MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

Attached at Tab A is a letter for your signature to Chairman Leonard of the U.S. International Trade Commission requesting the advice of the Commission with respect to the probable economic effects of eliminating import duties on certain products pursuant to the Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) for developing countries in the Trade Act of 1974.
