I have reviewed the draft Domestic Council Study of U. S. Environmental Policy and have the following comments:

- In my view, there is no need to initiate another study of the impact of environmental programs on the consumer and on the economy. A substantial amount of economic information is already available (attached is a study we previously conducted for the House Appropriations Committee on this subject). In addition, in-depth studies of six industries (the industries with the greatest economic impact) and of their overall impact on capital availability are currently underway, and should be completed in September. As you know, these studies are part of our MBO commitment to the President and to OMB, and we have participation from several of the agencies.
- 2. The study, as currently outlined, fails to bring into consideration the reasons for environmental programs, chiefly to protect public health as well as other values.
- 3. In my mind, the most useful contribution of a study of this nature is to analyze the ability and willingness of State and local governments to carry out environmental quality programs. I am concerned that we are losing many of the incentives for State and local governments to take over environmental, as well as other Federal programs. We need a better understanding of the means by which the Federal Government can effectively delegate environmental quality responsibilities to those governments closest to the people.

4. I believe the best type of person to head this study would be someone who has had State/local experience in administering environmental programs. If we do not get this kind of leadership, this could easily be another Federal study without meaningful understanding of State and local needs.

A study which focuses on the State and local government question, as my comments suggest, could have a very significant payoff, and in my opinion, would be very desirable. If it is decided to move ahead with this study, I would like to prepare a draft prospectus for the effort.

I consider a study such as the one outlined in your memorandum to be very significant to the Environmental Protection Agency. I would like to have an opportunity to discuss it with you and, if desirable, with the President.

A minor point: I would eliminate ERC and EPB from the list of formal participants because their component parts are in fact represented in the list.

The Ross memo (March 21) recommends a massive study of future environmental policies for the United States; the DuVal memo (March 22) narrowed this focus to a study of existing programs in operation -- for the purpose of assessing their effectiveness and costs. The Quern memo (March 25) followed the Ross formulation (probably because that's all he'd seen).

To my mind, the DuVal approach is superior because

- I. I don't think it's possible to produce a restatement of U.S. environmental policy during the remainder of the Ford first term, let alone by October. This will cause problems around the loop.
- 2. It is just barely possible, in the time allotted, to assess the impact of existing laws -- and it is well worth doing before any thought is given to future policies and programs.
- 3. I'm not entirely familiar with the Vice President's views on this matter, but I thought the narrower focus is what he is looking for.

For these reasons, the attached draft follows the narrower formulation of the problem, rather than the broader Quern format; I'd be glad to take another cut if you want a broader approach.



BROAD STUDY OF THE U. S. ENVIRONMENT

STUDY SUBJECT

I recommend that the Domestic Council undertake a study of selected Federal environmental programs with two broad areas of emphasis: in the <u>pollution control</u> area on air quality, water quality, and solid waste, and in the <u>natural resources</u> area on the capability of public lands to meet conflicting demands for renewable resources, energy and minerals, recreation, watershed protection, and wildlife habitat.

STUDY OBJECTIVE

The objectives of the study are to formulate for your consideration, a policy position and action program on (1) the appropriate future Federal role in pollution abatement and control; and (2) the appropriate balance between competing demands upon the public lands.

Precise objectives for the pollution control phase are:

- 1. Assess the present status of program implementation and effectiveness.
- 2. Determine current and project costs of implementation for public and private sectors.
- 3. Review status of knowledge on benefits of pollution abatement: protection of health and ecosystems; conservation of resources.
- 4. Develop proposals arrived at balancing the benefits of pollution control with other important national objectives: modifications of air and water quality programs; Federal incentives for resource recovery.



Precise objectives for the natural resources phase are:

- 1. Describe public lands natural resources: minerals, timber, rangeland, wilderness, etc.
- 2. Determine current and projected demand for goods and services from public lands: energy and mining, forest products, recreation, etc.
- 3. Assess capacity of public lands to meet demands for goods and services.
- 4. Identify important conflicts among alternative demands upon public lands.
- 5. Propose actions to resolve conflicts and/or to increase capacity of public lands to meet needs.

The review groups should be organized as shown below and consist of appropriate agency representatives:

TIMETABLE

The review group should report to the Domestic Council with a study plan within two weeks, detailed outline within six weeks, an interim report three months later, and a final report three months after that. The total lapsed time from initiation through final report would be approximately eight months.
