mexico which netted \$2,000, and the annual Wolf Trap Ball which brought in \$12,099.13.

April 7 & 8 the Associates are planning a trip to New York to attend the debut of Beverly Sills opening night performance in THE SIEGE OF CORINTH. The trip was very quickly oversubscribed.

The Associates received in the mail the week of February 17th an advance season's subscription list, which will go to the public on February 28th. Subsequently, an advance notice of the general schedule brochure, from which remaining single tickets can be purchased, will go out to the Associates the first of April. A concerted mailing effort was made in January and February to those who have let their membership expire, and to various participants in Associate activities last year, in an effort to capitalize on this valued membership benefit. There has been a noticeable increase in the rate of membership applications submitted to take advantage of this advance notice offered to Associates.

As of February 18, 1975, the dues paying members of the Associates numbered 1133. Dues received up to this date since the annual report of Sept. 30, 1974 total \$18,605.45.

The winter months have been a time for setting up chairmanships, and advance planning for the coming season. The following chairmen have been appointed:

Through the generosity of Mrs. Shouse, who had the area panelled, and the Park Service, which provided the carpeting, the Associates have a very efficient and roomy office area, which will serve as offices for the Executive Director and the Manager of the Gift Shop, as well as a locale for committee meetings, volunteer projects, and Associate gatherings.

Mr. Edwin K. Hoffman, President of Woodward & Lothrop, was appointed to the Associates Board of Directors in November to succeed Mrs. James M. Beggs who moved to St. Louis.





CUMULATIVE REPORT DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNICATIONS SEPTEMBER 14, 1974 through February 19, 1975

This report will enumerate the activities of the Department of Communications and Marketing and the new consolidated Department of Communications as overviewed since the last meeting of the Board of Directors on September 14, 1974.

DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNICATIONS AND MARKETING

Under the direction of Alfred Stites, this department was responsible for the limited advertising following the end of the 1974 season; sale and advertising of gift certificates; and the booking of popular attractions under the supervision of the General Director.

1. Advertising

Ads were placed promoting the sale of gift certificates during the late fall and winter of 1974. Posters were designed and placed prominently in several business establishments.

2. Booking - Popular Attractions

This subject will be covered by the report of the Office of the General Director.

3. Gift Certificates

423 gift certificates have been sold since the beginning of the campaign in late Fall.

DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNICATIONS

Effective February 1, 1975, the Department of Communications under the direction of Luke Bandle was established, consolidating the Department of Communications and Marketing with the department formerly responsible for publicity, promotion, and public affairs.

This report will detail the activities in both the fields of promotion before the consolidation, and advertising and promotion after the departments were merged.

GENERAL

 Newspaper Coverage: Press Intelligence, Inc., clipping service for this department, has delivered 124 clippings to date since the last report. (See Appendix A)

2. Arts List Co-op

In cooperation with the majority of the local performing arts organizations in the area, a mailing list exchange has finally been agreed upon. The result is an expanded base of contacts for all organizations. Lists from the National Symphony, Arena Stage, Ford's Theatre, WETA, Folger Theatre and the Opera Society of Washington will be utilized for the mailing on February 28 of the first Wolf Trap subscription series.

RADIO-TELEVISION

Promotional Appearances Completed

- 1. Mrs. Jouett Shouse appeared on PANORAMA originating from the new Hirshhorn Gallery in a discussion on the state of the arts. Also appearing were Nancy Hanks from the National Endowment and David Lloyd Kreeger representing the National Symphony.
- 2. Luke Bandle appeared on a fund-raising telethon for public television station WNVT in behalf of Wolf Trap.
- 3. Mrs. Bandle was also featured on a 1/2 hour WAVA-AM and WEEL-FM program, NORTHERN VIRGINIA FACES THE NATION, and on the STAN KARAS SHOW, WAVA-FM twice covering institutional information, the 1975 season, the Associates lecture/luncheons and the new subscription series.
- 4. Ralph Hoffmann and Luke Bandle appeared on the WTTG-TV Muscular Dystrophy telethon in behalf of Wolf Trap.
- 5. During the Bi-Centennial Convention sponsored by the Associated Council on the Arts, Luke Bandle appeared on Oklahoma City and Tulsa public television stations promoting the IN PERFORMANCE AT WOLF TRAP series and doing institutional advertising for Wolf Trap.
- 6. To promote the Carols at Wolf Trap program, Luke Bandle appeared on seven different radio station programs to encourage people to attend the program. 7,000 did. The same kind of wide-spread promotion is planned for the Sunrise Easter Service.
- 7. Radio station WMAL-AM & FM carried taped re-broadcasts of the Christmas program at Wolf Trap on Christmas Day with fund-raising comments by Luke Bandle and Tom Gauger. The Voice of America transmitted the program around the world on Christmas Day and National Public Radio exerpted for re-broadcast.
- 8. Luke Bandle gave a telephone interview to a radio station in New Orleans, Louisiana. The Opera Society of Washington's production of MANON had been taped by National Public Radio and was being presented there. Mrs. Bandle was also allowed to discuss Wolf Trap at some length on the same interview.

Promotional Appearances in Process

- 1. Mrs. Jouett Shouse will accept a scholarship from the Vienna Rotary Club at a luncheon on February 19.
- 2. Mrs. Jouett Shouse and Luke Bandle will appear on WMAL-AM & FM, the Hardin & Weaver Show, the week of February 24 to promote the subscription series and do institutional promotion.
- 3. In conjunction with a trip to Canada to promote group tour sales of 1975 tickets, Luke Bandle will appear on radio and television in Toronto, Montreal, and Ottowa in mid-March.
- 4. The week of March 10 is set for appearances on radio and television shows in Richmond for Luke Bandle in conjunction with a trip to set up groups for audience survey and ticket sales in the Tidewater area.
- 5. WAMU, the American University National Public Radio affiliate, a station over which Mrs. Bandle formerly broadcast a weekly opera interview feature, has requested a 1975 schedule be set up for a Wolf Trap feature.
- 6. At least a dozen other radio and television features including WMAL-TV's AM WASHINGTON program are planned for the next two months.

IN PERFORMANCE AT WOLF TRAP

- 1. Executive Producer David Prowitt is readying for immediate delivery a film to be edited from the original series and to be used as a marketing tool with potential group sales and other clients.
- 2. The National Park Service in association with a contracted production film group has produced a film about Wolf Trap which will soon be available for use by the Associates lecture bureau, for general distribution useage in schools, churches, and other community organizations, business and civic groups across the nation. Claire St. Jacques has been monitoring the editing process.
- 3. IN PERFORMANCE AT WOLF TRAP will be re-run on consecutive Thurs-days beginning April 24 on all PBS affiliate stations. This will help encourage 1975 season sales.
- 4. There are very strong indications that Atlantic Richfield in conjunction with WETA-TV will video-tape at least 7 programs from the 1975 season for broadcast over all PBS affiliates.

ADDITIONAL RADIO TELEVISION PROMOTIONS

- 1. WGMS-AM & FM will again produce a two-hour special on Wolf Trap for this fifth anniversary season. The Director of Communications is presently working out details of this new format special with WGMS.
- 2. Either WGMS or WMAL will tape a promotional spot with Beverly Sills at her convenience.
- 3. WRC-TV will video-tape six separate public service announcements promoting Wolf Trap General (Let This Be the Summer YOU Discover Wolf Trap), the subscription series, and other major items.
- 4. The Communications Department has proposed special radiotelevision nights in which stations would either purchase tickets
 for their invited guests on that evening, or ticket trades
 for station time would be used as part of the regular advertising
 program. Advantages of such a series of special programs would be
 increased free air publicity (each radio and/or television
 personality would be asked by their station to attend that
 evening) and would broaden the base of public attendance.
- 5. A meeting with the producer of AM AMERICA has been scheduled to discuss summer-long coverage of Wolf Trap.

FEBRUARY WITH THE ARTS

- 1. This important lecture/luncheon series sponsored by the Wolf Trap Associates under the chairmanship of Mrs. Carl Swan Weber, has coverage by the majority of the local press including a large story with pictures in the Washington Post.
- 2. The Voice of America is taping the programs in their entirety for broadcast overseas.
- 3. Raw tapes will be provided National Public Radio for rebroadcast in this country.
- 4. Chairman Ruthanna Weber appeared on a PREVIEW program on WGMS promoting the series.
- 5. WGMS taped an interview with Gunther Schuller at that time and plans a final taping on February 24.
- Table cards were designed to promote subscriptions, designed and produced 1st subscription series.

AUDITIONS FOR WOLF TRAP COMPANY

- 1. Promotional efforts supporting the Wolf Trap Company auditions began with the issuance of a press release nationally to all media; a mailgram sent to music editors of the major national newspapers; and telephone calls following up these contacts.
- 2. Advertisements were placed in six newspapers serving regions outside the Washington, D.C. area on Sunday, December 29 The Boston Globe, the New Orleans Times-Picayune, the Dallas Morning News, the San Antonio Express, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, and the Cincinnati Inquirer.
- 3. A feature story was done in the Washington Star-News with pictures Monday, January 13.
- 4. Feature articles in Reed Reports went out in all Newhouse Newspapers.
- 5. Feature Associated Press article circulated to dozens of AP outlets.
- 6. Posters and brochures were put together to send out to schools and other outlets.

ADVERTISING

- 1. Bill Rolle & Associates has been contracted as the agency of record for all advertising for the Wolf Trap Foundation.
- 2. Advertising schedule proposed for season is attached. (See Appendix B)

OTHER ACTIVITIES OF NOTE

- 1. Application has been made to the National Endowment for a grant of \$25,000 to be used in the area of audience development.
- 2. Executive Systems Inc. has been contracted to restructure and maintain the various mailing lists at Wolf Trap. This has been a major project of reconstruction and Eveline Hyde has been working as the immediate supervisor.

The general list now has over 50,000 correct names and addresses and is programed to list other pertinent information relating to marketing and fund-raising.



- 3. The Chapel Hill Newspaper published a story and front page full-color photograph in its INTERMISSION Sunday supplement on February 9. (See Appendix C)
- 4. A continuous showing of some of the IN PERFORMANCE videotapes and a special group sales brochure gave information on Wolf Trap to all Virginia travel agents and travel writers. Carol Harford, Luke Bandle, Sam Paul, Mark Auerbach, and Susan Waters represented Wolf Trap at a three-day Virginia Travel Council convention on January 22, 23, and 24. Much interest was shown and many requests for additional literature have been received.
- 5. Letters are sent along with additional information to each person or organization whose names and addresses are received as prospective visitors to the Washington Area from the Washington Convention and Visitor's Bureau. A display is planned for their annual convention.

PROGRAM MAGAZINE

- 1. A contract has been negotiated with Dondor Publishing/Southern Printing for publication of CENTERLINES Magazine, the official program for each Filene Center production. Under this contract, Wolf Trap will receive the planned 32 page program book free of charge. In return, Southern Printing will sell advertising packages to large donor/sponsors for specified pages in each of the four books and will also receive a 15% commission on any additional advertising sold through the Communications Department.
- 2. Material is being gathered; a program notes writer is at work; individuals have been asked to prepare informational articles on various subjects for inclusion in the program. All material is planned for copy ready no later than May 15.

TICKET SERVICES

Box Office

A thorough evaluation of the box-office operating procedure was made by Manager Mark Auerbach and Assistant Manager Susan Waters. The following changes in operational procedure were instituted for a more efficient and expedient ticket servicing and accounting.

- 1. After job descriptions were written, salaries were standardized to fit the job.
- 2. Mail order process on assembly line style was set up to ensure one week service.
- 3. An American Express Centurion Terminal was leased to eliminate telephone charge authorizations.

- 4. Instant Credit has been streamlined to handle increased numbers of incoming calls.
- 5. Ticketron has been programmed to "dress the house" rather than to sell one row at a time. The program will also block all performances of the same price scale on one event code, thus expediting window sales at the box office and remotes.
- 6. Voucher ticket agencies have been realigned. New agencies have been established.

MAILING LIST

- 1. All 1974 Instant Credit patrons have been added to the new computerized mailing list.
- 2. A comprehensive Group Sales mailing list has been compiled and coded into the computer.

GIFT CERTIFICATES

- 1. This season the Gift Certificate sales campaign was organized and instituted by the Department of Communications and Marketing. This year the box office was only responsible for the sale and deposit of funds.
- 2. As of February 18, 423 gift certificates had been sold.

GROUP SALES

In January, 1975, the Group Sales operation was realigned and put back under the operational direction of the box office. Since that time the following programs have been instituted for the 1975 season with a projected goal of \$200,000 in sales.

- 1. A group salesman, Peter Grigsby, was employed. Mr. Grigsby has had extensive experience in sales in the performing arts.
- 2. A group sales brochure was developed through the Communications Office. A one-page capsule sheet was developed and printed for distribution at the Virginia Travel Council Convention. Brochure distribution: 10,000.
- 3. Group sales discount was realigned to increase sales potential: a 15% discount will be given for groups of 25 to 199, and a 20% discount for groups of 200 or more.
- 4. Hotel packages are being developed for both groups and individuals at the Sheraton Reston and the Dulles Marriott Hotels.

5. Specialized flyers will be distributed to various groups enforcing sales of limited appeal attractions. Such flyers are also being developed on dance programs to encourage greater attendance at those performances.

OUTREACH PROGRAMS

The Manager of Ticket Services has coordinated the following activities in conjunction with the Director of Communications:

- 1. Seminar on Wolf Trap Box Office/Ticketron/Group sales for the following organizations:
 - A. American University Department of Performing Arts Graduate Program in Arts Administration.
 - B. National Endowment of the Arts Internship in Arts Administration Program.
 - C. Yale University School of Drama Theatre Administration Program.
 - D. Federal City College Communicative Arts Department.
- 2. The Wolf Trap Box-Office is sponsoring "work experience" interns in Arts Administration.
- 3. Ticketron has used Wolf Trap as a pilot program example of a fully utilized Ticketron box-office for a performing arts center. Staff members from other performing arts organizations will be visiting Wolf Trap to see the operation before installing Ticketron.
- 4. Mr. Auerbach has spent time in the subscription and group sales offices of several New York and Washington organizations observing sales and instant charge procedures.

SEASON ANNOUNCEMENT TO PRESS

- 1. Luncheon given by Mrs. Jouett Shouse for writing press. Press kits and other promotional data designed for presentation. Response overwhelming--articles in Post, Star, and others.
- 2. Cocktail Party given by Mrs. Shouse for Radio-TV press. Press response excellent in spite of snow storm. Much coverage from stations on subscription series.
- 3. Aside from the variety of press attending, the major function of this conference was achieved to help eliminate ticket problems with the Metropolitan Opera this year that gave Wolf Trap such bad press last season.
- 4. Also introduced press to new Director of Development.

In addition to the above, press releases were sent out on each of the seven television shows, pieces will appear in Forecast, the Washingtonian, and several other magazines on the series and on the subscription campaign. The Director of Communications visited all important papers and magazines in New York which resulted in some coverage of Wolf Trap and of the series.

Close work with people from Atlantic Richfield and WETA-TV along with press parties in New York and Washington helped increase press coverage of the series.

Lectures are planned by the Director of Communications and the Manager of Ticket Services in several Universities and Colleges throughout Virginia, North and South Carolina and Maryland involving Wolf Trap and many aspects of the performing arts.

Although never satisfied, the Director of Communications is pleased with the team efforts by Sam Paul, Executive Assistant; Mark Auerbach, Manager of Ticket Services; and Susan Waters, Assistant Manager, Ticket Services and all the other people who, by working together, have made possible major accomplishments over the past few weeks.

We plan to make the motto LET THIS BE THE SUMMER YOU DISCOVER WOLF TRAP! be known world wide before the end of the year.

APPENDIX B
Media Strategy for 1975 Wolf Trap Season

I. Pre-Season

A. Subscription

New subscription series will be advertised in Post and Star with coupon; on WGMS with address and telephone contact, and in two local magazines with high saturation cultural mailing.

B. SEASON CALENDAR

The season calendar will be advertised in all local newspapers; on the four top radio stations; with a Potomac Magazine pullout in the Post and with a large ad in the Star.


II. SEASON

Season strategy is to begin each month with a full page in the Post and Star and to decrease lineage while retaining presence in newspapers on each day throughout the month. Ads will also be placed in all local newspapers; on the top four radio stations on all attractions and on specified other stations according to the audience outreach needed for the attraction.

Television advertising will be limited to those events which are expensive but will need this kind of encouragement to sell out.

This department believes that free promotion and paid advertising must go hand in hand in order to get the most efficient return on investment.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS
