SIGN UP FOR AMERICA More than 50,000 signed American's Creeds have been returned so far in our SIGN UP FOR AMERICA campaign. It is obvious that concerned citizens want to be personally involved in our nation's Bicentennial observance. Invitations to sign the Creed, an official document of the U.S. House of Representatives, will be sent to an additional 9,000,000 American Homes this year.

We know of no other program at this time on the national level which offers Americans, as individuals, an opportunity to record themselves permanently as believing in their country. The New Spirit of '76 Foundation will create a <u>Patriots' Roll of Honor</u> of the names on the signed Creeds and will present this Roll to the President on July 4, 1976. This gives added significance and appeal to the campaign.

The most amazing aspect of our effort is that it is being carried out without "front money". Although not required to make a contribution in order to be enrolled, most of those who sign the Creed do respond to our appeal by enclosing from \$1 to \$100 or more, with an average of slightly under \$5. All the funds received are plowed right back into the campaign, so that it is self-sustaining.

*Americans for Constitutional Action, the established, ultracenservative organization for rating members of Congress -- and helping those who rate highest -- has chosen 43 Representatives and 25 Senators for its 171 Distinguished Service Award. As usual, the list is dominated by Republicans but includes some conservative Democrats.

The (White) Citizens Councils disclosed in the November issue of its publication that its leaders recently had a visit in Jackson, Miss., with Enoch Powell, the Conservative Member of Parliament who has led the fight to stop immigration of colored people to England. Powell was on his way to St. Louis to address the American Association of Physicians and Surgeons, a little-known group considerably to the right of the American Medical Association (Vol. 9, pg. 55)

• For those who missed it, the Citizens for a
New Prosperity, the glaque organized to support
Nixon's economic controls, declared Nov. 29
through Dec. 4 to be National New Prosperity
Week." Also, the group has been given tax exemption.

The Society for the Christian Commonwealth has taken over formal sponsorship of Triumph magazine, a Catholic-oriented, far-right publication started by L. Brent Bozell. By joining the latter, one gets the monthly, plus Catholic Currents newsletter and membership in the Christian Commonwealth Book Club, to be launched soon. Bozell's militancy includes organizing the Sons of Thunder to oppose abortion.

The Conservative Book Club changed its mind and dropped special distribution of Courage and Hesitation, the book by Allan Crury which was written with the cooperation of President Nixon about his daily activities. CBC explained that "Nixon's decision to go to China and the price-inpd-wage receeinve led to disaffection on the part of the conservatives. So, the book which is pro-Nixon, would not go over." Drury has long been a favorite of right-wing readers, as well as many others.

• Warkenhut Corporation, the international investigative and security organization which also dispenses anti-Communist material, has a quired two new board members: Joseph F. Carroll a retired Air Force General, defense intelligence officer, and FDI official; and William F. Raborn, Jr., a retired Admiral who once headed the CIA. The company's chief business is protecting government installations.

Their statement was triggered by articles in the Washington Post about recent meetings of German-American heritage groups, Msgr. Baroni said that thoir views "are hardy ethnic and hardly American."

• Stop Red Trucks is the slogan and letterhead of a "campaign on behalf of American opposed to trade with Communist countries." Sponsored by the Young Americans for Freedom, it is a mutation of the drive which centered on the Mack truck firm and was co sponsored by the American Conservative Union, When Mack pulled out of consideration for building a plant in Russia, the new style was developed to keep any U. S. firm from building the plant (which could be easily converted to the production of tanks and other heavy military equipment").

Also, the Society will step up its campaign against the income tax, which it attributes to Karl Marx.

Incidentally, the major article in the December issue of American Opinion, the Birch monthly, is a long one by George Wallace, the Governor of Alabama, illustrated with flattering pictures from his life.



PEOPLE INVOLVEMENT: The primary aim of the Foundation is to help interested people like you get others involved and active in building a better future for all Americans. To this end, this most important program is divided into action areas including:

- 1. The Office of Public Information & Research to serve as a clearing house for members of the Society in identifying their interests and channeling their abilities and talents toward creative accomplishment in the broad field of public affairs.

Several leaders of the Cardinal Mindszenty Foundation, a right-wing group playfed 11 years ago, have visited their hero. Cardinal Joseph Atindszenty, since he was freed by the Hungarius. They report to the faithful. In a fundrising letter, that the Cardinal "versonally apprives our work and sends his blossing to all tembers and followers."

*Americans for Constitutional Action, the established, ultraconservative organization for rating members of Congress -- and helping those who rate highest -- has chosen 43 Representatives and 25 Senators for its 171 Distinguished Service Award. As usual, the list is dominated by Republicans but includes some conservative Democrats.

The [White] Citizens Councils disclosed in the November issue of its publication that its leaders recently had a visit in Jackson, Miss., with Enoch Powell, the Conservative Member of Parliament who has led the fight to stop immigration of colored people to England Powell was on his way to St. Louis to address the American Association of Physicians and Surgeons, a little-known group considerably to the right of the American Medical Association (Vol. 3, pg. 55)

New Prosperity, the claque organized to support Nixon's economic controls, declared Nov. 29 through Dec. 4 to be National New Prosperity Week," Also, the group has been given tax exemption.

The Society for the Christian Commonwealth has taken over formal sponsorship of Triumph magazine, a Catholic-oriented, far-right publication started by L. Brent Bozell. By joining the latter, one gets the monthly, plus Catholic Currents newsletter and membership in the Christian Commonwealth Book Club, to be launched soon. Bozell's militancy includes organizing the Sons of Thunder to oppose abortion.

The Conservative Book Club changed its mind and dropped special distribution of Courage and Hesitation, the book by Allan Drury which was written with the cooperation of President Nixon about his daily activities. CBC explained that "Nixon's decision to go to China and the price-papel-wage receeinve led to disaffection on the part of the conservatives. So, the book which is pro-Nixon, would not go over." Drury has long been a favorite of right-wing readers, as well as many others.

Warkenbut Corporation, the international investigative and occurity organization which also dispenses anti-Communist material, has acquired two new board members; Joseph F. Carroll a retired Air Force General, defense intelligence officer, and FDI official; and William F. Raborn, Jr., a retired Admiral who once headed the CIA. The company's chief business is protecting government installations.

olf. L. Hunt, the proprietor of the tile time program and a hillian dollars worth of all money, has visited the Texas and Louisians state fairs to exhibit his addeline products -- sales, snaps, lottons and patriotism. Manning a booth along with other hawkers of wares, limit also attracts people who want to shake hands with a rich man,

An apparently well-heeled group of Washington suburbanites has organized the New Spirit
of '76 Foundation, described variously as trying
to speak for the "stient majority" and to "be a
national nonprofit agency organized to atimulate
the individual's awareness and participation in
the affire of his community, his state and his
nation," The founder, Dwight Fuller Spear, has
not appeared in the right wing, and his organization has received tax-exempt status from the
government,

o The coalition of ethnic groups reported on page 51 has been disavowed as "extreme rightwing" by Monsignor Gene Baroni, Director of the National Center for Urban Ethnic Affairs, and a dozon other ethnic leaders. Their statement was triggered by articles in the Washington Post about recent meetings of German-American heritage groups. Magr. Baroni said that their views "are hardy ethnic and hardly American."

• Stop Red Trucks is the slogan and letterhead of a "campaign on behalf of American opposed to trade with Communist countries." Sponsored by the Young Americans for Freedom, it is a mutation of the drive which centered on the Mack truck firm and was co-sponsored by the American Conservative Union, When Mack pulled out of consideration for building a plant in Russia, the new style was developed to keep any U. S. firm from building the plant (which could be easily converted to the production of tanks and other heavy military equipment").

* Americans for Agrew, which was started a few weeks ago by public relations man Lee Edwards (p. 41), has acquired a list of supporters for its letterhead and sent out a second fund appeal. The list is long on right-wing professors and fringe activists, but very short on big political names. Biggest of the latter is former Congressman Donald (Buz) Lukens (R-Ohio).

The John Birch Society has announced that its goal for 1972 will be to get the United States out of the United Nations (and vice versa). Its an old objective of the group, but is bound to receive impetus from right-wing anger at having Red China replace Taiwan in the UN.

Also, the Society will step up its campaign against the income tax, which it attributes to Karl Mark.

Incidentally, the major article in the December lesue of American Opinion, the Birch monthly, is a long one by George Wallace, the Covernor of Alabama, illustrated with file Fring pitures from his life.

The following information, plus the enclosures, is designed to provide answers to most of the questions that are asked about the New Spirit of '76 Foundation. If additional information is desired, it will be freely given by the Secretary and managing director, Mr. Bourjaily, or by the president, founder and executive director, Mr. Spear.

NAME: New Spirit of '76 Foundation, 1776 Massachusetts Avenue NW, Washington, D. C. 20037. (202) 296-8147.

(NB - Headquarters temporarily located at Suite 45, 1500 Massachusetts Avenue NW, while awaiting occupancy of permanent offices at 1776 Massachusetts Avenue.)

Incorporated August 1, 1971, as a non-profit organization under the laws of and in Washington, D. C. with fiscal year ending Deptember 30 each year.

Tax-exempt status under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code granted by the Internal Revenue Service to the Foundation as an educational, charitable and literary organization on August 20, 1971. (See attachment.)

OFFICERS: Dwight Fuller Spear, President, Executive Director and Founder (Manager of Advertising and Proxotions, National Rifle Association) Member - Mail Advertising Club of Washington and the Advertising Club of Washington

Monte Bourjaily Jr., Secretary and Managing Director (Consultant - Business affairs and promotion; writer; journalist; manager, beef feeder operation.)

Leon P. Keller, Treasurer (Certified Public Accountant Leon Keller & Associates.)

Peter Isakov, General Counsel (Attorney-at-law)

The officers named above make up the "leadership", while the first two named make up the "staff" of the Foundation at this time. All are serving without either compensation or full payment of expenses.

Others formally associated with the Foundation in an advisory capacity are named either on the letterhead (Enclosed) or in the pamphlet which gives a general description of the Foundation's philosophy, goals and long-range programs. (also enclosed.)

The Foundation is national in scope. It plans eventually to have state and local chapters of its membership arm, the Spirit of 176 Society. No such local chapters exist

The purpose of the Foundation is to motivate the citizens of the United States to become personally involved in the affairs of our communities, states and nation — to participate actively and individually in public affairs in the broadest possible definition of this term. To achieve this, the Foundation believes that it must motivate Americans to "Lick Apq thy" and to make a personal act of individual dedication.

Long range programs under consideration to these ends are described in the attached pamphlet. At this time, one specific program has been started. A direct mail campaign is under way, under the technical conduct of Patrick J. Gorman Associates (1015 18th St. NW, Washington, D. C.) inviting Americans to sign "The American's Creed", adopted by the United States Congress in 1918 (dabe may be in error by one year) and to contribute funds to make possible the distribution of this Creed to others for their signature. The goal of this campaign is to collect as many millions of signatures as possible and to present these signed Creeds to the President of the United States at the White House on the 200th Anniversary of the Declaration of Indepence — July 4, 1976.

Two other programs are under consideration for immediate development. These are the establishment of Wake Up, America, Day" and "Discover America Day", in the spring and fall respectively. Like theother, more general programs, both of these will depend on the ability of the Foundation to develop the funds required to promote them.

To achieve its goal of "licking apathy" among Americans who shirk their duties as citizens and to motivate Americans to take part in public affairs, broadly defined, the Foundation will cooperate and consult with other organizations. It believes, on the basis of its investigations and experience so far, that it is unique, at least in its approach, in that it is trying at the "grass roots" level to persuade Americans to become involved.

Among Foundations goals is one to assist Americans to identify their interests and to channel or direct them in applying their abilities toward creative accomplishment through me mbership in existing organizations dedicated to specific programs.

So far, the Foundation is employing three techniques in its fund-raising activities: personal contact; direct mail; cash contributions. Efforts are being made monthly in different areas.

The Foundation not only solicits contributions but also will accept membership in its Spirit of '76 Society. Memberships have been received so far from more than one-half (25) states. Membership classifications and amounts are as follows: Student - \$10; Regular - \$15; Supporting - \$50; Sustaining - \$100; Patron \$5000;

Endowment - \$1,000; and Founding - \$1,776.

It has taken time, because of the outside commitments of the officers and staff of the Foundation, to get Foundation activities started.

So far, the Foundation has raised approximately \$2,000 over and above amounts provided for its activities out of the pockets of its officers.

Until the results of its program to motivate Americans to "Sign Up for America" by signing the American's Creed are in, it cannot make any kind of realistic budget projection or financial plans.

The current direct mail program is being conducted by

- 1) Seeking the support of prominent Americans to serve on the Foundation's Board of Advisers;
- 2) Seeking funds from individuals identified to the Foundation as "substantial donors": and
- (8) Seeking signatures from as many American citizens as possible the The American's Creed, at the same time asking for donations to permit expanding the mail campaign to more such citizens.

Funds realized in this program will be used for

Paying the costs of the mail campaign:

Paying administrative expenses connected with this campaign (and keeping the cost, eventually, at below 15% of the funds raised);

C) Paying for general program expenses for other specificsFoundation programs as described above and in the enclosed pamphlet, always seeking to keep general administrative costs at no more than 15% of funds raised, even within specific programs;

D) Development of additional motivational programs in the various media and through other methods of reaching the public in order to involve more Americans in public affairs.

MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION: The executive board of the Foundation has been able to attain a quorum on at least a weekly basis for policy and administrative meetings for the past six months.

No fund audits are yet available. Such an audit will be made before the beginning of the next fiscal year.

Communication with the members and the Board of Advi sers is of primary concern to the executive board and emphasis will be placed on solving any communication problem as a matter of priority. This fact sheet is one manifestation of that concern and will be / distributed for this purpose. millangul

Mr. ROBISON of New York. Mr. Speaker, there has recently been chartered here in the District of Columbia the New Spirit of '76 Foundation. Its ideals, says the foundation's founder, Dwight Fuller Spear, are "a community free of apathy, with pride in its heritage, and confidence in its future."

This new foundation has been granted tax-exempt status by the Internal Revenue Service. Its aspires to be a national nonprofit agency organized to stimulate the individual's awareness and participation in the affairs of his community, his State and his Nation.

A statement of the foundation's principles read, in part:

Briefly, if we recall the days of our Revolution, we remember the phrase "the Spirit of "76." This was not just a slogan. There was a real Spirit of "76 which was the drivnig force during the Revolutionary era within most Americans.

It is from this historical spirit that the Foundation derives its principles:

1. We believe that, like a person, a nation has a spirit. As it is with the person, the nation's spirit can flourish or wither.

2. We believe that our national spirit is most apparent when we as a nation face a challenge.

3. We believe that each time our national spirit makes itself felt, it speaks to its own time with a message that can be applied by us to the problems of our day.

America's "silent majority" contains too many individuals who, while wanting to care, have sunk into apathy, defeated by the size and complexity of modern society. A cancerous growth in the body politic, apathy is the opposite of the spirit of '76.

To eradicate this apathy and to reawaken in the silent, discouraged majority a new spirit of '76, the foundation will provide leadership:

In motivating apathetic individuals to convert their passive concern into active, enthusiastic involvement;

In providing them with facts about the matters that concern them most;

In making available to them a forum in which to express their views, find others with similar opinions, and make suggestions on ways of solving the problems and meeting the challenges which face our Nation:

In overcoming the barriers which divide America into squabbling factions based on age, religion, race, sex, and special interests, by opening channels of communication between these groups; and

In restoring respect for the effectiveness of traditional methods of achieving change, or preventing it, by constitutional means.

On July 3, speaking from the National Archives to a nationwide TV and radio audience in connection with the planned celebration of our country's bicentennial 5 years hence, President Richard Nixon, after reviewing the material goals which this Nation can achieve in the next 200 years, said:

These are great goals, but we could reach all these material goals and still not be worthy of our heritage unless we have the Spirit of 76.

On the same program, the Speaker of the House, the Honorable Carl Albert, described the potential of this spirit, saying.

That same spirit will allay the divisions which haunt us today and will ensure for us and our prosterity the blessings of liberty and a still more perfect union.

The New Spirit of '76 Foundation, already being formed when these words were spoken, has taken them to heart. As these national leaders charge, so will it do its utmost to enable people to comprehend the American spirit, not as the visitation of some ghost of the past, but rather as the affirmation of a deep national yearning stirring in all Americans today.

Mr. Speaker, I take pleasure in calling this new organization to the attention of the House and in wishing it success in achieving its worthy goals.
