SUBJECT: Incoming Presidential Mail for
the Week of February 24-28, 1975

Incoming Presidential mail this week totaled about 25,000 pieces. Ten percent of this, 2,508, continues to reflect public concern with economic and energy matters and lack of Congressional action. There appears to be a growing concern for the economic impact of your proposals on the elderly.
