Background

During your review of the 1978 Defense budget, you initially decided to appoint a Blue Ribbon Panel of outside experts to review defense base requirements. Pending completion of that review, you placed a moritorium on new construction at installations that might be affected by that review.

I understand that you have now decided not to appoint the Blue Ribbon Panel but to direct a study of longrange defense installation requirements. The partial construction moratorium imposed in the 1978 Budget would remain in effect pending completion of the study.

I am concerned about the current approach for two reasons:

- 1. The large \$1 billion reduction in the 1978 Budget due to the moratorium may be viewed as artificial and unachievable in the absence of some extraordinary high level review group which would analyze base requirements outside normal Defense review procedures. It could, thus, be viewed as an effort to make it more difficult for the next Administration to achieve their promised Defense budget reductions.
- 2. Based on past experience, such a large reduction will not be sustained in the Congress unless there is a high-powered, non-partisan, strong body of support behind it. Such support would best be provided by a Blue Ribbon Panel of the type you had previously approved.

Alternatives

We can proceed in one of two ways:

- You could specifically call upon the new 1. Administration to appoint a Blue Ribbon Panel, with the same objectives and criteria that we would have used, for the review of long-range defense installation requirements.
- 2. You could do nothing more - thereby allowing the study of long-range defense installation requirements to become a regular in-house Department of Defense study.

Recommendation

I believe it is extremely important that we maintain the moratorium and that a high level review group be appointed to make the study you have agreed to initiate. Otherwise, it is unlikely that the moratorium will be sustained and even less likely that any real improvement in the defense installation structure will come about.

Call upon the new Administration to appoint a Blue Ribbon Panel.

I would recommend against the formation of the proposed Panel for the following reasons:

> I am of the view that any closuresrecommendations on which the incoming Administration acts will be attributed to the recommendations of the "Ford Panel."

I question the public response to this endeavor. If the Panel arises because of the inadequacies of Defense procedures, then why did the President wait almost two and ene-hald years to create the Fanel? What is the need?

I believe this will appear to be a last minute Presidential action whose purposes will be misunderstood, whose authority will be questioned, and questions raised as to whether it is an attempt to emberrass the incoming successor.

Finally, aside from Constitutional questions, as a matter of policy, I do not believe sitting Members of Congress should participate in Executive Panels that may make recommendations requiring legislative action.
