II. BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS & PRESS PLAN

A. Background: The Senator wishes to see the President to obtain his support for an appropriation to begin studies on the Baltimore Harbor Dredging Project. Earlier in the year, OMB apparently gave Senator Beall the impression that the project had been approved for funding and the Senator issued a press release to that effect. Later he was informed that the project was eligible to compete for funds. Maryland has recently lost the Oceanographic Institute and may have cutbacks in other projects around the state.
