I understand that on February 27, 1976, the President signed into law a Bill setting the salary of Bankruptcy Judges at the \$36,000 figure, in accordance with the 1973 amendment, thereby, equalizing the salary status of Bankruptcy Judges with Administrative Law Judges.



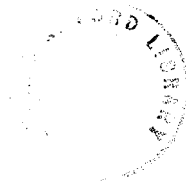

MR. 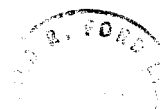

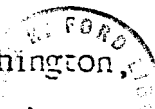

From 1952 to 1969, she was assistant to the director of the Visual Economics Laboratory of Columbia University, assisting in the development of visual aids to foster better understanding of economics. She has also written several articles on economics forecasting and the use of forecasts in business planning. Mrs. Pace holds a B.A. degree from Hunter College and has done graduate work at Columbia University.

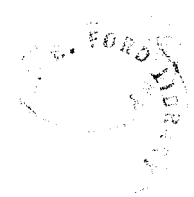
I concur in having the President select for his three appointees the following:


I have asked Paul MacAvoy what he thought of her and he has the following comments:

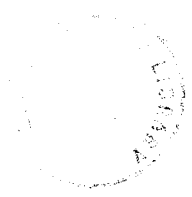
