MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

FROM: MAX L. FRIEDERSDORF *MLF*
SUBJECT: Tiger Teague

Tiger asked me to advise you that his initial checks concerning the cut-off of GI benefits indicate there probably will not be much opposition from the organized veterans groups.

Tiger says that he believes the Legion, VFW and DAV would not oppose such a move.

He said that the veterans groups expressed the attitude that they wanted to protect the benefits for those eligible veterans and the cut-off at this time would be of assistance in their efforts.


Tiger said, however, that before your make a definite decision he would like a little more time to check further and will get back to us as soon as he has a more thorough reading from other groups and Members of Congress.
