Says that this is a battle all of us have to face up to and if the only solution is "bite the bullet" that is what we should do. Larry Hogan Requests an autographed photograph for William Mann. Teno Roncalio Sends copy of his letter from the Rance Nix family who lost a son in Vietnam and are unhappy about the President's announcement regarding amnesty. Robert McClory Requests an autographed photograph for the President of the Court of Appeals in Jordan. Brock Adams Recommends that Dr. Max Rittenbury and Roddy Brandes be appointed to the National Emergency Medical Services Council.
