SUBJECT: 7:30 Domestic Council Meeting --
For Your Information

The following items came up at the 7:30 meeting this morning:

- 1) The House will attempt to override the President's veto of the jobs bill on Wednesday. If successful, it will go immediately to the Senate.
- 2) The Public Works Projects Bill, \$5 billion, will probably be passed in the House this week.
- 3) Attempt to override the strip mining bill veto will be on June 10.
- 4) The Congress will attempt to override the President's veto of the tourism bill on June 24.
- 5) H.R. 4485, the Emergency Housing Act of 1975, will likely be acted on this week.
- 6) The Senate will attempt to cut \$1.2 billion out of a \$32 billion authorization for military procurement this week.
- 7) I have attached a letter to Bill Kendall from Senator Taft's office requesting that the Senator be included in the regulatory summit meeting to be held by the President. He evidently was the sponsor of the President's proposal to establish a Regulatory Reform Commission. I recommend you include him on the list of Senators to be invited to the meeting with the President.

Dear Bill:

As a follow-up to our discussion in the Senator's office about cooperation and mutual interest and certain legislative proposals, I would like to bring your attention to the President's position on Regulatory Reform and the fact that the Senator's position is consistent with that of the President. The Senator has argued for Regulatory Reform as the true answer to consumer protection as opposed to the Agency for Consumer Advocacy. The Senator has also introduced legislation to establish a commission which will study the present regulatory system and make proposals for needed reform in order to make it more effective and more responsive to the people.

In a recent article in THE WASHINGTON POST, I noted a reference to a regulatory summit to be held sometime in June. It would be an excellent opportunity for the Senator to play a major role in conjunction with the President in this very important issue. I would like to have the opportunity to discuss how we can bring the Senator into the forefront on this issue along with the President. We have substantial legislative background and history in this effort.

Thank you for your cooperation and assistance in this matter.
