A three day meeting of the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations will begin on Thursday, February 20.

The President has decided to appoint (Senate confirmation not required) the following individuals to this panel:

John H. Altorfer, of Peoria, Illinois. He succeeds Howard H. Callaway.

James T. Lynn, Director of the Office of Management and Budget. He succeeds George P. Shultz.

Governor Richard F. Kneip, of Salem, South Dakota. This is a reappointment.

Governor Philip W. Noel, of Warwick, Rhode Island. He succeeds Dale Bumpers who has resigned.

Robert P. Knowles, of Richmond, Wisconsin, State Senator of Wisconsin. This is a <u>reappointment</u>.

Full field FBI clearances are traditionally required for these appointments.

It would be advisable that the two reappointees and three new appointees attend the meetings. The program this year consists of 350 participants in plenary and round-table discussions. There will be no classified information presented or discussed as most of the participants are members of the public. Essentially, the meetings are a discussion of the theoretic role of the various levels of government with certain case studies. These appointments are for two years and the future effective performance of these members would be greatly enhanced by their attendance at these sessions.

As an announcement to the Press was made on February 18, I recommend your approval of a waiver of clearances as a precondition to Presidential signature commissioning the above individuals. The clearance procedure would go forward in any event.

Irving M. Pollack, former Director of the Division of Enforcement, took the oath of office on February 13, 1974 as a member of the Securities and Exchange Commission. He was sworn in by his brother, Harry Pollack, former Director of Personnel who retired from the Commission in 1973 after a career spanning 37 years. Mr. Pollack succeeds to the vacancy created by the resignation of Hugh F. Owens, who became Chairman of the Securities Investor Protection Corporation in December, 1973. He becomes the third member of the present Commission to have previously served on the staff of the SEC. Both Chairman Ray Garrett, Jr., and Philip A. Loomis, Jr. have held staff positions.

A career employee, Mr. Pollack became Director of the Division of Enforcement in August, 1972 when the SEC's divisions were organized. He had been Director of the Division of Trading and Markets since August, 1965, and previously served as Associate Director since October, 1961. In 1967 Mr. Pollack was awarded the SEC Distinguished Service Award for Outstanding Career Service and in 1968 he was a co-recipient of the Rockefeller Public Service Award in the field of law, legislation and regulation.

Mr. Pollack joined the staff of the Commission's General Counsel in October 1946. He was promoted from time to time to progressively more responsible positions in that office and in 1956 became an Assistant General Counsel. Owens, who has been Chairman of the Board of the Securities Investor Protection Corporation since November 23, 1973.

Mr. Pollack has been on the staff of the Securities and Exchange Commission since 1946 and has been Director of the Division of Enforcement since September 1972. He had previously served as an attorney with the Office of the Solicitor (1946-48), attorney-adviser with the Office of the General Counsel (1948-57), Assistant General Counsel (1957-61), Associate Director of the Division of Trading and Markets (1961-65) and Director of the Division of Trading and Markets (1965-72).

He was born on April 8, 1918, in Brooklyn, New York. Mr. Pollack received his B.A. degree, cum laude, from Brooklyn College in 1938 and his LL.B., magna cum laude, from Brooklyn Law School in 1942. After serving from 1942 to 1946 as an officer in the U.S. Army, he was an attorney with the New York law firm of Nathan L. Goldstein during 1946.

Mr. Pollack was the 1968 recipient of the Rockefeller Public Service Award in the field of law, legislation or regulation, and the 1967 SEC Distinguished Service Award for outstanding career service. He is a member of the Federal Bar Association.

#### COMMISSIONER ABBOTT WASHBURN

Abbott Washburn, former deputy director of the United States Information Agency and special consultant to the director of the Office of Telecommunications Policy, was sworn in July 10, 1974, as a member of the Federal Communications Commission, to fill the unexpired term of H. Rex Lee. (Commissioner Lee resigned in December of 1973, eighteen months prior to the expiration of his term.)

Commissioner Washburn was born in Duluth, Minn., on March 1, 1915, and was graduated cum laude from Harvard in 1937. He spent 13 years with General Mills, Inc., with three years out for service in the U.S. Navy during World War II, and was director of public services of the company when he became executive vice chairman of the Crusade for Freedom, an arm of Radio Free Europe, in 1950.

Washburn worked on the Eisenhower Presidential campaign in 1952 and served on the White House staff until the President appointed him deputy director of the U.S. Information Agency in late 1953. He received the Agency's Distinguished Service Award for his work on the 1959 American National Exhibition in Moscow, site of the "kitchen debate" between Richard Nixon and Nikita Khrushchev. At President Kennedy's request, he served as Acting Director of the USIA until the confirmation of Edward R. Murrow in March 1961.

He then became vice president for international operations of Carl Byoir Associates, Inc. and in 1962 formed his own international public affairs counselling firm of Washburn, Stringer Associates, Inc.

In 1969 he was appointed deputy chairman of the U.S. delegation to the INTELSAT Conference on definitive arrangements for the global communications satellite system. Following the resignation of William Scranton as chairman, President Nixon appointed Washburn chairman of the U.S. delegation with the personal rank of Ambassador. The delegates to the 79-nation negotiating Conference elected him overall chairman of the Conference.

In 1971, with the signing of the INTELSAT agreement, Washburn left the Department of State and became associated with the White House Office of Telecommunications Policy as special consultant to the director.

He is married, the father of two sons and a daughter, and makes his home in the District of Columbia.

I have reviewed the information which is available to us at this time on Jones, Pollack and Washburn and recommend that you sign the waivers which have been requested.

The security on Jones and Washburn is all but completed and contains no derogatory information. Pollack has a current full field which the FBI advises is generally favorable and raises no substantial problems.

With respect to our conflicts review, the following is relevant:

- (1) Pollack has not yet filed any information. However, he is a career civil servant who has been with the SEC since 1946 and therefore I see little risk in this regard.
- (2) Washburn is clear.
- (3) When Sid Jones originally came into government he established a blind trust. Sometime after his appointment to his current position as Counselor to the Secretary of the Treasury he was advised that there was no need to maintain the blind trust. Unfortunately, he has been operating in his current capacity while holding small blocks of certain oil and diversified issues. We have advised him to reestablish the blind trust covering these stockholdings prior to any hearing on his nomination and he has agreed. Although this could be a potential source for embarrassment, I do not believe that it is significant enough to warrant any adverse action on his nomination.

At thirty-five, Dr. William S. Banowsky is one of the nation's youngest campus chief executives. After joining the Pepperdine faculty in 1959, he held posts as Dean of Students, Executive Vice President, and Chancellor of the University's new Malibu campus, before being named President of the University in February 1971. He administers the University's \$10,000,000 annual operations on its four campuses at Malibu, Los Angeles, Orange County (Law School) and Heidelberg, Germany.

His academic training, in the field of Communications, includes the B.A. degree from David Lipscomb College in Tennessee, where he attended on a baseball scholarship and became student body president. He also holds the M.A. degree from the University of New Mexico. At the age of twenty-six he received his Ph.D. in Communications from the University of Southern California. His doctoral dissertation has been published in book form under the title, The Mirror of a Movement.

Because of his age--which bridges the so-called generation gap-and his talents as a speaker and writer, Dr. Banowsky is one of those rare leaders who communicates convincingly with both the "Establishment" and the student generation. For instance, during the same week he will address Pepperdine University's 2,600 students in the opening convocation, and keynote the annual Arizona Bankers' Association Convention at Phoenix.

Because of his reputation as a lecturer and writer, and his ability to communicate with students, he presents a regular weekly commentary on current affairs. He has been asked by NBC-TV to begin January 1972 his own prime-time, half-hour television program. His style and academic training allow him to present the economic and ethical values of the American system in the most attractive possible light, and in a manner which appeals to young people. For instance, his most recent book in the field of contemporary ethics, It's a Playboy World, which grew out of widely publicized debates with Hugh Hefner and the late Bishop James Pike, is a best seller in campus bookstores across the country.

His foreign speaking tours include trips to the Orient in 1960, to Western Europe in 1964, to the Middle East in 1966, to South America in 1968, and to Russia in 1969. Because of his expertise and academic training in communications, the United States Information Agency recently named him to lead this spring a special inspection tour of its activities in the Congo.

Dr. Banowsky has been appointed by the White House to the National Task Force on Spiritual Well Being. He is a member of the Los Angeles County Judicial Reviews Commission, a member of the Board of the World Trade Libraries in San Francisco, and is a director of the Center for International Business in Los Angeles. He is a member of the California Club and the Los Angeles Rotary Club. He has served as a director of the YMCA, Goodwill Industries of America, and the American Red Cross.

Dr. Banowsky was named one of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce's Outstanding Young Men of America in 1964. He was the 1966 recipient of the Liberty Bell Award by the American Bar Association, and a 1968 winner of the George Washington Medal from Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge. He has also been honored by the Los Angeles Philanthropic Foundation, and is listed in Who's Who Among American College and University Administrators.

With all of his other duties, President Banowsky is making educational history by directing the establishment of the exciting new 450-acre Pepperdine campus at Malibu. During the past three years, in a climate of financial crisis for American higher education, Dr. Banowsky has taken the lead in raising \$27,000,000 to construct the Malibu campus. It opens with 1,000 sindents in September 1972. As a result of his fund raising ability, donors of the first buildings include Mr. Leonard Firestone; Mr. Richard Mellon Scaife of Pittsburgh, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Payson (owners of he New York Mets); Mr. Clint Murchison of Dallas; Mrs. John Stauffer; Mrs. Frank Stauffer; Mrs. Frank Roger Seaver; Mr. John Tyler; Mr. Fritz Huntsinger; Mr. Morris Pendleton; and Mr. George Elkins.

Ms. Carmen Rosa Maymi was appointed by the President as Director of the Women's Bureau on 9 May 1973 and confirmed by the U. S. Senate in June 1973. Born in Santurce, Puerto Rico, on 17 March 1938, Ms. Kaymi is the highest ranking Hispanic women in the Federal Government. She earned her bachelor's degree in Spanish and master's degree in education from DePaul University in Chicago and did graduate work at the University of Chicago Graduate School.

In her present position, Ms. Maymi is responsible for formulating policies and developing standards to promote the welfare of wage-earning women and to improve their economic, legal, and social status, as well as to coordinate the interests of the Women's Bureau within the Department of Labor, as well as other Federal agencies and state and local governments.

The Director travels extensively, within the United States and atroad, to provide leadership and to establish linkages for cooperative programs with private organizations, such as women's organizations, union groups, industry and minority organizations, interested in promoting the full utilization of the potential of women. She participates in programs and serves as liaison with the Department of State and other Government agencies regarding the status of women at the international level. This includes providing reports, position papers, and materials on the status of women to the Unted Nations' Commission on the Status of Women, the International Labour Organisation, and other specialized todies of the United Nations.

Ms. Maymi is the U. S. expert on a joint study between the U. S. Department of Labor and the Ministry of Labor of Japan on the role and status of women in the labor force. She presented a position paper on the actual state of the protection of human rights of women in the Interamerican system at the First Interamerican Seminar on Human Rights in Puerto Rico. Ms. Maymi, at the request of the Department of State, was named the official representative of the U. S. at the Seminar on National Machinery to Accelerate Integration of Women in Development and to Eliminate Sex Discrimination on Grounds of Sex, at which time a paper was presented on the role of national women's commissions, bureaus and similar budies. She has traveled to a number of countries under the sponsorship of the United States Information Agency, to promote the objectives of International Women's Year, the establishment and strengthening of women's bureaus and commissions on the status of women abroad, and advancing opportunities and progress for women. She frequently briefs foreign government officials and civic leaders on the functions and services of the Women's Bureau and the status of women in the United States.

On a national level, the Director has designed programs and developed models to illustrate the legal, economic and social status of women; directs research and analysis relating to women's employment and employability as well as economic practices affecting women; directs legal research on existing and proposed federal and state laws impacting on the status of women; directs the preparation of publications of the Bureau to advise the public of laws, rights and the status of women. In addition, Ms. Maymi directs outreach programs designed to reach special target groups, such as women offenders, trade union women, youth, minority and voluntary organizations, and commissions on the status of women.

Ms. Maymi began her career as an employment counselor with the Migration Division of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico in Chicago, Illinois, followed by a position as Assistant Director of an Urban Progress Center of the Chicago Committee on Urban Opportunity, and later as Urban Program Unit Director. She entered Federal Service in 1966 as a Community Services Specialist of the Office of Economic Opportunity. She left federal service for a period to be project director of two federal contracts dealing with model housing and service to Indian reservations and migrant porgrams. She returned to the Federal Government to do a study on the "Economic Opportunity of Spanish Speaking in the 1970's" for the President's Cabinet Committee on Opportunities for the Spanish Speaking People for submission to the Committee on Economic Discrimination of the Domestic Council. She joined the Women's Bureau in May 1972 as a consultant and was subsequently named Associate Director.

Ambassador Moynihan and Acting Secretary Ingersoll recommend Scherer for this position (Tab A).

This memorandum also seeks your approval of Mr. Scherer to serve as an Alternate Representative to the U. S. Delegation to the U. N. General Assembly and to the special session of the General Assembly beginning on September 2, 1975, immediately prior to the regular General Assembly sessions.

Scherer, 59, is a Foreign Service Officer Career Minister who, since 1972 has served as the Ambassador to the Czechoslovak Socialist Republic. From 1970-1972 he was the Ambassador to the Republic of Guinea. He served as Ambassador to Togo and concurrently served as Ambassador to Equatorial Guinea from 1967-1969. He was a Senior Foreign Service Inspector for the Year, 1966-1967 and from 1961-1966 was the Deputy Chief of Mission in Warsaw, Poland. He graduated from Yale University with an A. B. degree in 1938 and received an LL. B. from Harvard University in 1941. A copy of his career profile is attached for your review at Tab B.

This memorandum also seeks your approval of Mr. Myerson to serve as an Alternate Representative to the U. S. Delegation to the U. N. General Assembly and to the special session of the General Assembly beginning on September 2, 1975, immediately prior to the regular General Assembly sessions.

Myerson, 49, is a career Foreign Service Officer (FSO-1) who since 1968 has been stationed in Brussels with the U. S. Mission to the European Communities (USEC), first as an Economic and Commercial Officer and subsequently as Deputy Chief of Mission. He was also Counselor of Mission to the U. S. Mission to NATO (1968-1970). From 1966-1968 he was in the State Department's European Division as a Supervisory International Relations Officer to NATO and Atlantic Political-Military Affairs. For the year, 1965-1966, he was Special Assistant to the Under Secretary. For five years before this (1960-1965) he was in Brussels with the USEC as Chief of the Political Section. He received his B.
