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# Ford Lays GOP Losses To Clique At 'CREEP'

Ford forges independent course, 19-A

CLEARWATER — There must be no more "elite guard of adolescents like 'CREEP' in the Republican Party's future," Vice President Gerald R. Ford told a Republican crowd Saturday night.

to support President Nixon's landslide 1972 victory with Republican gains in Congress.

HE SAID that in the future all Republican candidates "should sign an oath not to set up outside committees without the direct approval of the Republican National Committee ....

"If there are any more cliques of ambiticus adolescents who want to run our campaign," Ford said, "let the Democrats have them next time."

An audience of 950 paid from \$25 to \$100 to hear Ford address them in the ballroom of the Harrison Hotel.

Ford faulted CREEP for divorcing the presidential race from the Republican Party so that GOP congressional candidates did not reap the election benefits of the President's long political coat talls.

HE SAID that fullfillment of Democratic predictions that the majority party will gain between 50 and 100 seats in the 1974 election could be "comparable to 1936, when some of the trends developed that had such an adverse impact on our society." He referred to the New Deal legislation passed by overwhelming Democratic congressional majorities during the administration of Franklin D, Roosevelt.

Ford's exhortation for party unity and organization was similar to an address he made earlier Saturday to the Midwestern Republican Conference in Chicago.

After he was introduced by U.S. Rep. C. W. Bill Young, the Pinellas Republican, Ford called Pinellas County the cradle of the resurgence of Republicanism in Florida.

#### Ford Has Kind Words For Bill Young

Vice President Gerald R. Ford took issue Saturday with recent predictions by Senators Mike Mansfield and Charles Percy that there are enough votes to impeach President Nixon, saying that impeachment would be voted only "on a partisan basis or on a peripheral issue."

Ford spoke at a brief press conference at Clearwater-St. Petersburg Airport after his arrival in Clearwater Saturday afternoon. He was greeted by about 60 well wishers at the airport, and joined by Rep. C.W. Bill Young, R-St. Petersburg.

"If the vote (on impeachment) was on the basis of the facts, the charges, and the evidence, I don't think there are enough votes. I don't think there are sufficient grounds for impeachment," he declared.

However, the vote might turn against President Nixon "if it gets off on a partisan basis or on a peripheral issue," Ford said.

Ford avoided taking a position on President Nixon's actions in complying with the House Judiciary Commitee, which is investigating impeachment.

But he said he has encouraged the President to make available as quickly as possible tapes and documents relevant to the committee's inquiry.

"I think that in the final analysis there can and probably will be a compromise that's satisfying to both the commitee and Nixon," he added.

On other issues, Ford disclaimed Watergate-type corruption as a Republican Party responsibility.

He repeated a proposal he offered earlier in the day in Chicago at a con-








GERALD FORD . . Clearwater speaker.

## President's Rumored Visit Brings Denials

• If you've heard rumors President Nixon might visit Pinellas County this weekend, you probably shouldn't get too excited.

Word this morning from the White House is that the President plans to fly to Key Biscayne sometime today, but is not scheduled to visit Pinellas.

Unconfirmed reports in Washington yesterday hinted Nixon might be a surprise replacement for Vice President Gerald R. Ford, who is scheduled to speak Saturday night at a \$500-a-plate Republican fund - raising dinner at Clearwater's Fort Harrison Hotel.

"I'm sure that's just a rumor," said Ford's scheduling secretary this morning.

A spokesman for Rep. C. W. Bill Young's office said the report "has no substance to it."

However, Pinellas Republican Executive Committee Chairman Ed Kiefer wouldn't rule out the possibility of a Nixon visit to replace Ford as the speaker.

"Gerry is making a speech in Chicago Saturday morning and then he flies in here Saturday afternoon. That's a little hard on the man, and it could be true the President would fly in.

"We're all up in the air until we definitely hear from them."

Ford is scheduled to arrive at the St. Petersburg - Clearwater International Airport 2:20 p.m. Saturday. There will be a press conference at the airport at 2:30 p.m., with the dinner set for 7:30 p.m. Ford is expected to speak between 8:30 p.m. and 9 p.m.

Ironically, the Fort Harrison dining room was cited Monday by the Pinellas County Health Department for several sanitation violations. (See story this page.)
