THE UN, of COURSE, HAD ITS FAILURES. BUT IT HAS HAD ITS SHARE OF SUCCESSES AS WELL. AND THE FAILURES HAVE BEEN DUE, AS I MENTIONED EARLIER, TO THE FAILURE OF KEY UN MEMBERS TO LIVE UP TO THE UN CHARTER AND NOT BECAUSE OF ANY INTRINSIC FLAW IN THE UNITED NATIONS CONCEPT.



WHAT ARE THE UN'S SUCCESSES? THEY ARE MANY, AND THEY ARE MOST IMPRESSIVE. FOR EXAMPLE:

PEACE FORCE SENT TO THE MIDDLE EAST TO SECURE THE ISRAELI-EGYPTIAN
CEASE-FIRE AND THE DISENGAGEMENT OF HOSTILE ARMIES. IT WAS THE FIRST
SUCH UN FORCE THAT HAD POSITIVE SUPPORT FROM THE SOVIET UNION, AND THE
FIRST THAT CANNOT BE DISMISSED BY THE SOLE DECISION OF THE HOST COUNTRY.

IT IS A VITAL PIECE IN THE SETTLEMENT WORKED OUT SO MASTERFULLY BY PRESIDENT NIXON AND SECRETARY KISSINGER, WITH THE COOPERATION OF THE SOVIET UNION, AND THE LEADERS OF EGYPT AND ISRAEL. NOW A SIMILAR DISENGAGEMENT HAS BEEN AGREED UPON BY ISRAEL AND SYRIA, AND A UN PEACE-KEEPING FORCE IS PART OF THAT ARRANGEMENT, TQO. A FEW WEEKS AGO IRAN AND IRAQ WERE ABOUT TO ENGAGE IN HOSTILITIES OVER A BORDER DISPUTE. THROUGH THE QUIET WORK OF SECRETARY GENERAL WALDHEIM AND A SPECIAL REPRESENTATIVE WHO WENT TO THE AREA ON A FACT-FINDING MISSION, IRAN AND IRAQ WERE ABLE TO DEFUSE THEIR QUARREL AND TO ENGAGE IN BONA-FIDE BILATERAL NEGOTIATIONS TO RESOLVE THE ISSUES IN DISPUTE. IN MATTERS OF WAR, AS IN MEDICINE, PREVENTION IS BETTER THAN CURE.

--A YEAR AGO THE UN ENVIRONMENT PROGRAM CAME INTO EXISTENCE TO LAUNCH A GLOBAL ATTACK AGAINST POLLUTION OF THE SEAS AND SKILES AND ECOSYSTEMS OF THE WORLD. ITS NEW "EARTHWATCH" SYSTEM WILL ENABLE US FOR THE FIRST TIME TO KNOW WHAT ENVIRONMENTAL DANGERS WE ARE CREATING AND WHAT STEPS ARE NEEDED TO SAFEGUARD THE ENVIRONMENT FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS.



--UN DISASTER RELIEF PROGRAMS, WITH LARGE U.S. SUPPORT, HAVE DONE IMMENSE SERVICE IN THE HUMAN TRAGEDIES OF BANGLADESH AND THE Dont SAHELIAN DROUGHT IN AFRICA.

--THE UN IS HOLDING A WORLD CONFERENCE OF GOVERNMENTS THIS SUMMER ON THE PROBLEM OF THE POPULATION EXPLOSION. MEANWHILE, THE UN FUND FOR POPULATION ACTIVITIES IS NOW BUDGETING \$54 MILLION A YEAR TO ADVISE THOSE GOVERNMENTS WHICH REQUEST HELP ON POPULATION RESEARCH AND FAMILY PLANNING. BY UN DECLARATION, THIS IS WORLD POPULATION YEAR.

WITH THE EMPHASIS BEING GIVEN TO THE POPULATION EXPLOSION, WE NATURALLY FOCUS ON THE RELATED PROBLEM OF WORLD POVERTY. THE WAR ON POVERTY HAS MOVED TO THE FOREFRONT OF THE WORLD'S AGENDA. NO PROBLEM IS MORE IMPORTANT TO MANKIND. THE SOLUTION TO THE PROBLEM OF WORLD POVERTY IS IMMENSELY DIFFICULT, JUST AS A SIMILAR CHALLENGE IS HARD TO OVERCOME IN AMERICA. BUT WE MUST NEVER DESPAIR OF ACHIEVING THAT SOLUTION AT HOME OR WORLDWIDE--BECAUSE IT IS BASIC TO ACHIEVING WORLD PEACE.

THE UNITED NATIONS, WITH STRONG U.S. SUPPORT, HAS VIGOROUSLY

ATTACKED THE PROBLEM OF WORLD POVERTY--THROUGH THE WORLD BANK, THE INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION AND THE UN DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM. RESULTS THUS FAR ARE SPOTTY, BUT WE MUST PERSIST IN OUR EFFORTS.

WE HAVE SEEN SOME DEVELOPING NATIONS, RICH IN PETROLEUM AND OTHER RAW MATERIALS, SEEK TO USE THEIR RESOURCES AS A BARGAINING WEAPON AGAINST THE INDUSTRIALIZED NATIONS. WE COULD, IN TURN, WITHHOLD FOOD SUPPLIES FROM THEM. BUT NOBODY WINS AT THAT SORT OF GAME. IT IS DESTRUCTIVE OF NATIONS AND OF PEOPLES. ALL OF US MUST FIND CONSTRUCTIVE WAYS TO COMBAT POVERTY AND HUNGER. INTERNATIONAL ACTION IS NECESSARY ON A BROAD SCALE TO ATTACK WORLD HUNGER--AND THOSE IN A KEY POSITION TO HELP ARE THE OIL-RICH MIDDLE EASTERN COUNTRIES. WE MUST ALL POINT NOW TOWARD THE WORLD FOOD CONFERENCE TO BE HELD IN OCTOBER IN ROME.

SECRETARY KISSINGER, SPEAKING TO THE APRIL<sup>®</sup>SESSION OF THE UN GENERAL ASSEMBLY, SET FORTH AN IMAGINATIVE LIST OF PRINCIPLES AND PRIORITIES WHICH HE HOPED MIGHT HELP THE NATIONS FIND A COMMON APPROACH TO THEIR PROBLEMS. HIS PROPOSAL DEALT WITH ENERGY, RESOURCES, FOOD, FERTILIZER, POPULATION, TECHNOLOGY, MONEY AND INVESTMENT. REGRETTABLY, NO ACTION HAS BEEN TAKEN ON THAT PROPOSAL TO DATE. AND THE HUNGRY PEOPLES OF THE WORLD CONTINUE TO STARVE.

THE KISSINGER PROPOSAL WAS AN AMERICAN PROPOSAL. IT WAS SUBMITTED WITH EMPHASIS ON GOOD FAITH. IT IS NOT FOR LACK OF INITIATIVE ON THE PART OF THE UNITED STATES THAT THE WAR ON WORLD POVERTY IS FALTERING.

SPEAKING OF THE AMERICAN ROLE IN UN PROGRAMS, I FIRMLY BELIEVE THAT THE UNITED STATES WILL REMAIN A WILLING AND FAITHFUL PARTNER IN THE UN. AND THE UN, I FEEL SURE, <u>WILL RISE ABOVE ITS MASS OF PROBLEMS TO REACH NEW HEIGHTS</u> IN THE SEARCH FOR WORLD STABILITY, PROSPERITY AND PEACE.

IT WAS WRITTEN LONG AGO THAT WHERE THERE IS NO VISION THE PEOPLE PERISH. THAT IS STILL TRUE. IT IS EQUALLY TRUE THAT BEAUTIFUL VISIONS WITHOUT THE PRACTICAL MEANS TO TRANSLATE THEM INTO EVERYDAY FACT ARE NOT VERY USEFUL.

I THINK WE HAVE A CLEAR VISION OF THE KIND OF WORLD WE WANT: PEACEFUL, SECURE, OPEN, PROGRESSIVE AND COOPERATIVE. ## As we look toward the celebration of AUN Day next fall, we must all recognize that the world would be a far more fearful and fearsome place without the United Nation is. We should be agreed, I think, that the UN is not only desirable but necessary.

The United Nations Organiz, tion was born 29 years ago, formed in the hope that it could help shield the world from the terrible scourge of war. It was developed, too, how because the terrors and waste of war are a disease spawned by social disturbance and turmoil. Who is to determine the priorities in the \* UN? Is it more urgent to **stranged a** slow down world propulation growth than to foster trade and investment for developing countries? These are noble objectives and they are possible of attainment. Progress joward thesezgosizz fulfillment of thesezezesiz world needs through UN action has been not only distinct but measureable.

The UN has, of course, had its failures. But it has had its share of successes **xx** as well. What are the UN's successes ?? They are many, and they are most impressive. For example:

--A year ago the UN Environment Program came into existence to launch a global attack against pollution of the seas and skies and ecosystems of the world. Its new "Earthwatch" system will enable us for the first time to know what environmental dangers we are creating and what steps are needed to safeguard the environment for future generations. 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## REMARKS BY VICE PRESIDENT GERALD R. FORD UNA-USA DINNER HILTON HOTEL, NEW YORK CITY JUNE 10, 1974

## FOR RELEASE AT 8:30 P.M. MONDAY

Mr. Cary, Mr. Morgen, Mr. Benjamin, Mr. Segel, distinguished officers of the United Nations Day Committee, other distinguished guests, and ladies and gentlement. It is a distinct pleasure and a high privilege to appear before the United Nations Association of the United States of America — the principal bipartisan organization engeged in promoting peace and justice through international cooperation.

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The UN is a vital organization in the overall drive by men of goodwill everywhere to make the dream of world peace a reality. The leadership of the United States and successes in world diplomacy are other parts of the picture.

We have just seen Secretary of State Henry Kissinger shuttle back and forth from one Mideast capital to another and finally bring off what must be rated as the greatest diplomatic triumph of this century -- and perhaps any other.

Let me at this point pay tribute to the intelligence, the persistence and the sheer physical endurance of Dr. Kissinger. We owe a tribute, too, to the man who sent Dr. Kissinger on this Journey for Peace, who told him to "hang in there," who told him to stay the extra hours, days and weeks to help the parties take the first steps toward peace — the man in charge of U.S. foreign policy, the President of the United States.

I would like also to praide the United States Senate for decisively rejecting last Thursday proposals to unilaterally reduce the number of American troops overseas. I strongly favor a <u>mutual</u> reduction in forces. Unilateral U.S. troop cuts would undermine our negotiations with the Soviet Union directed at mutual force reductions in Central Europe.

The Senate action is a healthy rebuff to those who would push us in the direction of neo-isolationism. For the United States to withdraw into a shell of

isolationism in the Seventies would be tragic for America and would dash every hope for peace in the world.

The current world view of the UN is bound up very closely with the Mideast situation. Since last October there has been a dramatic resurgence in the prestige of the UN due to the UN's role in complementing American policy in the Middle East.

Not only have we been able to arrange cease-fires between Egyptian and Israeli troops and between Israeli and Syrian forces, but we have successfully created the UN peace forces needed to bring about these disengagements. These were key steps, almost miraculous steps, toward the enduring peace we seek in the Middle East. The United States and the United Nations achieved together what neither of them could have accomplished alone -- one of the great breakthroughs for peace in this generation.

As we look toward the celebration of UN Day next fall, we must all recognize that the world would be a far more fearful and fearsome place without the United Nations. We should be agreed, I think, that the UN is not only desirable but necessary.

The United Nations Organization was born 29 years ago, formed in the hope that it could help shield the world from the terrible scourge of war. It was developed, too, because the terrors and waste of war are a disease spawned by social disturbance and turmoil. It grew from an awareness that war and the problems of living together on one earth are closely entwined. They must be approached as one. This the UN does.

We of the generation that stormed the beaches at Normandy and braved blazing guns on the atolls of the Pacific viewed the brand new UN as an automatic peace machine of magical promise. We have learned from grim experience that what we have is really a do-it-yourself kit, a kit we have to work at **and with** if we are going to make the UN work. We have learned that to make it work we have to master the difficult arts of cooperation and compromise.

Is that any reason to turn away from the UN in frustration and disillusionment?

To turn away from the UN would be irrational and dangerous. The United States needs the UN. We need the UN as much as the UN needs us.

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- To exert influence aimed at completing the decolonization movement.
- -- And to exercise restraint in the use of their great military power.

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- -- To supply contingents for UN peacekeeping forces in danger spots where great-power troops would only inflame the situation.
- -- To help clean up the oceans, conserve natural resources, and gradually level off the menacing growth in world population.

These are noble objectives and they are possible of attainment. Progress toward fulfillment of world needs through UN action has been not only distinct but measureable.

Such progress is the answer to those people who refer derogatorily to the UN as a world debating society, swamped in millions of words and completely ineffective.

The UN has, of course, had its failures. But it has had its share of successes as well. And the failures have been due, as I mentioned earlier, to the failure of key UN members to live up to the UN Charter and not because of any intrinsic flaw in the United Nations concept.

What are the UN's successes? They are many, and they are most impressive. For example:

- Last October the Security Council created the 7,000-man peace force sent to the Middle East to secure the Israeli-Egyptian cease-fire and the disengagement of hostile armies. It was the first such UN force that had positive support from the Soviet Union, and the first that cannot be dismissed by the sole decision of the host country. It is a vital piece in the settlement worked out so masterfully by President Nixon and Secretary Kissinger, with the cooperation of the Soviet Union, and the leaders of Egypt and Israel. Now a similar disengagement has been agreed upon by Israel and Syria, and a UN peace-keeping force is part of that arrangement, too.

-- A few weeks ago Iran and Iraq were about to engage in hostilities over a border dispute. Through the quiet work of Secretary General Waldheim and

a special representative who went to the area on a fact-finding mission, Iran and Iraq were able to defuse their quarrel and to engage in bQna-fide bilateral negotiations to resolve the issues in dispute. In matters of war, as in medicine, prevention is better than cure.

-- A year ago the UN Environment Program came into existence to launch a global attack against pollution of the seas and skies and ecosystems of the world. Its new "Earthwatch" system will enable us for the first time to know what environmental dangers we are creating and what steps are needed to safeguard the environment for future generations.

--- UN disaster relief programs, with large U.S. support, have done immense service in the human tragedies of Bangladesh and the Sahelian drought in Africa.

-- The UN is holding a world conference of governments this summer on the problem of the population explosion. Meanwhile, the UN Fund for Population Activities is now budgeting \$54 million a year to advise those governments which request help on population research and family planning. By UN declaration, this is World Population Year.

With the emphasis being given to the population explosion, we naturally focus on the related problem of world poverty. The war on poverty has moved to the forefront of the world's agenda. No problem is more important to mankind. The solution to the problem of world poverty is immensely difficult, just as a similar challenge is hard to overcome in America. But we must never despair of achieving that solution at home or world-wide -- because it is basic to achieving world peace.

The United Nations, with strong U.S. support, has vigorously attacked the problem of world poverty---through the World Bank, the International Development Association and the UN Development Program. Results thus far are spotty, but we must persist in our efforts.

We have seen some developing nations, rich in petroleum and other raw materials, seek to use their resources as a bargaining weapon against the industrialized nations. We could, in turn, withhold food supplies from them. But nobody wins at that sort of game. It is destructive of nations and of peoples. All of us must find constructive ways to combat poverty and hunger.

International action is necessary on a broad scale to attack world hunger — and those in a key position to help are the oil-rich Middle Eastern countries. We must all point now toward the World Food Conference to be held in October in Rome.

UN Day is an *International* observance marking the anniversary of the United Nations, October 24, 1945. The UN General Assembly in 1947 adopted a US-sponsored resolution stating that October 24 "shall henceforth be officially called 'United Nations Day' and shall be devoted to making known to the peoples of the world the aims and achievements of the United Nations and to gaining their support for the work of the United Nations".

It is a *national* event proclaimed every year since 1947 by the President of the United States under the leadership of a National UN Day Chairman and a National UN Day Committee formed with the assistance of the United Nations Association of the United States

It is a *community* observance throughout the United States. Governors and Mayors appoint state and local UN Day chairmen to organize programs and issue UN Day proclamations. National and voluntary associations, through their chapters and individual members, sponsor and take part in these local observances, as do millions of elementary, high school and college students.

UN Day provides a rallying point to focus attention on the UN and its work. The American press rarely covers the day-to-day work of the United Nations except in times of crisis; thus, a serious information gap exists. Lack of information and understanding of the UN and its far-reaching activities have contributed to an erosion of support for the UN by the public and its elected officials.

The events of the past year, however, have put global interdependence on the front pages and have rekindled interest in international affairs. Effective observances of UN Day could lead to greater public awareness of the UN as the major global mechanism at work on many of today's problems. Evidence of solid grass roots support for the UN communicated to Washington will encourage more effective participation by the United States in the United Nations.

I believe deeply that an effective worldwide organization must be developed if mankind is to build and maintain a satisfactory life on this planet.

It is clear that the United Nations represents man's best effort so far to develop such a world wide organization. We must build on what we have to develop it into an ever more effective institution. We dare not do otherwise in this world where communications and travel are becoming more rapid and where instruments of destruction are becoming more deadly.

It is now a commonplace that the nations of the world are interdependent and that their interdependence will inevitably and rapidly increase.

There is a natural human tendency to look to the past in times of crisis. Many groups examine international affairs; but UNA's Policy Study Panels have an added dimension. They are set apart by their track record of stimulating public response and influencing government and UN action. Legislators and agency officials pay attention. Media give wide coverage. Community groups throughout the country use the reports as the basis for discussion and recommendations to their Congressmen. The panels are not formed only of experts in the subject under discussion. Rather, the members bring to their panel open minds and the kind of stature in their own fields that will lend weight to the panel's findings.

Subjects for panels are first chosen by UNA's Policy Studies Committee, whose Chairman is Cyrus Vance. The Committee then invites a chairman and some 15 participants to work on that topic. Their deliberations may take anywhere from six to 18 months and they produce a series of practical recommendations for action by our government, and frequently other nations and the UN.

Among the measurable results achieved by recent Policy Study Panels are:

UNA's environmental panel with the Soviets was so successful it became the basis

for formal, government agreements and exchanges between the two countries. Similarly, discussions of disarmament and disengagement provided valuable pathbreaking for the official conferences on those same subjects in Vienna and Geneva. UNA's panel report on halting the spread of nuclear weapons contributed significantly to the climate that made the Non-Proliferation Treaty a reality, after years of US-Soviet deadlock.

Another newly-formed UNA panel has begun meeting with leaders of the Japanese business, government and academic communities to consider problems of mutual interest. The recommendations that emerged drew a favorable reaction from Secretary of State Kissinger and have been given serious attention by several top policymakers in Japan.

A practical demonstration of the impact of these reports is the fact that UNA's Policy Panel on the United Nations in the 1970's. chaired by Nicholas de B. Katzenbach, and the President's Commission for the Observance of the 25th Anniversary of the United Nations, chaired by Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, were jointly the basis for a recent State Department report to Congress at the request of the House Committee on Foreign Affairs.
