
Lindy Boggs

Would appreciate early consideration of any request of Governor Edwards for disaster assistance due to damages from Hurricane Carmen.

Thad Cochran

Requests that appropriate agencies and departments of the Federal government be alerted so that flood victims in South Mississippi can receive immediate relief.

William Steiger



Urges the President to give careful thought to the possibility of a meeting with Congressional and/or industry leaders over and above any additional and subsequent input that might be obtained in a "Domestic Summit on Inflation." Believes that a little talk could go a long way. He is principally concerned about problems facing the dairy farmers.

Don Fuqua

Concerned about the plight of our farmers; urges that agriculture be given a high priority in the discussion at the Domestic Economic Summit Conference.

John Young

Says that the importation of shrimp has saturated the market and reduced the price to such an extent that unless there is some relief in the next 60 days, much of the industry will have to go out of existence.

Robert E. Jones

Endorses invitation to the President to address the annual meeting of the Alabama Press Association in February, 1975.

Barry Goldwater, Jr.

Recommends that Bill Knecht be appointed to the Board of Directors of the Nat'l Legal Services Corporation.

Jack Brinkley

Commends the President's efforts to heal the wounds which have divided our Nation; requests that urgent consideration be given to granting Lt. William L. Calley a pardon.

Senate

Roman Hruska	Telegram -- Quotes text of statement that he issued yesterday commending the President for giving former President Nixon a pardon.
Hubert Humphrey's Administrative Assistant	Endorses request of Governor Anderson that the President declare Minnesota a disaster area because of the severe frost to the corn and soybean crops.
Frank E. Moss	Hopes the President will insist upon prompt and complete withdrawal of all Turkish troops from Cyprus, and that the U. S. insist upon a negotiated settlement and peace among the Cypriots themselves.
John Sparkman	Supports the suggestion of James Record, Chairman of Madison County Commission, that the President make a public statement that "we are going to lick cancer within the next ten years.
Bill Brock	Asks that consideration be given to the suggestion of Mr. Marc Askew issue a "Declaration of 1976" similar to the Declaration of Independence.
Ted Stevens	Is convinced that support by the Administration for the no-fault motor vehicle insurance as contained in S. 354 would not only benefit the national consumer interest, but would contribute to the national goal of reducing inflation. Hopes the President will give his support to the minimum federal standards approach before the Congress adjourns.
Norris Cotton	Asks for an autographed photograph of the President to hang in his office during his last months in the Congress and to take home with him -- "together with the warm memories of our long friendship."
