



Edward J. Kiernan was born on March 20, 1921, in New York City. He spent his childhood in the Borough of Queens and was graduated from St. Agnes High School in College Point, New York.

MR. HE HAS ALSO SERVED AS PRESIDENT OF THE METROPOLITAN CONFERENCE OF POLICE ASSOCIATIONS AND IS A DIRECTOR OF THE EASTERN CONFERENCE OF HEALTH AND WELFARE FUNDS. A PAST COMMANDER OF POLICE POST 1103, AMERICAN LEGION, NEW YORK, HE IS ALSO A MEMBER OF THE EROOKLYN-QUEENS HOLY NAME SOCIETY, THE EMERALD SOCIETY AND THE POLICE DEPARTMENT HONOR LEGION.

MR. KIERNAN WAS APPOINTED BY FORMER PRESIDENT NIXON TO THE UNITED NATION'S COMMITTEE ON THE PREVENTION OF CRIME AND THE TREATMENT OF OFFENDERS, WHICH MARKED THE FIRST TIME THAT A PRESIDENT OF THE INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE OF POLICE ASSOCIATIONS HAD BEEN SINGLED OUT FOR SUCH AN HONOR. HE IS ALSO A MEMBER OF THE PRESIDENT'S NATIONAL COMMISSION ON PRODUCTIVITY AND WORK QUALITY AND HAS BEEN APPOINTED BY PRESIDENT FORD TO THE CONFERENCE ON INFLATION AS A REPRESENTATIVE OF LABOR FOR THE STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS.


