Found not guilty in 1962 in Southern New York of bribery in connection with union activities. Pardoned by Governor of Washington in 1965 for 1957 grand larceny by embezzlement conviction. He has no other criminal record. He is 80-year-old retired former president of International Brotherhood of Teamsters, married to second wife and has one adult son. Has made good adjustment and is highly recommended. Requests pardon to remove stigma of conviction for son's sake, regain civil rights and help reestablish favorable public image. Former parole officer highly recommends. United States Attorney made no recommendation. Sentencing judge has no objection to pardon.

Sir:

This petitioner was convicted in the United States District Court for the Western District of Washington of the attempted evasion of personal income taxes and of causing false information tax returns to be filed for a union entity and on February 27, 1959, was fined \$10,000 (or a total of \$60,000) and sentenced to concurrent terms of five years' imprisonment on each of the six counts with which he was charged. On February 14, 1962, the Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit reversed the judgment of the District Court on those counts pertaining to the evasion of income taxes and remanded them for retrial and affirmed petitioner's conviction on two counts of directing the preparation and filing of



false information tax returns for a union entity. It subsequently was determined that no purpose would be served by the retrial of the four reversed counts. Thus, petitioner was fined a total of \$20,000, assessed court costs in the amount of \$10,962 and commenced service of five years' imprisonment in June 1962. He paid the fine and costs, was paroled in December 1964 and released from supervision by expiration of sentence in June 1967.

The offenses for which he was ultimately convicted occurred during 1950 and 1952 when petitioner, then in his late fifties and president of Joint Council No. 28 (a nonprofit Teamsters Union building fund in Seattle), caused to be prepared and signed annual exempt organization information tax returns which showed that \$16,500 that was actually spent on petitioner's home in 1950 was spent on buildings and repairs for the joint council and that \$69,900 that was diverted to petitioner's use in 1952 was spent for council purposes. Although petitioner steadfastly denies any knowledge of wrongdoing in connection with the above charges and describes himself as merely the "legal head of the organization," he is not bitter toward the Government and feels that he has benefited from the experience.

Following extensive tax court proceedings, it was determined that petitioner owed \$1,189,963 in taxes, penalties and interest for certain tax years commencing in 1943. Accordingly, a tax court judgment was entered December 20, 1971, and settlement agreements were executed to guarantee full payment by petitioner and his deceased wife's estate of the above civil liability over a five-year period.

Petitioner was convicted in 1957 of grand larceny by embezzlement in King County, Washington, and was sentenced to 15 years' imprisonment. Although the conviction was upheld on appeal, petitioner was granted a pardon by the Governor of Washington in 1965 before he had served any portion of the sentence. Indicted in June 1959 in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York for unlawfully receiving money from employers while a representative of the employees in such industry, petitioner was found not guilty in November 1962.

Born in 1894 in California, petitioner lives with his second wife, whom he married in 1967. They live in a Seattle apartment that petitioner has rented since his release from prison in 1964. His first wife died in 1961

and their only son, David Beck, Jr., is in his mid fifties. A retired president of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters since 1958, petitioner receives a \$50,000 annual life-time pension, \$25,000 in annual rent from Seattle property leased to a nationwide motel chain for fifty years and derives other income from the purchase and sale of his property for himself and his deceased wife's estate. He estimates his net worth at \$1,700,000 and maintains a satisfactory credit standing.

Several family physicians and associates who are familiar with petitioner advise that he and his wife are in ill health. One physician who has treated petitioner for many years states that he presently has heart and diabetic conditions, kidney stones, hypertension and a degenerative disc disease of the lumbar spine. Despite his poor health and advanced age he has participated for many years in numerous civic and charitable activities, particularly in the Seattle area. A World War I veteran, he has been a member of the American Legion since 1919 and is a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He has helped raise large amounts of money to pay church mortgages, is a past president of the Elks Club in Seattle, a past chairman of

the Seattle Civil Service Commission and a former member of the Board of Regents of the University of Washington.

His many references, including numerous leading Seattle citizens, praise petitioner for his many civic contributions, indicate he has led a model life since 1964 and recommend him highly for a pardon. They indicate he still enjoys a good reputation among union officials and Seattle area employers and that his associates appear to be of high moral character. The manager of his apartment building describes petitioner and his wife as ideal tenants who pay their bills on time and maintain a very orderly, quiet life.

His former parole officer describes petitioner as a completely honest and forthright gentleman who adhered completely and wholeheartedly to the conditions of his parole. Accordingly, he strongly recommends that he be granted a pardon.

The Internal Revenue Service advises that petitioner and his late wife's estate are current in making the installment payments required by the 1971 agreement to satisfy all tax obligations for the conviction and post-conviction years. While the Internal Revenue Service advises that \$35,366 in additional taxes and

penalties are owing on individual tax returns filed by petitioner and his wife for the years 1962 through 1968, the issues which will be litigated involve the deductibility of legal expenses and estate losses and do not involve fraud.

The United States Attorney made no recommendation concerning disposition of the petition. Noting that petitioner was a model prisoner and has participated in worthy community activities since his release, the sentencing judge states that he has "no objection whatever to his pardon and will be pleased to learn that [he] may spend the remainder of his life in full enjoyment of ... citizenship."

Now 80, this petitioner requests a pardon to relieve the stigma of his conviction for his son's sake, as an aid in the restoration of his civil rights and to permit him to reestablish a favorable public image, thus facilitating increased involvement in civic activities. In the decade that has elapsed since his release from prison petitioner has not engaged in any union activity and has led a law-abiding, productive,

civic-minded and worthy life. While a substantial tax liability remains outstanding, the Internal Revenue Service advises that there is ample real estate to guarantee its full payment in accordance with the settlement agreements. Considering petitioner's age, health and rehabilitation there is no reason to believe that he again will engage in any illegal activity and, in my opinion, his exemplary post-conviction conduct and reputation justify his forgiveness at this time. Accordingly, I advise you to grant him a pardon.

You inquired of the status of a petition for Executive clemency filed with the U.S. Pardon Attorney by Roach Brown.

On September 19, 1974, the Pardon Attorney reactivated Mr. Brown's first petition which had been denied on November 5, 1971. Presently, this case is under active consideration and it is contemplated that a recommendation will be made to the President in September 1975. Based on his findings to date, the Pardon Attorney is inclined to recommend to the Attorney General that Brown's sentence be commuted from life imprisonment to thirty (30) years. This proposed action, if accepted by the Attorney General and the President, would make Brown immediately eligible for parole by the District of Columbia Parole Board.

It is true that the Fardon Attorney's office is taking longer than usual to process it is case. Larry Traylor explains this, in part, by noting that Brown is on a furlough program from Lorton and already has a certain degree of freedom. Thus, Brown's case has not been a top priority. Regardless of the merit of this explanation, it is clear that consideration of this case will be concluded shortly.

The President has granted Executive elemency in the form of pardons or commutations of sentence to sixty-five persons who had been convicted of federal offenses. Their cases are not part of the elemency program for draft evaders and military deserters.

Among these persons was Rhosier "Reach" T. Brown, Jr., of Washington, D. C., whose life sentence was commuted to 30 years' imprisonment, thus making him immediately eligible for parele consideration by the U.S. Parole Board. This case has gained prominence because of the extraordinary contributions which he has made to the Washington community. Convicted of 1st degree murder in 1965, Roach Brown has received numerous furloughs into the community and has made a significant contribution in fields of counseling, drama, and television. Presently on indefinite furlough, he resides in a half-way house and is gainfally employed as the producer of a black-oriented television news program.

The majority of his leisure time centers around involvement with the D.C. Black Repertory Company and Inner Voices. He teaches drama to inner city youths. He is the founder and a director of Inner Voices, which consists of inmates of Lorton Refermatory who give performances across the country designed to inform the public concerning problems of drug abuse and inmate rehabilitation. He also has written plays and has received offers to teach drama and write a documentary focusing on prison life and participate in a television series.
