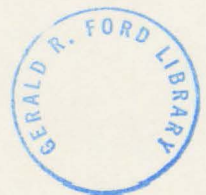

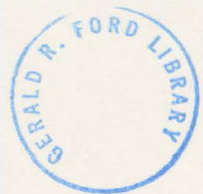

It is a pleasure to join with you at the youth scholarship program created by the William Randolph Hearst Foundation. I came not only because of Senate Resolution 324 which officially authorizes this unique undertaking but also out of my personal identification with your aims.

You have gathered here at the United States Capitol from the 50 states in your capacities as elected student body leaders. You came to learn more about the processes of our republic. You came to learn about how we -- as a free people -- govern ourselves. You came to the right place.

In the process of learning, we sometimes learn something unexpected -- and very valuable -- about ourselves.

When I was a young man I worked in the Presidential campaign of the late Wendell Willkie. He was an idealist who was ahead of his times. Wendell Willkie unfortunately lost the election.

I was very sad at the time because so many people had rejected my belief that Wendell Willkie should be President. A vast majority did not vote the way I felt they should have voted.

In retrospect, I now realize that my participation did not make much difference at all to the political fate of Wendell Willkie. But it made a lot of difference to me. By participating, I learned. Not only did I learn a little about politics, I learned something more important -- I learned about myself.

I learned that I could take part on the losing side -- and even be wiped out in the polls -- yet still survive. I learned that you could lose the ball and lose the game but nevertheless still go back to another contest -- in another season -- and win.

I learned that it was fun to be part of the dynamic process of politics. Participating made me feel more alive. I believe in

our country and I am thrilled to be able to serve it. But let me state as openly and honestly as I can that, as my children would say, I am "turned on" by personal involvement in the democratic process. I find that the more energy I devote to my role in Government, the more energy I have to give. Being Vice President is a far-out experience.

I now look back on the Willkie campaign with nostalgia and gratitude. It was a vital part of my education about myself. I learned lessons through actual experience that I could not have learned in school.

Yes, I learned some lessons -- but I did not learn enough. Learning is an on-going process.

In my service as Vice President, I am learning something new every day. I am learning how little I know about some things. But I am also learning that a person, regardless of age, can change and seek to continue his growth as an individual. I never expected to be Vice President. But now that I find myself in that office, I can truthfully say that it is an exciting experience -- because it is a challenging experience.

The high office that I hold is not the most important thing in my life. This is a great responsibility and a glorious privilege. And I love the political life. But the most important accomplishment of my life, as I see it, is being the husband of my wife and the father of my children.

If I am sometimes tempted to get too carried away in this great Office of the Vice Presidency, I can always go home and bring myself back to a different perspective.

And so it is that I want to say a few words to you today about different perspectives. About different states of consciousness. About different ways of seeing things.

Some people contend that in politics, as in football, a good offense is the best defense. It is easier to attack and blame the other guy than to propose viable alternatives. It is a simple matter to seek scapegoats and to blame all our problems on individuals and institutions. It is a far different matter to reconcile differences,

to moderate, to conciliate, and to bring peace out of chaos so that a self-governing community can function.

I admired Wendell Willkie because he was a peacemaker. To a degree, I adopted Wendell Willkie as a model.

Next week we celebrate the birthday of Abraham Lincoln. When Lincoln was a young man, he did not have the right image for politics. Today's sophisticated campaign managers would have regarded him as odd. He was too tall, too awkward, too homely. His face might not have showed up properly on the television screen.

Today we see Abraham Lincoln as a beautiful person. We think of his heart and his head. We think of the living proof he offered that one person can make a difference.

When I reflect on Abraham Lincoln, I am moved by his efforts to bring together a country torn by dissent. He waged a war but he had no choice. His deeper instincts were those of conciliator, mediator, and moderator. He tried to reconcile people's differences.

Abraham Lincoln would have been very proud of the work of the man President Nixon chose as Secretary of State, Dr. Henry Kissinger. In Henry Kissinger we find another man who has had a remarkable influence on human coexistence.

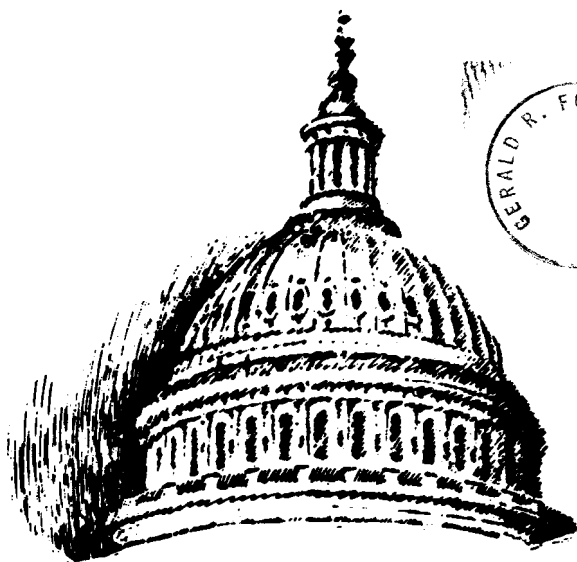
Henry Kissinger came to us from a foreign country with a foreign accent. But he became attracted to the processes of government and sought to make a contribution. His genius was recognized. A superb conciliator, Henry Kissinger brings frightened and angry people together. He stops wars. He makes peace.

It is important to remember that President Nixon established the policies that Secretary Kissinger implements. In Vietnam and the Middle East, Secretary Kissinger harvested a crop of peace in the climate created by President Nixon's historic initiatives in visiting Moscow and Peking and from the understandings reached there and in subsequent exchanges. This is the climate that flows from the President's extrication of the United States from the war in Vietnam, his termination of the draft, and his determination to settle foreign disputes by negotiation rather than violence.

It All Started This Way

In 1961, at a luncheon, the late Senator Andrew Schoeppel (R-Kan.) suggested that politically-minded high-school students should have an opportunity to come to Washington to see first-hand the workings of our Federal Government and, in particular, the United States Senate.

Senator Thomas H. Kuchel (R-Calif.) took the initiative after the untimely death of Senator Schoeppel and prepared a resolution that was submitted to the Rules Committee in April, 1962.

At that time, the resolution, known as SR324, was signed by Senator Mike Mansfield, Majority Leader, (D-Mont.), Senator Everett M. Dirksen, Minority Leader, (R-Ill.), Senator Hubert H. Humphrey, Majority Whip, (D-Minn.) and Senator Thomas H. Kuchel, Minority Whip, (R-Calif.). It was then passed by the Rules Committee, and, in turn, voted for unanimously by the United States Senate. This same resolution has been unanimously approved by the Senate every year for the past twelve years,

It reads as follows:

Whereas the continued vitality of our Republic depends, in part, on the intelligent understanding of our political processes and the functioning of our National Government by the citizens of the United States; and

Whereas the durability of a constitutional democracy is dependent upon alert, talented, vigorous competition for political leadership; and

Whereas individual Senators have cooperated with various private and university under-graduate and graduate fellowship and internship programs relating to the work of Congress; and

Whereas in the high schools of the United States, there exists among students who have been elected to student-body offices in their junior or senior year a potential reservoir of young citizens who are experiencing their first responsibilities of service to a constituency and who should be encouraged to deepen their interest in and understanding of their country's political processes; Now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Senate hereby expresses its willingness to cooperate in a nationwide competitive high school Senate youth program which would give two representative high school students from each State a short indoctrination into the operation of the United States Senate and the Federal Government generally, if such a program can be satisfactorily arranged and completely supported by private funds with no expense to the Federal Government.

SEC. 2 The Senate Committee on Rules and Administration shall investigate the possibility of establishing such a program and if the committee determines such a program is possible and advisable, it shall make the necessary arrangements to establish the program.

For the past twelve years, the Trustees of the William Randolph Hearst Foundation have approved a grant in order to make this program possible.

This book summarizes the activities of the 11th annual United States Senate Youth Program which was held in Washington, D.C. from February 3 to February 10, 1973. 102 student delegates, two from each state and the District of Columbia, were provided a week's internship of the federal government and, in particular, the United States Senate. Each also was awarded a \$1,000 scholarship. The program and scholarships are made possible through grants from the William Randolph Hearst Foundation.

It All Started This Way:

Senate Resolution 324, submitted by Mr. Thomas H. Kuchel, former U.S. Senator, (for himself and Senators Mike Mansfield, the late Everett M. Dirksen, and Hubert H. Humphrey), was received, referred to the Committee on Rules and Administration, and, under the rule, ordered to be printed in the Record, as follows:

Whereas in the high schools of the United States, there exists among students who have been elected to student-body offices in their sophomore, junior, or senior year a potential reservoir of young citizens who are experiencing their first responsibilities of service to a constituency and who should be encouraged to deepen their interest in and understanding of their country's political processes: Now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Senate hereby expresses its willingness to cooperate in a nationwide competitive high school Senate youth program which would give several representative high school students from each State a short indoctrination into the operation of the United States Senate and the Federal Government generally, if such a program can be satisfactorily arranged and completely supported by private funds with no expense to the Federal Government.

Sec. 2. The Senate Committee on Rules and Administration shall investigate the possibility of establishing such a program and if the committee determines such a program is possible and advisable, it shall make the necessary arrangements to establish the program.

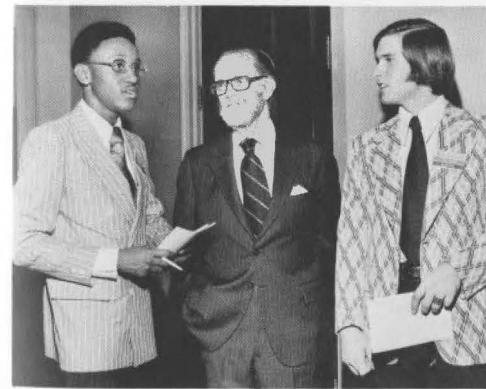

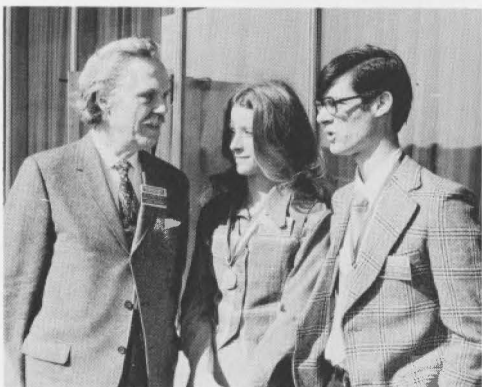

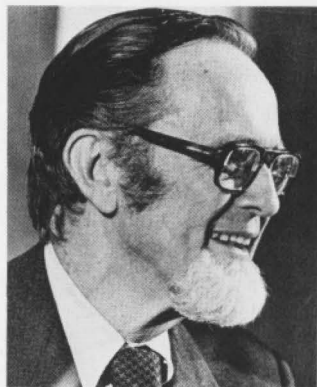

THE PROGRAM

The Senate Youth Program was established by Senate Resolution 324 in 1962 and has been approved in succeeding years by unanimous voice vote of the Senate. It provides elected high school student body officers a week's internship of the United States Senate, and of the Federal government generally.

SELECTION OF STUDENTS

Each fall two students from the 50 states and the District of Columbia are selected from public and private schools by their Chief State School Officers to attend the program in Washington. The manner of selection is the privilege of the individual states. The only requirement is that the delegate must hold an elective office in his high school student body government.

1974 AGENDA

The students arrive in Washington on Saturday, February 2, 1974, and are headquartered at the Mayflower Hotel. Transportation is arranged by United Air Lines.

The attached agenda is arranged by the Senate Advisory Committee and provides a complete list of the speakers who will address the group during the week.

The students will spend a full day in the offices of their respective Senators and briefings will be held at the Departments of State, Justice, Defense and Interior. Special meetings with the Vice President, Cabinet officers, Speaker of the House, a Supreme Court Justice and nine Senators have also been arranged.

SENATE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Vice President Gerald R. Ford, Honorary Chairman. Co-Chairman of the Committee: Senators Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minnesota) and Lowell P. Weicker, Jr. (R-Connecticut). Baker, Jr. (R-Tennessee), William D. Hathaway (D-Maine), and Joseph R. Biden, Jr. (D-Delaware).

Ex-Officio members are: Senators Robert C. Byrd (D-West Virginia), Assistant Majority Leader, and Robert P. Griffin (R-Michigan), Assistant Minority Leader, Randolph A. Hearst, Trustee of the William Randolph Hearst Foundation, and Ira P. Walsh, Director of the Senate Youth Program.

WILLIAM RANDOLPH HEARST FOUNDATION

The program has been made possible since its inception by a grant approved each year by the Trustees of the William Randolph Hearst Foundation. There is no expense to the government. SCHOLARSHIPS

Each delegate will receive a \$1,000 college scholarship, provided that he takes two years of courses in U.S. Government or related subjects. These scholarships are made possible by an additional grant of the William Randolph Hearst Foundation, and, where possible, are presented to the delegates by their Senators.

ESCORT OFFICERS

Young men and women officers of the military services will assist the Senate Advisory Committee in conducting the project.
