House

The Speaker	Recommends that Mrs. Bettye Hynson Kehrer be appointed to the Board of Directors of the Legal Services Corporation.
Charles Whalen	Recommends that Arthur D. Jackson, Jr. be appointed to a position with the Administration.
John J. Rhodes	Recommends that Adolfo Echeveste be appointed as Regional Director for Region IX of the Dept of HEW.
Benjamin Gilman	Says that he held a workshop session on the economy last week among financial and business leaders from Orange, Rockland and Southern Ulster Counties, and that the consensus was that the most compelling problems are in the construction trades and the housing industry; sends brief synopsis of the discussion.
George Mahon	Hopes the President can accept invitation to the groundbreaking of the LBJ Memorial Grove on September 27.
John Myers	Submits an invitation to the President to address dedication ceremonies for the new Hulman Civic-University Center and to receive an honorary degree from the University.
Ken Hechler	Strongly urges the immediate adoption of across-the-board controls, including ceilings on profits, interest rates, rents, wages and prices.
Robin Beard	Says the Gov't is operating under a double standard so far as its enforcement of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 is concerned; points out that Sec Weinberger admitted that the Fed'l Gov't has been less-than-forceful in enforcing school de-segregation under the Act in Northern states because of "fierce public opposition" in Northern school districts; requests that the President order Sec Weinberger to resign on the grounds of dereliction of duty; urges the President to support a constitutional amendment which will end the busing of students.

John P. Hammerschmidt Says the Arkansas Legislative Council has expressed its concern over possible price fixing in retail meat prices. Asks that the appropriate agencies take prompt action to ascertain the facts.

Wm Moorhead Suggests that Governor Shapp be invited to participate in the Summit Conference on Inflation.

Louis Wyman Hopes the President's and Mrs. Ford's schedule will permit them to accept invitation from the Bektash Temple to attend the Past Potentate's Ball and Spring Ceremonial in Manchester, N. H., next May.

L. H. Fountain Recommends that Raymond Mason Taylor be appointed as Librarian of Congress.

Sidney Yates Supports the enclosed suggestion from S. R. Bernstein for the development of a program to sell anti-inflation bonds.

Daniel Flood Asks that a Presidential message be sent to Mrs. Joseph D. Mushinsky.

Frank Horton Sends a cookbook which Ms. Carole Clifford requested be presented to the President.

John Dellenback Expresses continued interest in appointment of Frank Van Dyke as a member of the National Conference on Education. Previously submitted this name several weeks ago.

Manuel Lujan, Jr. Reports on his 3 week visit to his District and the universal concern of constituents over high prices. Suggests total wage and price control with an allowable increase of 3% per year.

Roy A. Taylor Recommends Raymond M. Taylor as Librarian of Congress. (Adds note that they are not related.)

Manuel Lujan, Jr. Recommends Mr. Henry V. Trujillo for membership to Federal Board on Aging.

Thad Cochran	In support of appointment of Mr. B. B. McClendon, Jr. to Legal Services Corporation.
Wm. A. Barrett	Comments most favorably on the pre-summit meeting on housing and construction in Atlanta. States he agreed to go with some reluctance but was highly impressed by caliber of discussion and with Secretary Lynn's leadership of the summit. Believes it was most productive. Also, urges that Secretary Lynn be retained at HUD.
Andrew Hinshaw	Cites many constituent comments regarding the granting of a pardon to President Nixon and requests that he give his position regarding this action. His District includes Orange County (San Clemente). Believes serious consideration should be given to releasing analysis of Mr. Herbert Miller re the problem of the former President receiving a fair trial and Special Prosecutor Jaworski's reaction and response. Believes it would help to clarify the matter.
Jerry Pettis	Requests autograph on five First Day covers of the June 16, 1974 groundbreaking ceremonies of VA Hospital groundbreaking ceremonies at Loma Linda and also requests autographed photograph of the President for the Loma Linda University Stamp Club.
Jack Brinkley	On behalf of Mr. William C. Johnson who desires to serve on Amnesty Review Board.
Dan Daniel	On behalf of Messrs. Robert E. Lee and Clete Quick who request film segment for Dixie Youth Baseball.

State that as an amendment to S. 3270, the Defense Production Act Amendments of 1974, the Congress yesterday cleared for the President's endorsement the National Commission on Supplies and Shortages Act. The Commission is to provide specific recommendations by March 1, 1975. Pledge to do everything possible to cooperate with the President in seeing that this Commission is set up and underway at the soonest possible time.

James Allen

Endorses invitation to the President to make the dedicatory address at the "West Point Project," a new dam on the Chattahoochee River on May 12, 1975.

Strom Thurmond

Sends the President the front page of "The News and Courier" which carries an article showing Charlestonians support the President's pardon of former President Nixon. It also carries an article entitled "Thurmond, Hollings split on pardon decision."

Mark Hatfield

"In view of your encouraging comments last night (9/16) on the world food situation and the effect of impending U.S. policy decisions on the World Food Conference, I urge you to develop the most generous and humane policy possible, and pledge my full support for such efforts."

William Scott

Forwards letter from retired member of Armed Forces (Stephen Buski) who opposes amnesty in any form.

Peter Dominick

Endorses Mr. Wiley T. Buchanan for Ambassador to United Kingdom.

Barry Goldwater

Recommends Denison Kitchel of Phoenix to head Legal Services Corporation.

Jacob Javits

Recommends Dr. Robert B. McKay and George D. Covington to serve on Board of Directors of National Legal Services Administration.


