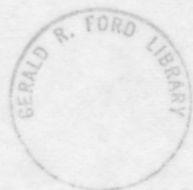

I can feel how proud you are of Creel, and the feeling in a school is the most important thing of all.

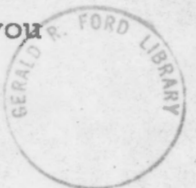

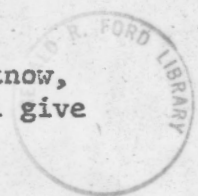
We believe the President will enjoy speaking to this audience. As you know, the timing is excellent and we are certain as always the news media will give excellent coverage to this event.

University of Miami Founders Day Banquet, February 27, 1976

Thank you for inviting me to share this special evening with you. I'm honored to be one of the few people from outside the academic community to speak to this annual event.

I feel very at home, because I know we share a common concern--the education of a new generation of Americans.

I marvel at the young people of this country, and I have great faith in their abilities. I believe as parents, educators, and citizens, our generation has a responsibility to provide an education that will serve these young people long after we are gone.

I've seen with my own children how important a variety of educational institutions are. Our dual system of private and public education provides this diversity and it is important to keep the balance private universities offer.

Private universities help keep alive specialized disciplines. One of these special areas, theology, is of particular interest to our oldest son, Mike. But there are many other unusual and important areas where private universities have been very prominent.

The special program at the University of Miami in marine and atmospheric sciences is an excellent example of how private



universities promote exploration into unique specializations. Often these explorations prepare the way for wider interest and concern.

One of my personal interests is how education, both private and public, keeps alive academic and artistic traditions that enrich our cultural lives. Education, as this university shows, is more than scientific and legal knowledge. It also includes inquiries into many topics from the origin of our universe to the reasons for human behavior.

Your financial support of the University of Miami shows your interest in the future, because only through education of the next generation can we hope to keep our Nation strong and make the world a more liveable place for others.

Your generosity makes academic programs and buildings possible, but equally important, you help make the riches of this academic community accessible to students from many social and economic backgrounds.

We cannot imagine what knowledge our children will need tomorrow, but today we can give them the opportunity to learn and the freedom to explore new ideas.

I join you in believing we can best give them the intellectual tools to respond to their world through private and public education.

## THE SOCIETY OF UNIVERSITY FOUNDERS

The Society of University Founders, an elite organization of extraordinary friends of the University of Miami, has played a vital role in the successful emergence of the University as the largest private, independent, international education institution in the Southeast.

The University's Board of Trustees announced the formation of the Society of University Founders in November, 1966. Each of the 140 charter members personally or through his organization contributed or pledged a minimum of \$50,000 to the University. Some charter members have supported the University since its inception. Others joined later in making possible the University's dramatic advancement to national recognition.

In making known the Trustee's desire to honor major supporters, President Henry King Stanford noted that "while 'founder' suggests primarily the early years of the University, we expect the Society to be like the University — a living, growing entity.

"A vital university develops as new departments, new schools, new centers are founded. As the University of Miami progresses, so, too, we trust will the Society itself flourish as new members join us. . . ."

In the ten years since its inauguration, the Society has provided in excess of \$68 million in support of the University's quest for excellence in programs and facilities. Each member receives a personalized bronze plaque and a ribboned medallion at the time of investiture. In addition, the name of each member is inscribed in a wall panel in the Marion and Ed Lau Founders Hall on campus. A special Honor Roll of Society Members is published annually.

Members also are honored at an annual banquet, at which time the University extends proper appreciation to the distinguished individuals and organizations for their generosity. The tenth such rec-



ognition banquet was held February 27, 1976, at the Hotel Fontainebleau.

In 1964 the University initiated its \$93.4 million Golden Anniversary Development Program, designed to make possible the expanded facilities and programs needed to move the University of Miami into the front ranks of the nation's institutions of higher education by the time it reached its 50th birthday in 1975. The Golden Anniversary Development Program was completed successfully ahead of schedule. As a result of this achievement, the University stands solidly as one of the most innovative and exciting educational enterprises in the nation.

Excellence in programs and facilities at the University of Miami is clearly evident. But the costs of maintaining quality and distinction have spiraled in every area. Having scrutinized finances thoroughly and trimmed expenses judiciously, the trustees and officers of the University have set out to establish the sound financial base required as the University moves into its second fifty years as a viable educational and cultural resource for South Florida, the nation and beyond.

There is a campaign underway presently, COMMITMENT/25, through which the University is seeking from its friends, financial commitments totaling \$25 million, payable during the period 1975 - 1980. This amount will free the University of existing debts and will meet the anticipated costs attending its plans to achieve true greatness. During the initial year of this major undertaking, gifts totaling over \$6 million have been received.

Commitment is the key. The trustees, faculty and staff are dedicated not only to the University's survival, but to its continued development as a high quality center of learning and service. To achieve this goal, the partnership of all who believe in the University's mission is required. Among the forefront of these are the members of the Society of University Founders.

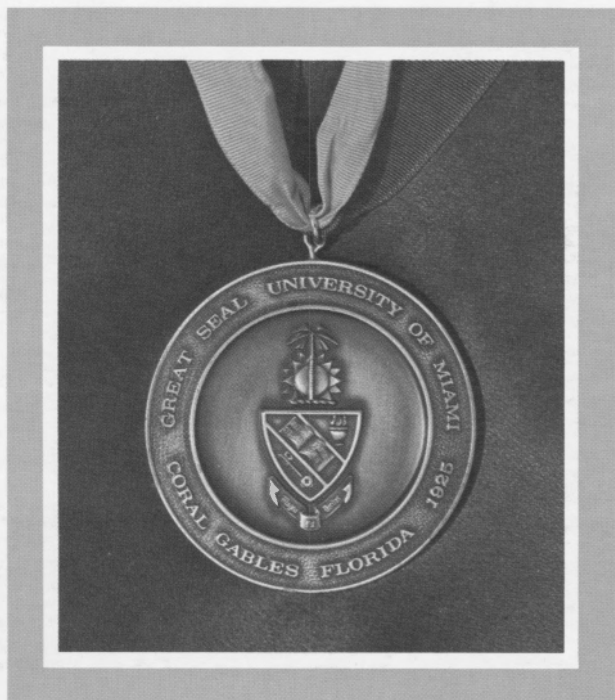

SUBJECT: Sertoma Club Rally--Jacksonville, Florida

To provide you with further information concerning the Jacksonville Sertoma Club's Bicentennial, "Stand Up For America" Rally on February 24 in Jacksonville, I thought the following might be helpful.

With the President's regret, the Sertoma Club asked if you or the Vice President could represent the President for this non-partisan event. They have indicated very strongly that no one else would be acceptable as a standin.

Their two-hour program is totally patriotic and would involve only one speaker--you. In addition to local high school bands, military units will participate in the 8,000 seat Jacksonville coliseum. The 7:30 p.m. rally is free and they are confident it will be standing room only. A similar event was held in 1971 at the Gator Bowl and only because of extremely cold weather (28 degrees) did the attendance shrink to 5,000.

The local National Alliance of Businessmen has assisted the Sertoma Clubs in the arrangements and were suggesting a small reception for approximately 100 of the most influential people in the business community prior to the rally if the President accepted. That invitation would also be extended, but remains a totally separate event, should you accept this appearance as their honored guest.

IN CONGRESS. JULY 4, 1776.

The unanimous Declaration of the thirteen united States of America.

When on the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation. — We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness. — That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, — That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their duty, at that time, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security. — Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the urgency which constraints them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world. — He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good. — He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them. — He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of People, unless those People would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only. — He has called together legislative Bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public Records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures. — He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the People. — He has refused for a long time, after such Dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the Legislative powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the mean time exposed to all the dangers of Anarchy from without, and convulsions within. — He has endeavored to prevent the Population of these States; for that purpose, obstructing the Seas for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass other to encourage their migrations hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands. — He has obstructed the Administration of Justice, by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary powers. — He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries. — He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither, firms of Officers to harass our People, and eat out their substance. — He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies without the Consent of our Legislature. — He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil power. — He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our Constitution, and unacknowledged by our Laws; giving his Assent to their Acts of pretended Legislation: — For Quartering large bodies of armed troops among us: — For restricting them, by a mock Trial, from furnishing for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States: — For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world. — For depriving us in many cases of the benefits of Trial by Jury: — For transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offences. — For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighbouring Province, establishing therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these Colonies: — For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws, and altering fundamentally the Forms of our Government: — For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with powers to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever. — He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us. — He has plundered our Seas, ravaged our Coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our People. — He is at this time transporting large Armies of foreign Mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of cruelty & perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nation. — He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the assassins of their friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands. — He has excited domestic factions amongst us, and has endeavored to bring with the inhabitants of one Province, the merciless Indian Savages, whose known rule of warfare, is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions. In every stage of these Oppressions We have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered by repeated injury. A Prince whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free People. Nor have We been wanting in attention to our British brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their Legislature to extend an unwarrantable Jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have begged them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of conjuncture. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which denounces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends. — We, therefore, the Representatives of the united States of America, in General Congress, assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States; that they are absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connections between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do. And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor.

# Bill of Rights

Congress OF THE United States  
 begun and held at the City of New York, on  
 Wednesday the Fourth of March, one thousand seven hundred and eighty nine

## Article I

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

## Article II

 well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

### Article III

No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

## Article IV

the right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

## Article V

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any Criminal Case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property.

## Article VI

without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining Witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defence.


## Article VII

**I**n Suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

## Article VIII

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

## Article IX

 he enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

## Article X

he powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.
