As a result of the resignation of Leo Cherne, there is one vacancy on the above Commission and the terms of Rita Hauser and Leonard Marks will be expiring this year. Leonard Marks came in to see me about the work of the Commission and I think he would like a call from you about the Commission membership -both in regard to filling the present vacancy and in regard to the two expiring terms.

Leonard Marks is a well-known Democrat who was very close to former President Lyndon Johnson. However, he has been very sympathetic to the President, who knows him well, and is an exceptionally able man who is very much interested in the concerns of this Commission. Unless you see some serious objections, I would strongly recommend reappointment for Leonard Marks by the President.

There is some indication that the Commission has suffered from lack of attention on the part of anyone in the White House and possibly it should be given a role in preparing for the scheduled international conference in Belgrade in July 1977 when there is to be an accounting by the U. S. and the Eastern European countries as to their respective implementations of "Basket Three" of the Helsinki, "OR Agreement. As you know, David Mathews will be sworn in this Friday, August 8, as Secretary of HEW.

Prior to his confirmation by the Senate, Dr. Mathews agreed to sever completely his relationship with the University of Alabama save his continued participation in the University's insurance and retirement plans solely at his own expense.

In order to preclude any possible conflict of interest arising from claims that Dr. Mathew's continued participation in these plans constitutes employment by the University, agreement was reached on the following course of action:

- Dr. Mathews would not participate in any matter 1. specifically involving the University of Alabama while serving as Secretary; and
- At the time of his appointment as Secretary, 2. Dr. Mathews would be granted an exemption, under 18 U.S.C. 208(b) from the provisions of 18 U.S.C. 208(a) covering all matters which might generally affect universities and colleges.

The provision for a 208(b) waiver recognizes that you are aware of Dr. Mathews' retention of these insurance and retirement benefits and carries forward your judgment to the effect that, in participating in matters which impact on the University of Alabama to no greater extent than on other universities and colleges, e.g. grants to higher education, the interests of the University of Alabama and those of Dr. Mathews are not such as to affect the integrity of the services which the Government may expect from the Secretary. The legal effect of the waiver is to preclude any possibility, however remote, of criminal prosecution based upon Dr. Mathews participation in matters generally affecting institutions of higher education. The authority to issue such a waiver has not been delegated and thus your personal approval is required.

Attached for your signature is the formal waiver, dated August 8, 1975, which should be executed at your earliest convenience.

There remains one vacancy among the three state and local positions on the recently announced slate of Presidential Appointees to the National Commission for Manpower Policy. The Commission is responsible for advising the Secretary of Labor on all issues related to the development, administration and coordination of the many diffused and fragmented manpower training and development programs which are found at all levels of government. It would be desirable to fill this vacancy with a governor.

For a variety of reasons, Governors Jim Holshouser, Arch Moore and Dan Evans have been unable to serve on the Manpower Commission. The next most logical candidates for the position are <u>Governors Christopher</u> <u>Bond and William Milliken</u>. <u>Governor William G. Milliken</u> is well known to you. <u>Governor Christopher S. Bond</u> of Missouri is 35 years old with an A.B., Princeton and LL.B., University of Virginia Law School. He has been Governor of Missouri since 1973 and was previously State Auditor and Assistant Attorney General. He practiced law with Covington & Burling from 1965-67. Although Bond has been exposed to the manpower area, Milliken is better versed in manpower issues and labor problems -- due to the highly industrialized nature of the state and the high level of unemployment accompanying the automobile industry problems.

If an announcement were made this week, the appointment of Bill Milliken could provide immediate political benefit. Even if Milliken is beaten in next week's election, he could continue to serve on the Manpower Commission. Participation on this Commission would give him a good reason to maintain his contact with Washington. If an immediate announcement is not desirable, the selection of Kit Bond might be more appropriate --particularly if Milliken does not succeed in his re-election effort. I recommend the immediate appointment and announcement of Governor Bill Milliken to the National Commission for Manpower Policy.

BETTY SOUTHARD MURPHY ADMINISTRATOR, WAGE AND HOUR DIVISION DEPARTMENT OF LABOR

Betty Southard Murphy, a labor lawyer with a nationwide reputation, was sworn in as Administrator of the Wage and Hour Division, on July 15, 1974.

As Administrator, Mrs. Murphy supervises the Department's responsibilities under some 70 different labor laws including the Fair Labor Standards Act, which includes minimum wage provisions affecting 56 million workers, the Equal Pay Act, which requires men and women receive equal pay for equal work, the Age Discrimination in Employment Act, which prohibits discriminatory employment practices based on age, the Walsh-Healey Public Contracts Act, the Davis-Bacon Act, the Service Contract Act, the Farm Labor Contractor Registration Act, and a number of other labor laws. She oversees a \$37 million budget and over 1,500 employees.

Before accepting this appointment, Mrs. Murphy was a partner in the Washington, D. C. law firm of Wilson, Woods and Villalon where she specialized in labor, corporate and administrative law. She is one of the few lawyers in the United States who represented both international unions and employers.

In private practice, Mrs. Murphy was an active trial lawyer and tried cases or appeared in Federal or State Courts in 19 different States and argued in 9 of the 11 United States Courts of Appeals.

Mrs. Murphy began her career as a reporter--first as correspondent and free lance journalist in Europe and Asia and later with United Press (now UPI). After graduating from law school, she was an enforcement attorney with the National Labor Relations Board during 1958-1959.

Mrs. Murphy--the first woman to be named Administrator--is a Trustee of the American University, is on the National Board of the Medical College of Pennsylvania, and is Chairman of the Board of Visitors of Mary Baldwin College. Her concern with civil rights and equal employment opportunity for workers is well established. She has been active as Chairman of the District of Columbia Bar Association's Civil Rights Committee, and the Fair Employment Practices Committee; the Federal Bar Association's Committee on Equal Employment Opportunity and Collective Bargaining; the Women's Bar Association's Committee on the Status of Women; and is also Vice Chairman of the Labor Law Committee, Administrative Law Section, American Bar Association.

She received a B.A. degree (oriental studies) from the Ohio State University and also studied in Paris at the Sorbonne and the Alliance Francaise. She obtained her J.D. degree in 1958 from the American University Washington College of Law.

Mrs. Murphy and her husband, Dr. Cornelius F. Murphy, a Radiologist, reside in Annandale, Virginia, with their two children, Ann, 6, and Neil, 5.


