#### PRINCIPLES OR BELIEFS WHICH HAVE BEEN IGNORED OR INAPPROPRIATELY MET

#### IN THE PAST AND WHICH CONSTITUTE CONTINUING CONCERNS

COUNCIL OF CHIEF STATE SCHOOL OFFICERS

- 1. Education is essentially a state function although there are important federal concerns in education.
- 2. Federal intervention into elementary and secondary education should be supportive of state and local efforts and the relationships should be cooperative.
- 3. No branch of the federal government should attempt to dictate governmental structure in the states.
- 4. Federal reporting requirements should not exceed the capacity of state and local governments to comply without major disruption to other programs.
- 5. Bureaucratic rules and regulations must be reasonable and lead to simple and effective administration of federal programs.
- Programs & funds must provide sufficient lead time to promote good planning and provide consistency and continuity over a reasonable period of time.
- 7. Audits must be as current as possible with both those auditing and those being audited operating from the same set of guidelines.
- Procedures must be established to solicit early and continuing input from the field regarding proposed legislation, policy decisions, rules and regulations and research and development.
- 9. Federal involvement with local districts must be in conformity with state plans which are formulated by the states with federal approval.
- 10. Federal funding must complement rather than disrupt state efforts to equalize educational opportunities.

#### NEEDED ACTION

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- I. <u>Statement of policy to appropriate executive agancies</u>. This policy will be used as a guide to action by the agencies & reports will be required indicating how agency is complying.
  - 1. Education is essentially a state function therefore, existing federal educational programs should be administered in such a way as to allow the states maximum discretion permitted by the legislation and new legislation proposals shall be formulated with this principle being a foremost consideration.

- 2. Each agency shall be responsible for formulating a plan to substantially reduce paperwork required under existing programs and legislative proposals shall be accompanied by a "paperwork note" estimating the time & expense incurred by any new requirements.
- 3. Federal programs shall be formulated and administered in such a way as to require accountability of results while allowing maximum state discretion and creativity in accomplishing those results.
- 4. Payments to states shall be made immediately after funds become available.
- 5. Financial auditing of federal programs shall start with the most recent available data and work back as time and resources allow.
- 6. Every effort shall be made to ensure that federal funding of educational programs is not discriptive of state efforts to equalize educational opportunities.
- 7. Procedures shall be established to solicit early and continuous input from the field regarding proposed legislation, policy decisions, rules and regulations and research and development.

#### II. Legislative Goals

- 1. Substantially increase the percent of educational funding furnished from federal sources.
- While categorical educational programs are important and must be continued, funding which exceeds 10% of the total cost of education shall be in the form of general aid, block grants or educational revenue sharing.
- 3. Additional funding shall use a federal formula based upon an equalization principle.
- 4. All future federal educational programs shall be judged by:
  - A. Simplicity of administration
  - B. Minumim paperwork requirements
  - C. Degree to which they support and supplement state and local efforts

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### III. Establishment of a Department of Education Under Secretary of Education

Although it is recognized that it is politically impossible to bring all educational programs under one agency, the process should proceed as follows:

Phase One - Create a Department of Education encompassing all of the present division of education.

Phase Two - Consolidate additional programs which are most logical and which can be consolidated without major blood-letting.

Phase Three - Institute plans & negotiations for consolidation of all other logical programs.

The purposes of the above are to:

- A. Simplify administration of federal educational programs.
- B. Fix responsibility & accountability.
- C. Increase the clout of education at the federal level.
