Over the period of his distinguished career in public service, William Jennings Bryan served as a Member of the House of Representatives of the United States, as Secretary of State of the United States, and was three times nominated by his party for President of the United States.

Under provisions of a 1930 Act, the William Jennings Bryan Memorial Association was given permission to erect a statue of William Jennings Bryan on public land in the District of Columbia -- no Federal expense was involved. When subsequent

road construction caused the statue to be displaced, it was placed in temporary storage until being loaned, in 1961, to the city of Salem, Illinois, which is the birthplace of William Jennings Bryan. The statue is technically considered property of the Department of the Interior, and could not be given to the city of Salem without appropriate legislative authority.

H.R. 5507 would authorize and direct the Secretary of the Interior to donate, by appropriate cooperative agreement, and without monetary consideration, to the city of Salem, Illinois, all right, title, and interest of the United States in and to the statue of William Jennings Bryan that was authorized by the 1930 Act. The donation would be conditioned on the city suitably displaying and maintaining the statue within the city.



We have no objection to the President's approving this enrolled bill.

Enrolled bill H.R. 5507 would authorize and direct the Secretary of the Interior to donate, by appropriate cooperative agreement, and without monetary consideration, to the city of Salem, Illinois, all right, title, and interest of the United States in a specified statue of William Jennings Bryan. The Committee on Rules and Administration, to which was referred the bill (H.R. 5507) to authorize the conveyance to the city of Salem, Illinois, of a statue of William Jennings Bryan, having onsidered the same, reports favorably thereon without amendment and recommends that the bill do pass.

H.R. 5507 would (1) authorize and direct the Secretary of the Interior to donate, by appropriate cooperative agreement, and without monetary consideration, to the city of Salem, Illinois, all right, title, and interest of the United States in and to the statue of William Jennings Bryan authorized by the Act of June 18, 1930 (46 Stat. 783), and (2) provide that such donation shall be on condition that the city of Salem, Illinois, shall suitably display and maintain within such city such statue as a memorial to William Jennings Bryan, onetime Member of the House of Representatives of the United States, Secretary of State of the United States, and three times nominated by his party for President of the United States.

The statue was originally erected on public land in the District of Columbia, pursuant to the Act of June 18, 1930, (46 Stat. 783), by the William Jennings Bryan Memorial Association. The United States incurred no expense with respect to this erection.

Subsequently, when road construction in the District of Columbia caused the statue to be displaced, the Department of the Interior loaned it to the city of Salem, which is the birthplace of William Jennings Bryan. It has been located there for several years. H.R. 5507 would give the city clear title to the statue and thus resolve any legal difficulties relative to city expenditures for maintenance and care thereof.

The Office of Management and Budget has advised that there is no objection to this measure from the standpoint of the Administration's program.

DEAR HOWARD: Two days ago, the House took from its consent calendar, and passed, H:R. 5507. The bill is short. It simply authorizes the Secretary of the Interior to donate a statue of William Jennings Bryan to Salem, Illinois on the condition that the gity display and maintain the statute as a memorial to Mr. Bryan.

The bill is not controversial. It has the full support of the Administration and passed the House unanimously. The Brvan family has endorsed Salem's efforts. I can toresdeino Jubstantive difficulties in the Senate.

However, I am concerned that this bill may be overlooked as the Rules and Administration Committee turns to consider the vice presidential nomination in the limited time remaining before adjournment.

I ask your assistance in seeing that does not happen. This bill is meritorious. Salem is the birthplace of William Jennings Bryan. Even after he moved to Nebraska, Bryan visited Salem almost annually and the town has not forgotten him.

More than any other place in the country, Salem commemorates Bryan. Its oldest residents remember him and its younger ones know of him through stories told in the William Jennings Bryan Memorial Park, in the Bryan home, in the city library donated by Bryan, and in the churches remembered in Bryan's will.

And the statue-the subject of H.R. 5507-is omnipresent. It is the centerpiece of Bryan Memorial Park (the Department of the Interior authorized its transfer to Salem in 1961). It is part of the town seal and is on the town's stationery. It is only fitting that Salemwhich cherishes the memory of my great-grandfather's running mate-should be given this statue.

I hope you will review this bill and allow it to be brought to the floor soon. Thank you for your consideration of this request.

The Committee on House Administration, to whom was referred the bill (H.R. 5507), having considered the same, report favorably thereon with amendments and recommend that the bill as amended do pass.

By unanimous consent the Committee adopted a motion to report H.R. 5507, as amended.

H.R. 5507 would authorize and direct the Secretary of the Interior to convey, without monetary consideration, to the City of Salem, Illinois, all right, title, and interest of the United States in a specified statue of William Jennings Bryan. This donation would be conditioned on the City's suitably displaying and maintaining the statue as a memorial to this former Member of the House of Representatives, Secretary of State of the United States, and three-time nominee of his party for the Presidency of the United States.

This statue was originally erected on public land in the District of Columbia, pursuant to the Act of June 18, 1930, (46 Stat. 783), by the William Jennings Bryan Memorial Association. The United States incurred no expense with respect to his erection.

The Committee on House Administration requested the Department of the Interior to render a report on this measure. That report, which appears hereafter, recommends Congressional approval of the bill, with technical amendments. These amendments accomplish the deletion of reference in the bill to conveyance by quitclaim deed, since

a quitclaim deed is not an appropriate instrument for donation of a statue.

AMENDMENTS

Page 1, line 4, strike the words "to convey, by quitclaim deed," and insert in lieu thereof "to donate, by appropriate cooperative agreement,".

Page 1, line 8, strike the word "conveyance" and insert in lieu thereof "donation".

Specifically, we would recommend: (1) revising line 4 of page 1 to read: "to donate, by an appropriate cooperative agreement, and without monetary consid-"; and (2) revising line 8, page 1, to read "(46 Stat. 783). Such donation shall be on condition that".

The Office of Management and Budget has advised that there is no objection to the presentation of this report from the standpoint of the Administration's program.
