

Something exceedingly good for the country may be happening in Washington.

The Congress may be turning away from confrontation with the President to cooperation with him.

This is a development fervently to be desired, because it is the spirit of confrontation exhibited by the Congress which has produced stalemate of late in this country-far more so than any actions taken by the so-called Watergate Committee.

There is a burning need at present to put partisanship behind us and to dedicate ourselves to the welfare of all the people.

There is a need, too, for honesty and accuracy on the part of the news media if this country is to move forward.

It was not helpful, for instance, for the gentlemen of the press to quote the President as saying Congress's record to date has been "very disappointing" when the President was talking only about Congress's handling of Administration legislation.

The press created a new basis for hostility between the President and the Congress by its treatment of the President's press conference remarks of Sept. 5 when in actuality the President was simply holding out an olive branch and a challenge to the Congress.

The Congress <u>does</u> have a respectable record to date—except on Presidential initiatives. The President cited this record in his State of the Union Message of Sept. 10. He noted that the Congress has enacted a new-approach farm bill, a ground-breaking Federal highway bill, an increase in Social Security benefits, airport development legislation, amendments to the Rural Electrification Act, the Economic Development Administration and the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration authorizations, an Older Americans bill, an emergency farm loan bill, a national cemeteries bill, and a medical care bill for veterans.

He also pointed out, however--and every word he spoke hit the mark--that be Congress has much to do before it adjourns if it is to write a truly outstanding

legislative record this year. At the thing he President pledged to work closely with members of Congress to reach the compromises which must be hammered out if major legislation is to become law.

It does not detract from congressional accomplishments to date to emphasize that much remains to be done.

Our first goal must be a balanced budget. This is the major contribution that Congress can make toward the fight against inflation. Every dollar of deficit spending weakens us in the anti-inflation fight. Yet Congress has already enacted programs which would exceed the President's budget by \$2 billion and is considering additional legislation which would add another \$4 billion in deficit spending in passed.

Some members of Congress would pad domestic spending and chop the defense budget to make up for it. I am adamantly opposed to slashing defense spending. I will support judicious cuts in military outlays, but to take a meat-axe to the defense budget is to endanger our national security. It would profit us not at all to expand our human resource programs if at the same time we exposed our nation's heart to a fatal thrust.

We must keep our nation militarily strong and we must strengthen our economy. And to build the sinews of our economy we must pass sound trade reform legislation, impose controls on exports of food and other products where necessary, and provide authority for selling those materials in our national stockpile which are no longer needed for national security. Tax reform is another concern—a concern which demands that we provide older Americans with property tax relief.

Another matter of top priority is the energy crisis. We must act swiftly to get the Alaskan pipeline project moving, pass legislation to facilitate construction of deepwater ports capable of off-loading large oil tankers, deregulate natural gas, lay down reclamation standards which make possible expanded coal mining, and reorganize the Federal energy effort under a new, independent Energy Research and Development Administration. We must also encourage the establishment of nuclear power plants by streamlining power plant siting procedures while fully protecting the public safety and environment.

Human resource needs demand our attention. There must be fresh new approaches to problems in the fields of education, housing, welfare administration, manpower training, pensions and health care.

The Administration's proposals in these areas are worthy of the closest possible scrutiny and should not be ignored. They hold the promise of progress toward better schools and better communities. They are building blocks in the fashioning of a better America. Congress would do well to work with the Administration in the human resource areas—and abandon the tactics of confrontation which sullied its performance earlier this year.

It is a pleasure and a privilege for me to be here this evening as part of this tribute to a great Member of the Congress -- my good friend and valued colleague, Glenn Davis.

All of you know what a fine fellow Glenn is. That's why you are here tonight. But some of you probably do not realize that he is also a real collector's item. Glenn is one of the few men still in the Congress who came to Washington before I did. He was elected in a special election in 1947; I was elected in 1948. So our friendship goes back a quarter of a century, and it existed even while Glenn was on a sabbatical leave from Congress from 1957 to 1965. While Glenn was back in Waukesha taking a breathing spell and practicing law, I was still toiling in the Washington salt mines.

We all missed him in Washington during that period and his re-election in 1964 was one of the few bright spots in a gloomy year for Republicans. He has been with us ever since, and judging from the enthusiasm and affection of this crowd tonight, he is going to be with us for a long time to come.

And that is something that all of us -- not just you lucky people in the 9th Congressional District -- can be thankful for. Because if there ever was a time when we needed strong, honest men of integrity in Washington -- men like Glenn Davis -- that time is now.

The Ship of State has been sailing through some very choppy waters over the past few months. A lot of wild accusations have been made, a lot of grave questions have been raised, and dark clouds of uncertainty have now gathered over the American political system.

It is going to take the best in all of us to overcome this. It is going to take a spirit of candor and conciliation on the part of the Congress, the President and the people.

It won't be easy -- but I know it <u>is</u> possible. We can and must succeed.

Together we must restore calm and confidence to the American political system. Together we must restore faith in the character and integrity of public servants. We must reunite this great Nation of ours.

We will have our share of problems along the way. Anyone who reads the daily papers and watches the evening news doesn't need to worry about losing track of them.

But there have also been some very important developments -- developments that some of us may have overlooked in the midst of so many panic headlines and so many dramatic incidents.

It is to some of the positive accomplishments of recent months that I would like to address myself this evening -- and to some of the factual and spiritual assets that we as a people have in our corner.

First and foremost, we have an America at peace. Thanks to the skill and courage of President Nixon and his foreign policy team, we are out of Vietnam and on the high road to a generation of peace -- the first generation of peace in America's long history.

If the current crisis in the Middle East can be resolved on terms that are fair to all parties -- a goal that President Nixon is pursuing with great skill and determination -- our chances for lasting world peace should be greater than at any time since the end of the Napoleonic wars some 150 years ago. This is the best possible foundation for us to start building on.

Secondly, we have an economy that is fundamentally strong and bountiful. We are experiencing problems with inflation, but we should not let them disguise the fact that we have more people working today at higher wages than ever before. If we can conquer the forces of inflation, and I am confident that we will, we can enjoy the full fruits of the greatest prosperity that man has ever known.

Thirdly, we have a responsible, informed public. The American people have better access to the facts and figures of government than any other people in the world. And we know from past experience that a free and infomed American people, time and again, will make the right decision and follow the right course.

Finally, I am convinced that we have a responsible majority of Republicans and Democrats in the Senate and the House of Representatives who, in the crucial weeks ahead, are going to put their country and their principles ahead of any narrow partisan considerations.

For twenty-five years I have lived my life as a Member of the Congress. It has been my privilege to learn to know and love that institution and its people, and to trust in its collective wisdom whenever grave issues have had to be resolved.

I have seen the Congress work with five different Presidents of the United States in countless crises -- the Korean War, Lebanon, the Bay of Pigs, the Cuban missile crisis, the Middle East, Laos and Cambodia -- to name just a few. And in each case, when it came to the crunch, a bipartisan majority pulled together. The American system worked then and it is going to work now.

I have known and respected Richard Nixon for as long as I have served in the Congress. As a freshman Congressman I knew Dick Nixon -- then in his second term in the Congress -- young, enthusiastic, extremely able, and full of idealism.

I knew him as Gen. Eisenhower's Vice President. He was a man that Ike trusted and respected and who, during Ike's illnesses, proved that he had the strength and the stability to handle the responsibilities of the Presidency.

For the past five years, I have had the privilege of working closely with President Nixon during one of the most trying periods of American history -- a period when he led us from a long and bloody war to peace with honor; a period when he led us from riot and anarchy at home to tranquility and to prosperity without war.

I have not forgotten how much Richard Nixon has done for America -- and I don't think the American people will, either.

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But the question remains. Where do we go from here? What do we do now to part the clouds over Washington and to restore faith in our political system and leadership in the wake of Watergate?

We have already begun. The President's decision to turn the tapes over to the courts is proof of his good intentions. Once the evidence in the tapes is known, we will also have proof of what President Nixon has told us all along -- that he is innocent.

That may not be enough to satisfy the sensationalists who thrive on controversy and are more interested in turmoil than they are in binding up the Nation's wounds.

But it is everything that any fair-minded man or woman could ask for. Let us know the facts and let the facts speak for themselves. The facts will exonerate Richard Nixon.

In the long run, the reasonable majority will render a fair decision in this matter. This will be reflected in the Congress and, most important of all, in the hearts of the American people.

I am singularly proud and honored to have been called on to serve my President and my country in a new capacity at this crucial time. I have faith in both of them.

I believe in America and I believe in Richard Nixon.

And as Vice President I intend to serve them both with every ounce of strength and ability I have at my command.

Today we are faced with a crisis in the Mideast.

In 1941, during another great international crisis -- a crisis that called the very survival of the free world into question -- Winston Churchill spoke some eloquent words that I think bear repeating today when there is so much talk of darkness and despondency.

"Do not let us speak of darker days," he said, "let us speak rather of sterner days. These are great days -- the greatest days our country has ever lived; and we must all thank

God that we have been allowed, each of us according to our stations, to play a part in making these days memorable in the history of our race."

I say to you that these, too, are not darker days. They are days of enormous challenge, but they are also days of immense potential greatness.

We are on the threshold of a generation of peace. And this is a time when our people and our government can achieve greatness in fields like the economy, the environment, and the whole spectrum of vital issues. Let us now join together to restore confidence and trust. If we do this, then we will have made these troubled times a time of greatness that future generations of Americans will thank us for.
