Attached for your consideration is House bill, H.R. 15404, which appropriates a total of \$5,289,785,600 in 1975 budget authority for the activities of the Departments of State, Justice, and Commerce; the Judiciary; the Small Business Administration; the United States Information Agency; and other related agencies and commissions.

The total new budget authority presented would be \$163 million less than the Administration requested, thus reducing 1975 outlays by an estimated \$113 million.

Roy Ash recommends approval and states, "the reductions in this bill can be accommodated both in total and individually." Additional background information is provided in his enrolled bill report (Tab A).

We have checked with the Counsel's office (Chapman), the NSC, and Bill Timmons who concur.

Discussion

The total new budget authority provided in this bill-\$5,289.8 million--is \$163 million less than the \$5,452.8 million requested. The net effect of Congressional action is to reduce 1975 outlays by an estimated \$113 million.

While smaller reductions are spread widely throughout the bill, nearly half of the total reduction is in four accounts:

Congress reduced the \$27.7 million request for the State Department's International Commission of Control and Supervision in Vietnam by \$22.1 million. The reduction denies an \$11.2 million reimbursement to the Agency for International Development for money advanced in fiscal year 1974 to pay the United States contribution to the Commission. For fiscal year 1975 contributions, the appropriation of \$5.6 million will provide only the U.S. share of the Commission cost. It fails to provide requested funds for the shares of North Vietnam and the Peoples' Revolutionary Government which are not being met by those countries.

- Requests for the Federal Prison System's buildings and facilities account was reduced by \$25.5 million. This reduction will prevent construction of a Northeastern United States youth correctional facility. The conference report indicated a willingness to reconsider the construction request when a site has been selected.
- On The appropriation for the National Oceanic and Atomospheric Administration's operations, research, and facilities account is \$15.2 million less than requested, but no significant reduction in program level is expected.
- The Judiciary's space and facilities account was reduced by \$12.4 million. The original budget estimate was informally reduced by the Judiciary by \$5.9 million. A 10 percent reduction in the standard level user charges paid to the General Services Administration accounts for the remainder of the cut. This 10 percent reduction has been applied to all agencies in this year's appropriation bills.

The net reductions to the requests for the major agencies are as follows:

Department of State, - \$38.3 million

The major reduction is for international organizations and conferences of which \$22.1 million is the International Commission of Control and Supervision in Vietnam cut discussed earlier and \$8.2 million is for contributions to international organizations (contributions to the World Health Organization; the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization; and the International Civil Aviation Organization were reduced).

Department of Justice, - \$57.9 million

Major reductions include \$25.5 million for the Federal Prison System discussed earlier, \$8.2 million for the Immigration and Naturalization Service, \$6.4 million for the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, \$5.9 million for legal activities and general administration, and \$5.8 million for salaries and expenses of the Drug Enforcement Administration.

Department of Commerce, - \$40.4 million

Reductions of \$15.2 million for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration; \$7 million for the National Bureau of Fire Prevention's operations, research, and administration; and \$5.5 million for the Social and Economic Statistics Administration are the largest components of the net reduction.

Judiciary, - \$15.7 million

The reductions of \$12.4 million for space and facilities, as discussed earlier, account for most of the decrease.

Recommendation

The reductions in this bill can be accommodated both in total and individually. I recommend that you sign this bill.

BUDGET ESTIMATES

The estimates contained in the 1975 budget for the departments and agencies included in the bill have been amended by House Documents Numbered 93-221 and 93-305. Some of the requests contained in House Document No. 93-305 were not acted on by the Committee because the estimates were submitted too late for proper consideration.

SUMMARY OF THE BILL

The following table summarizes the amounts recommended in the bill compared with the budget estimates for fiscal year 1975 and the appropriations for fiscal year 1974.

The total amount recommended in the accompanying bill in new obligational authority is \$5,304,972,100 which is a reduction of \$106,837,500 from the total amount of the budget estimates. The amount recommended is an increase of \$586,974,800 above the total appropriated for the current fiscal year including funds contained in

the Second Supplemental Appropriation Bill, 1974. The increase above the total appropriations for the current fiscal year is attributable largely to the following—

approximately \$170,000,000 in rental charges for space and

approximately \$170,000,000 in rental charges for space and services imposed by the General Services Administration under

new legislative authority:

additional capital for the Business Loan and Investment Fund (\$103,000,000) and the Disaster Loan Fund (\$91,000,000) of the Small Business Administration; and

additional construction costs approximating \$42,000,000 for the Federal Prison System and the United States Information Agency, including alteration and maintenance of existing facilities.

The remainder of the increase recommended over fiscal year 1974 appropriations is due to mandatory increases and increased workload over which the departments and agencies concerned have very limited control, and selected program increases in certain areas.

SPACE AND SERVICES

The Public Buildings Amendments of 1972 (P.L. 92-313) gave the General Services Administration authority to impose a system of charges on the various departments and agencies for space and building services, the receipts from which are to be deposited in a fund operated by GSA. Appropriation requests for this purpose, which appear for the first time in the budget of virtually every governmental organization, reflect charges significantly in excess of the total estimated costs for operation, maintenance, protection, cleaning, repair, rental, and other expenses associated with provision of space and services to Federal agencies.

The Committee explored this matter in considerable detail during the appropriations hearings and has questioned the validity of the amounts requested. In this connection, the Committee recommends a reduction of ten per cent from the amounts requested by the departments and agencies in this bill for payment of the "standard level user charge" to the General Services Administration. By making such a reduction the Committee intends that payments from the agencies more closely approximate the estimated cost of the services to be provided. Accordingly, there should be no curtailment of the services for fiscal year 1975.

REDUCTION IN EXPENDITURES

The action of the Committee as set forth in the bill will reduce estimated expenditures for these departments and agencies for fiscal year 1975 by approximately \$85,000,000.

TITLE I—DEPARTMENT OF STATE

The total amount recommended in the bill for the Department of State is \$698,784,000. This is a decrease of \$17,485,000 from the total amount of the budget estimates and is an increase of \$19,832,000 over the total amount appropriated for the current fiscal year.

Under the general heading "Administration of Foreign Affairs" a total of \$401,419,000 is recommended. For "International Organizations and Conferences" the bill includes \$220,903,000. The total

recommended for "International Commissions" is \$16,262,000 and for "Educational Exchange" the total is \$60,200,000.

The action of the Committee on each of the appropriation items for the Department of State is hereinafter set forth.

Administration of Foreign Affairs

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The sum of \$349,650,000 is included in the bill to provide the necessary funds for the formulation and execution of the foreign policy of the United States, including the conduct of diplomatic and consular relations with foreign countries, diplomatic relations with inter-

national organizations, and related activities.

The amount allowed is a decrease of \$2,350,000 from the total amount requested and is an increase of \$27,470,000 over the total appropriated for the current fiscal year. The increase allowed is largely for annualization, within-grade salary increases, wage increases for foreign local employees, price increases, increased consular workload overseas, payment to the General Services Administration for space and services, and other nondiscretionary increases.

The decrease from the amount requested is due in part to reductions in the passport workload from the level reflected in the budget pre-

sentation.

REPRESENTATION ALLOWANCES

The bill includes \$1,350,000 for representation allowances as authorized by section 901 of the Foreign Service Act of 1946, as amended. While this amount is \$150,000 less than the budget request. it is \$150,000 more than the current year appropriation.

These funds are used to partially reimburse Foreign Service officers for expenditures which they incur in their official capacities abroad in establishing and maintaining contacts with local government

officials and prominent members of local groups.

ACQUISITION, OPERATION, AND MAINTENANCE OF BUILDINGS ABROAD

The bill provides a total of \$27,784,000 for the acquisition, operation, and maintenance of buildings abroad. Of this amount \$4,870,000 is contained in the special foreign currency appropriation which provides for payments in foreign currencies which the Treasury Department determines to be excess to the normal requirements of the United States. The total amount recommended is the same as the amount requested and is a decrease of \$36,000 from the current year appropriation.

EMERGENCIES IN THE DIPLOMATIC AND CONSULAR SERVICE

The sum of \$2,100,000, the full amount of the budget estimate, is included in the bill to provide relief and repatriation loans to American citizens abroad and for emergencies in the Department. This is the same amount as that provided for the last four fiscal years.

PAYMENT TO FOREIGN SERVICE RETIREMENT AND DISABILITY FUND

The full amount of the budget request, \$20,535,000, is recommended for payment to the Foreign Service Retirement and Disability Fund. Legislation which liberalizes benefits or extends benefits to new groups of employees, or increases salaries on which benefits are computed. requires appropriation to the Fund to finance, in thirty equal annual installments, the unfunded liability created by the legislation. The amount recommended includes \$4,935,000 for installments related to salary increases since 1970, and \$15,600,000 related to the inclusion in the Fund of career Foreign Service employees of the Agency for International Development, as authorized by law.

International Organizations and Conferences

CONTRIBUTIONS TO INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS

A total of \$205,903,000 is included in the bill to meet the annual obligations of membership in certain international organizations pursuant to conventions, treaties or specific acts of Congress. The amount included is \$12,634,000 less than the total appropriation for the current

fiscal year and is \$8,176,000 less than the amount requested.

As required by law, the contribution to the United Nations and a number of the specialized agencies is now limited to 25 percent of the total assessments of such organizations. This is the first budget to which the 25 percent ceiling for those organizations applied, and the Committee expected to see considerable reductions. However, the only reduction of any consequence shown in the budget request was in the assessment for the United Nations. The budget requested exemption of the International Civil Aviation Organization, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, and the World Health Organization from the 25 percent ceiling. In accordance with existing legislation, the amount requested for each of these organizations has been reduced to the 25 percent level of assessment.

The total budgets of most of these organizations continue to escalate. Every effort should be made to hold down the overall budgets

and thus our contribution to them.

MISSIONS TO INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS

There is included in the bill \$6,600,000 to provide for the expenses of United States missions to seven international organizations and the expenses of delegations to four international parliamentary groups.

The budget included \$22,000 for a proposed increase in the rental of quarters at the Waldorf Astoria in New York. This request is specifically depied.

INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCES AND CONTINGENCIES

Also included in the bill is the sum of \$6,400,000 to finance United States participation in multilateral intergovernmental conferences and contributions to new or provisional international organizations. This amount is an increase of \$200,000 over the appropriation for the current fiscal year.

INTERNATIONAL TRADE NEGOTIATIONS

The bill includes \$2,000,000 for participation in international trade negotiations being conducted under the sponsorship of the contracting parties of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT). The amount included, although \$465,000 below the amount requested, is \$256,000 more than the fiscal year 1974 appropriation for this purpose.

International Commissions

INTERNATIONAL BOUNDARY AND WATER COMMISSION, UNITED STATES AND MEXICO

A total of \$10,932,000 is recommended for the two appropriation items under the International Boundary and Water Commission, United States and Mexico. \$4,701,000 of that amount is for the "Salaries and Expenses" item and \$6,231,000 is for "Construction."

The Commission has a United States section headquartered at El Paso, Texas, and a Mexican section headquartered at Ciudad Juarez, Chihuahua. Its purpose is to solve boundary problems which require joint engineering action.

The construction item includes \$5,950,000 for the Lower Rio Grande Flood Control Improvement Program and \$281,000 related to settlement of boundary disputes.

Since there are still some problems on rights of way which have delayed the Tijuana River Flood Control Project for several years, the additional funds requested for that project have not been allowed.

The Committee deferred consideration of the request of \$94,575,000 for the Colorado River Salinity Control Project, since the legislation authorizing that project is still under consideration by the Congress.

AMERICAN SECTIONS, INTERNATIONAL COMMISSIONS

The Committee recommends \$1,300,000 for financing the United States share of expenses of the International Boundary Commission and the International Joint Commission. This amount, which is \$297,000 more than the total appropriation for the current fiscal year, includes \$344,500 for the International Boundary Commission and \$955,500 for the International Joint Commission.

The International Boundary Commission maintains United States-Canadian boundary markers in accordance with existing treaties and establishes and preserves boundary vistas by periodic tree cutting and vegetation control.

The International Joint Commission conducts investigations of boundary waters for the regulation of water level and flow, pollution abatement and water quality control, and related matters of mutual

concern to both countries.

INTERNATIONAL FISHERIES COMMISSIONS

The sum of \$4,030,000 is provided in the bill to cover the United States share of the expenses of ten international fisheries commissions in which it participates, as well as the expenses of the United States Commissioners. These commissions determine and undertake or recommend measures necessary for the preservation and expansion of fishery stocks.

EDUCATIONAL EXCHANGE

MUTUAL EDUCATIONAL AND CULTURAL EXCHANGE ACTIVITIES

The sum of \$53,000,000 is included in the bill for educational and cultural exchange programs carried out by the Department of State under authority of the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act of 1961. This amount is an increase of \$2,413,000 compared with

the current year appropriation.

In addition to the funds provided in the accompanying bill, activities are financed from other sources such as foreign currency reserves on hand in the binational educational foundations and commissions abroad, and contributions of foreign governments under cost-sharing arrangements. The amount estimated to be available from these other sources in fiscal year 1975 is \$2,881,436.

CENTER FOR CULTURAL AND TECHNICAL INTERCHANGE BETWEEN EAST AND WEST

The bill provides \$7,200,000 for the Center for Cultural and Technical Interchange Between East and West, a national educational institution located in Hawaii. This is an increase of \$275,000 over funds appropriated for the current fiscal year.

Through cooperative programs of research, study, and training, the Center promotes better relations and understanding between the

United States and the Asian and Pacific nations. The program is carried out by grant to the University of Hawaii, which operates the Center and administers the program through grants made to qualified persons for study or training at the Center.

TITLE II—DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

The total amount recommended in the accompanying bill for the Department of Justice is \$2,111,430,000. This is an increase of \$192,-233,000 over the total funds appropriated for the Department for fiscal year 1974.

LEGAL ACTIVITIES AND GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

The bill provides a total of \$241,080,000 for the several appropriation items under this general heading. The budget proposed the consolidation of appropriations for the "Antitrust Division" and the "United States Attorneys and Marshals" with the "General Legal Activities" appropriation. The Committee feels that these are distinctly different activities and that the funds therefor should be maintained in separate appropriation accounts.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

The bill includes \$21,850,000 for this item which includes funds for program direction and policy coordination, administrative review and appeals, support of legal activities, and the Watergate Special Prosecution Force. This is an increase of \$4,516,000 over the appropriation for fiscal year 1974 and will provide for five additional positions for the Board of Immigration Appeals, as well as all of the uncontrollable increases requested. The total amount included for General Administration reflects a transfer of the judicial examination function to the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts.

GENERAL LEGAL ACTIVITIES

A total of \$59,000,000 is provided for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Solicitor General, the Tax Division, the Criminal Division, the Controlled Substances Division, the Civil Division, the Land and Natural Resources Division, the Office of Legal Counsel, and the Civil Rights Division. The amount provided is an increase of \$5,639,000 over the appropriation for the current fiscal year. This allows funds for uncontrollable increases plus 16 of the additional positions requested. Twelve of the additional positions are for the Civil Division, two for the Office of Legal Counsel, and two for the Office of the Solicitor General.

The total amount of funds provided reflects the transfer in 1974 of certain enforcement activities to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

ANTITRUST DIVISION

The Committee recommends \$15,680,000 for salaries and expenses of the Antitrust Division. These funds are for the enforcement of antitrust, consumer protection and kindred laws. The amount allowed, which is \$890,000 over appropriations for fiscal year 1974, will provide for 20 new positions plus funds for uncontrollable increases.

UNITED STATES ATTORNEYS AND MARSHALS

A total of \$126,600,000 is recommended for expenses of the offices of United States attorneys and marshals. These offices are maintained in each of the 94 judicial districts of the United States. The amount recommended is an increase of \$18,550,000 over the current year funds. The increase will provide for 44 additional positions for the U.S. marshals and 120 additional positions for the U.S. attorneys (56 attorneys and 64 support personnel).

FEES AND EXPENSES OF WITNESSES

The sum of \$14,200,000 is included in the bill in order to pay fact and expert witnesses who appear on behalf of the Government in all cases to which the United States is a party. In addition, this item provides funds for the protection of witnesses in certain cases, as authorized by the Attorney General.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS SERVICE

The bill includes \$3,750,000 for necessary expenses of the Community Relations Service, which was established by the Civil Rights Act of 1964, to provide assistance to communities in resolving disputes, disagreements and difficulties arising from discriminatory practices which disrupt peaceful relations among citizens, and also where efforts are being made to eliminate disparities between groups, to achieve compliance with the Civil Rights Act, and to reduce and prevent racial disorders.

The amount included is \$199,000 more than the funds available during the current fiscal year and will provide for ten additional positions.

FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

The Committee recommends \$433,100,000 for the Federal Bureau of Investigation. This is an increase of \$40,806,000 over the appropriation for the current fiscal year, but is a reduction of \$2,500,000 from the total amount requested. The reduction is due largely to the general decrease of ten percent in the request for rental costs to be paid to the General Services Administration.

The increase of \$40,806,000 over the fiscal year 1974 appropriation includes funds for 25 additional clerks, the cost of moving to the J. Edgar Hoover FBI Building, increased costs for the FBI Academy at Quantico, Virginia, and additional equipment costs, as well as uncontrollable increases such as annualization of mandatory pay increases.

The Committee also recommends bill language to permit the FBI to purchase, lease, hire, maintain, operate and store aircraft. The language will enable the Bureau to acquire aircraft for surveillance in certain criminal investigations.

IMMIGRATION AND NATURALIZATION SERVICE

For expenses necessary for the administration and enforcement of laws relating to immigration, naturalization, and alien registration, the Committee recommends \$175,350,000, an increase of \$21,646,000 over

the total funds for the current fiscal year.

The increase will provide funds for 50 additional personnel (lapsed 50%), certain equipment purchases, increased detention and deportation costs, construction and repairs, as well as annualization of 300 additional positions provided in fiscal year 1974, and other uncontrollable increases.

FEDERAL PRISON SYSTEM

The Committee recommends a total of \$246,900,000 for the Federal Prison System.

SALARIES AND EXPENSES, BUREAU OF PRISONS

The sum of \$169,000,000 is provided for the administration, operation and maintenance of Federal penal and correctional institutions. This consists of custody, care and treatment of prisoners, inmate education, maintenance and operation of institutions, medical services, narcotic addict treatment, technical assistance to State and local governments, and general administration.

The sum provided for fiscal year 1975 is \$25,626,000 more than the funds available for the current fiscal year. The increase includes funds for the activation of four new facilities—the San Diego Metropolitan Correctional Center, the Chicago Metropolitan Correctional Center, the Miami Youth Center, and the San Diego Youth Center. Other major items of increase include per capita care increase, narcotic addict treatment programs and education programs.

The decrease of \$3,500,000 from the budget estimate is due to slippage in the activation of the new facilities and the general reduction of ten percent in the request for rental costs to be paid to the General

Services Administration.

BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES

The amount of \$53,200,000, the full amount of the budget estimate, is provided for construction and improvement of facilities in the Federal Prison System. The amount provided is for planning and site acquisition for an adult complex to be located in the Northeast, construction of youth complexes in the Northeast and the Southeast, and for repair, improvement and rehabilitation of existing facilities. The amount provided for improving existing facilities includes funds for the construction of two dormitories at the prison camp at Eglin Air Force Base in Florida.

SUPPORT OF UNITED STATES PRISONERS

The Committee recommends \$24,700,000, the full amount requested, for the support of United States prisoners in non-Federal institutions.

The Bureau of Prisons contracts with approximately 900 approved State and local jails to board Federal prisoners for short periods of time, such as before and during trial, during commitments and short sentences, or while awaiting transfer to Federal institutions.

LAW ENFORCEMENT ASSISTANCE ADMINISTRATION

The Committee bill provides \$880,000,000 for grants, contracts, loans, and other law enforcement assistance authorized by title I of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, as amended. This agency is charged with the responsibility of assisting State and local governments in reducing crime and improving the quality of the criminal justice system.

The amount provided is an increase of \$9,325,000 over the current year appropriation. This includes an increase of \$5,000,000 for planning

grants.

DRUG ENFORCEMENT ADMINISTRATION

The Committee recommends \$135,000,000 for necessary expenses of the Drug Enforcement Administration, an increase of \$22,336,000 over the appropriation for the current fiscal year. The amount recommended includes funds for uncontrollable increases and more than \$10,000,000 of the program increases requested. Funds have not been allowed for a new training facility, and the request for the space and services assessment by the General Services Administration has been reduced by 10 percent.

This agency, created on July 1, 1973, by Reorganization Plan No. 2 of 1973, is the investigative, intelligence, law enforcement, and regulatory agency responsible for suppression of illicit traffic in narcotics and dangerous drugs. The reorganization consolidated the drug investigative activities of the U.S. Customs Service in the Treasury Department and a number of programs in the Department of Justice; namely, the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs, the Office for Drug Abuse Law Enforcement, the Office of National Narcotics Intelligence, and the drug research activities of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration.

TITLE III—DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

The budget requests considered by the Committee for the Department of Commerce for fiscal year 1975 total \$1,406,817,000 in new budget authority, for which the Committee recommends a total of \$1,377,828,000. In addition, the sum of \$242,800,000, the full amount requested, is recommended in order to liquidate contractual obligations incurred in the operating subsidy program of the Maritime Administration.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

The bill includes \$9,800,000 for "Salaries and Expenses" to provide for the immediate Office of the Secretary and Assistant Secretaries, and the departmental staff offices, which assist in formulation of policy and in general management and administration of the Department of Commerce. The amount included is \$1,175,000 more than the funds available in fiscal year 1974 and is \$973,000 less than the budget request.

Social and Economic Statistics Administration

A total of \$70,977,000 is included in the bill to provide for the activities and programs of the Social and Economic Statistics Administration.

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The sum of \$47,977,000 is recommended for collecting, compiling and publishing economic, demographic, and social data, and for preparing, interpreting and projecting measures of economic activity. This amount is \$6,977,000 more than the current year appropriation. The increase is to cover highest priority needs including funds to complete and implement the industrial directory, improvement of bilateral foreign trade statistics, and improvement of balance of payments data.

PERIODIC CENSUSES AND PROGRAMS

The Committee recommends \$23,000,000 for periodic censuses and programs of the Social and Economic Statistics Administration. This amount, which is \$3,900,000 more than the appropriation for the current fiscal year, will provide for completion of the 1972 Economic Censuses, the collection of data and the initial processing on the 1974 Census of Agriculture, initiation of work on the 1977 Census of Governments, continuation of developmental work on the twentieth decennial census, geographic support programs, and funds for purchase and rental of data processing equipment.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION

The Committee considered budget requests for the Economic Development Administration totalling \$201,987,000, including \$31,987,000 related to Indian economic development requested in House Document Numbered 93–305. The Committee recommends \$201,825,000 for these programs.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

The bill includes \$184,200,000, the full amount of the budget request, for economic development assistance as authorized by titles I, II, III, and IV of the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965, as amended. The amount provided in the bill includes \$157,000,000 for public works grants, \$3,000,000 for public works loans, \$15,000,000 for industrial development loans and guarantees, and \$9,200,000 for planning, technical assistance and research.

ADMINISTRATION OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

The bill provides \$17,625,000 for expenses associated with administering the economic development assistance programs. The reduction of \$162,000 from the amount requested is due solely to the overall decrease of 10 percent in funds requested for the assessment by the General Services Administration for space and services.

REGIONAL ACTION PLANNING COMMISSIONS

REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

The sum of \$34,995,000 is included in the bill to provide for regional development programs as authorized by Title V of the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965, as amended. The programs are carried out by regional commissions which serve the Atlantic Coastal Plains of the southeast, the Four Corners of the southwest, the New England area, the Upper Missouri River region (Old West), the Ozarks, the Pacific Northwest region, and the Upper Great Lakes region.

The reduction of \$13,000 from the amount requested is due entirely to the 10 percent reduction in funds requested for the assessment by the General Services Administration for space and services.

DOMESTIC AND INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

OPERATIONS AND ADMINISTRATION

The bill includes \$58,500,000 for expenses of domestic and international business activities of the Department of Commerce. The amount included is an increase of \$4,800,000 over the current year funds and will permit program increases for the highest priority items, especially the request for field operations.

MINORITY BUSINESS ENTERPRISE

MINORITY BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

The Committee recommends \$53,000,000 for necessary expenses of the Department of Commerce in fostering, promoting, and developing minority business enterprise. The total request of \$94,901,000 for this program included \$39,527,000 for the Community Development Corporation program, now a part of the Office of Economic Opportunity. The Committee has deferred action on that portion of the request since legislation transferring the program to the Department of Commerce has not yet been enacted.

United States Travel Service

The amount of \$11,500,000 is included in the bill to develop plans and carry out programs to stimulate and encourage travel to the United States by residents of foreign countries. This amount, which is \$400,000 more than the total appropriated for such purpose for the current fiscal year, will permit the agency to continue the program at the current level.

The travel promotion programs are now concentrated in the six foreign countries with the greatest potential for producing tourism revenue for the United States. These countries are Canada, Mexico, the United Kingdom, France, West Germany, and Japan.

NATIONAL OCEANIC AND ATMOSPHERIC ADMINISTRATION

A total of \$452,298,000 is included in the bill for the four appropriation items under the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Admin-

istration. This is \$69,273,000 more than the total appropriated for these programs for the current fiscal year.

OPERATIONS, RESEARCH, AND FACILITIES

The Committee recommends \$436,300,000 for the various activities carried out under this appropriation. This amount, which is \$69,299,-000 more than the appropriation for the current fiscal year, will provide for the existing program level plus more than \$25,000,000 of the program increases requested and \$1,300,000 for construction, operation and maintenance of rearing ponds for the propagation of salmon and steelhead fish.

The \$25,000,000 covers increases requested for the sea grant program, the automation of nautical charts, modernization of the geodetic control system, replacement of obsolete weather radars, the environmental satellite service, public weather services, and procurement of aircraft for the weather modification program, as well as other high priority items.

With respect to the funds for rearing ponds, the Committee recognizes that new pressures have been placed on salmon and steelhead fisheries in the Columbia River, and recognizing that this major source of protein is almost unlimited, the committee has added \$1,300,000 to promote the propagation of these species as follows:

To make operational the Cascade Park Pond and the Wahkeena Pond (near Bonneville) \$330,000, plus the sum of \$70,000 for capital construction modification.

\$300,000 for construction of a new rearing pond on the Sandy River and \$150,000 for operation and maintenance.

\$300,000 for construction of a new rearing pond on the Clackamas River and \$150,000 for operation and maintenance.

The committee expects future budgets to include funds for the full operation and maintenance of each of these four ponds.

COASTAL ZONE MANAGEMENT

The bill includes \$12,000,000, the full amount requested, for carrying out the provisions of Public Law 92–583, the Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972. This appropriation provides for developmental and estuarine sanctuary grants to the States for the planning and management of their coastal areas. The amount included is the same as the appropriation for the current fiscal year.

ADMINISTRATION OF PRIBILOF ISLANDS

The sum of \$3,937,000 is recommended for administration of the Pribilof Islands. These funds, which are derived partially from the sale of sealskins, are for management of the fur seal herd, for schooling and other community services for natives of the islands, for buildings and roads, and for maintenance and operation of a supply vessel.

FISHERMEN'S GUARANTY FUND

The amount of \$61,000 is contained in the bill for payment to the Fishermen's Guaranty Fund. These funds, plus fees from vessel

owners, provide for payment to vessel owners and crews for certain financial losses sustained as a result of seizure of fishing vessels by foreign countries.

NATIONAL BUREAU OF FIRE PREVENTION

The bill includes \$7,000,000 for fire service education and training programs, operation of a National Fire Data System, and a research and development program on fire prevention and flammability.

PATENT OFFICE

The sum of \$76,300,000 is recommended for salaries and expenses of the Patent Office, to administer the laws governing the granting of patents for invention and the registration of trademarks. This sum is an increase of \$4,318,000 over the funds available for the current fiscal year, which were included in the appropriation for scientific and technical research and services. The increase will provide funds for about half of the 51 additional positions requested.

Since the Committee feels that the functions of the Patent Office are not sufficiently similar to the scientific and technical research responsibilities of the National Bureau of Standards, the Office of Telecommunications, and the National Technical Information Service to warrant continuation of the present joint appropriation, a separate appropriation is provided for fiscal year 1975.

SCIENCE AND TECHNICAL RESEARCH

The bill includes \$60,400,000 for "Scientific and technical research and services". This item includes funds for the National Bureau of Standards, the National Technical Information Service, and the Office of Telecommunications. Funds for the Patent Office were included in this item in the fiscal year 1974 appropriation, however, a separate appropriation item for the Patent Office is carried in the bill for fiscal year 1975.

The amount included in the bill is \$4,832,000 less than the comparable appropriation for the current fiscal year. However, a carryover of unobligated funds estimated at \$6,797,000 will permit a program level of \$67,197,000 for these activities. This will provide program increases of more than \$2,200,000. About half of the 60 additional positions requested for the National Bureau of Standards have been allowed.

MARITIME ADMINISTRATION

The Committee recommends a total of \$584,033,000 for the four appropriation items under the Maritime Administration. This total includes \$341,233,000 in new budget authority and \$242,800,000 for funds to liquidate obligations incurred under contract authority.

SHIP CONSTRUCTION

The sum of \$275,000,000 is included in the bill for construction subsidies for shipyards in the United States. This amount, which is the same as the current year appropriation, will provide subsidies for four tankers, four very large crude carriers, and four liquefied natural gas carriers.

OPERATING-DIFFERENTIAL SUBSIDIES

(LIQUIDATION OF CONTRACT AUTHORITY)

The bill includes \$242,800,000, the full amount requested, for the payment of obligations incurred for operating-differential subsidies to American ship operators. These subsidies enable American flag vessels to compete successfully on a comparable operating cost basis with vessels of foreign steamship companies.

RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

The Committee recommends \$25,900,000 for the research and development program of the Maritime Administration. This amount is \$6,900,000 more than the fiscal year 1974 appropriation, but is a reduction of \$2,000,000 from the amount requested. The objective of this program is to explore and find ways to make the U.S. merchant fleet and the U.S. shipbuilding fleet more efficient and competitive.

OPERATIONS AND TRAINING

The sum of \$40,333,000 is included in the bill for administration and direction of the various maritime programs, as well as the cost of officer training at the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy and Federal financial support to State marine schools. This sum is \$3,506,000 more than the funds available for the current fiscal year. The increase is primarily for mandatory items and the facilities modernization program at the Merchant Marine Academy.

TITLE IV—THE JUDICIARY

The budget requests for the Federal Judiciary total \$313,238,600. These requests are submitted to the Congress without revision by the Office of Management and Budget, as directed by the Budget and Accounting Act of 1921, as amended.

The bill includes \$292,173,100 for these items, an increase of \$78,163,800 over the funds appropriated for fiscal year 1974. These appropriations provide funds for operating the Federal courts, including salaries of judges, judicial officers and employees, and other expenses of the Federal Judiciary.

SUPREME COURT OF THE UNITED STATES

The bill provides a total of \$6,777,100 for the six appropriation items under the Supreme Court. Although this amount is a decrease of \$144,200 from the total appropriations for the current fiscal year, it will provide for ten additional positions (lapsed at 25 percent); annualization of mandatory pay increases, within-grade salary increases, increased printing costs, continuation of the computer system now being installed, and other miscellaneous increases. The decrease is due to non-recurring costs in the fiscal year 1974 budget for care of the Supreme Court building.

The following table shows the amount recommended for each of the Supreme Court items:

COURT OF CUSTOMS AND PATENT APPEALS

The sum of \$782,000 is included in the bill for salaries and expenses of the Court of Customs and Patent Appeals. This amount is an increase of \$105,000 over the current year appropriation and will permit the hiring of five additional technical advisors, one for each judge. The budget request included the additional positions on a full year basis. The amount allowed reflects a more realistic figure, lapsing those positions by 25 percent.

Customs Court

The bill provides \$2,479,000 for salaries and expenses of the Customs Court, \$55,000 more than the funds provided for the current fiscal year.

COURT OF CLAIMS

The full amount of the budget estimate, \$2,341,000, is included in the accompanying bill for the salaries and expenses of the Court of Claims. This is an increase of \$147,000 over the funds appropriated to the Court for the current fiscal year.

COURTS OF APPEALS, DISTRICT COURTS, AND OTHER JUDICIAL SERVICES

The total amount recommended for the nine appropriation items under this heading is \$208,619,000. This amount is \$8,177,000 less than the budget requests of \$216,796,000, but is an increase of \$8,899,000 over the total appropriated for the current fiscal year.

SALARIES OF JUDGES

The bill includes \$27,975,000, the full amount requested for this item, which covers the salaries and benefits of all active circuit and district judges, and all justices and judges retired or resigned in pursuance of law, as well as annuities paid to widows of Supreme Court Justices.

SALARIES OF SUPPORTING PERSONNEL

The bill also includes \$96,400,000 to provide for supporting personnel required to assist judges in the conduct of hearings, trials, and other judicial functions and to staff the component offices of the courts, including the Federal Probation System.

The amount included will provide an increase of \$6,400,000 over the fiscal year 1974 appropriation. The increase is for annualization of salary increases and additional personnel provided in fiscal year 1974, an extra compensable day, within-grade salary advancements, promotion plan for probation officers, reclassification of deputy clerks and assistant librarians, conversion of a part-time library assistant to full-time status, establishment of supervisory positions in the Courts of Appeals as requested, and half of the amount requested for salary adjustments for court reporters. Also included are funds for additional personnel as follows:

6 deputy clerks for courts of appeals 59 deputy clerks for district courts

320 probation officers

199 clerk-stenographers for the Probation Service

21 secretaries for circuit judges

8 positions for the Fifth Circuit, plus conversion of 22 positions to permanent status

3 positions for Judicial Panel on Multidistrict litigation

24 positions for senior judges

REPRESENTATION BY COURT-APPOINTED COUNSEL AND OPERATION OF DEFENDER ORGANIZATIONS

The Committee recommends \$15,700,000 for the compensation and expenses of court-appointed counsel and for the operation of defender

organizations.

This appropriation contains no funds for counsel appointed by judges of the District of Columbia Court of Appeals or by judges of the Superior Court of the District of Columbia. The District of Columbia budget for fiscal year 1975 includes a request of \$2,300,000 for counsel appointed by those courts. The request is now pending before the subcommittee on District of Columbia appropriations.

FEES OF JURORS

The bill includes \$18,500,000 for the payment of fees, expenses, and costs of jurors and for the compensation of jury commissioners. This sum is the full amount requested and is the same as the appropriation for the current fiscal year.

TRAVEL AND MISCELLANEOUS EXPENSES

The sum of \$15,200,000 is contained in the bill for expenses of travel and subsistence incurred by judges and supporting personnel in attending sessions of court or transacting other official business, and for equipment, lawbooks, supplies, and other expenses of operating the 94 district courts of the United States and the 11 courts of appeals.

The sum allowed is \$2,291,000 more than the amount available for the current fiscal year and includes funds for expenses associated with the new personnel in the appropriation for "Salaries of Supporting Personnel."

ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE OF THE UNITED STATES COURTS

The bill provides \$5,090,000 for the expenses of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts, which, under the direction and supervision of the Judicial Conference of the United States, is responsi-

ble for the administration of the United States Courts, including the probation and bankruptcy systems.

The amount provided is \$882,000 more than the current year appropriation. It includes funds for 39 new positions as follows:

10 for an Office of Judicial Examination

3 for a Defender Unit

3 for a Defender Unit 2 for the Office of the General Counsel

2 for the Magistrate Division 2 for the Personnel Division

5 for the Probation Division

5 for the Information Systems Division

10 for the Business Administration Division

SALARIES AND EXPENSES OF UNITED STATES MAGISTRATES

The full amount of the budget request, \$8,764,000, is provided for the salaries and expenses of United States magistrates, including secretarial and clerical assistance. This amount is \$927,000 more than the appropriation for the current fiscal year.

SALARIES OF REFEREES

The sum of \$6,990,000 is included in the bill for the salaries of referees. These referees are appointed by the United States district courts, which are the courts of bankruptcy and are vested with original jurisdiction in proceedings brought under the bankruptcy statutes.

EXPENSES OF REFEREES

The bill includes \$14,000,000 for the expenses of referees, including compensation and benefits of clerical employees.

FEDERAL JUDICIAL CENTER

The bill provides \$2,400,000 for expenses of the Federal Judicial Center, which is charged with the responsibility for furthering the development and adoption of improved judicial administration in the courts of the United States. This amount is \$327,000 more than the appropriation for the current fiscal year.

SPACE AND FACILITIES, THE JUDICIARY

The bill provides \$66,100,000 for the rental of space, utilities, alterations, maintenance, and other tenant services for the United States Courts of Appeals and District Courts, the Court of Customs and Patent Appeals, the Customs Court, the Court of Claims, the Administrative Office of the United States Courts, and the Federal Judicial Center.

The original budget estimate for this purpose was informally reduced by the Judiciary from \$78,500,000 to \$72,600,000. The amount provided reflects a further reduction of ten percent in the standard level user charge levied by the General Services Administration.

The bill includes language authorizing the transfer of these funds to the General Services Administration, which would be responsible for administering the appropriation.

EXPENSES, UNITED STATES COURT FACILITIES

The sum of \$2.675.000 is included in the accompanying bill for the procurement of furniture and furnishings for United States court facilities.

The bill includes language authorizing the transfer of this appropriation to the General Services Administration, which would procure the furniture and furnishings as they have in the past.

TITLE V—RELATED AGENCIES

The Committee recommends a total of \$824,757,000 for the thirteen related agencies included in this title. This is \$227.580,000 more than the amounts appropriated to these agencies for fiscal year 1974. The increase is due primarily to the appropriation of additional capital to the revolving funds of the Small Business Administration.

ARMS CONTROL AND DISARMAMENT AGENCY

The sum of \$9,250,000 is recommended for arms control and disarmament activities. This amount, which is an increase of \$1,185,000 over the current year appropriation, will provide additional funds for rising costs associated with the Strategic Arms Limitations talks, the negotiations on Mutual Balanced Force Reductions and other negotiations, and external research related to those efforts.

BOARD FOR INTERNATIONAL BROADCASTING

The bill includes \$49,800,000 for expenses of the Board for International Broadcasting, including grants to Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty. This amount includes \$250,000 for expenses of the Board itself, \$30,685,000 for Radio Free Europe, and \$18,865,000 for Radio Liberty.

Commission on Civil Rights

The sum of \$6,850,000 is recommended for expenses of the Commission on Civil Rights. This is an increase of \$900,000 over the funds approved for the current fiscal year. The increase is for annualization of additional positions granted in fiscal year 1974 and other mandatory items, including payment to the General Services Administration for space and services (reduced by 10 percent).

COMMISSION ON THE ORGANIZATION OF THE GOVERNMENT FOR THE CONDUCT OF FOREIGN POLICY

The amount of \$1,250,000 is provided for the expenses of the Commission on the Organization of the Government for the Conduct of Foreign Policy. This Commission, authorized by the Foreign Relations Authorization Act of 1972, is to study and investigate the organization, methods of operation and powers of all departments, agencies, independent establishments, and instrumentalities of the U.S. Government participating in the formulation and implementation of U.S. foreign policy and is to make recommendations which it considers appropriate to provide improved governmental processes and programs in the formulation and implementation of such policy. The Commission is required to submit its final report to the President and the Congress by June 30, 1975.

EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY COMMISSION

The sum of \$52,347,000 is included in the bill for expenses of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, established by title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. This amount, which is \$7,947,000 more than the current year appropriation, includes \$2,500,000 for payments to State and local agencies for services rendered to the Commission. Also included are funds for enforcement activities transferred from the Department of Justice in fiscal year 1974.

FEDERAL MARITIME COMMISSION

The amount of \$7,300,000 is provided for salaries and expenses of the Federal Maritime Commission, which administers shipping statutes dealing with domestic and international commerce of the United States. The amount allowed is \$915,000 more than the funds appropriated for the current fiscal year.

FOREIGN CLAIMS SETTLEMENT COMMISSION

The bill provides \$1,240,000 for the Foreign Claims Settlement Commission, which is responsible for settling the claims of U.S. nationals against foreign nations and other claims programs as authorized by law. The amount provided, which is an increase of \$293,000 over the funding for the current fiscal year, is primarily for the adjudication of Micronesian claims. However, funds are included to process anticipated claims resulting from the claims agreement recently negotiated with Hungary.

MARINE MAMMAL COMMISSION

The Committee bill provides \$600,000 for expenses of the Marine Mammal Commission, which was established by the Marine Mammal Protection Act of 1972. This amount is \$188,000 more than the funds appropriated for the current fiscal year.

The Commission is to: (1) review and study the condition of the stock of marine mammals to preserve and protect them in accordance with existing laws and conservation practices, (2) recommend to the Secretaries of State, Interior, and Commerce steps deemed necessary for further protection and conservation, and (3) recommend changes to the Endangered Species List.

NATIONAL COMMISSION FOR THE REVIEW OF FEDERAL AND STATE LAWS RELATING TO WIRETAPPING AND ELECTRONIC SURVEILLANCE

The sum of \$332,000 is included in the accompanying bill for expenses of this Commission, which was established by the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 to study wiretapping and electronic surveillance. The sum included in the bill is the same as the current year appropriation. This amount plus an estimated carryover of \$240,000 will be sufficient for carrying out the program for fiscal year 1975.

SMALL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

The bill provides a total of \$445,500,000 in three separate appropriation items for the Small Business Administration. This total is an

increase of \$196,527,000 over the amounts appropriated for fiscal year 1974.

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For salaries and expenses of the Small Business Administration, the Committee recommends a direct appropriation of \$26,500,000, plus the authority to transfer not to exceed \$84,650,000 from the revolving funds. The amount recommended is an increase of \$3,500,000 in the direct appropriation and an increase of \$6,500,000 in the transfer authority. About half of the 267 additional positions requested have been allowed.

BUSINESS LOAN AND INVESTMENT FUND

For additional capital for the Business Loan and Investment Fund, the bill includes the sum of \$328,000,000, the full amount of the budget request.

DISASTER LOAN FUND

The amount included in the bill for additional capital for the Disaster Loan Fund of the Small Business Administration is \$91,000,000. This is the total amount requested for the Fund.

SPECIAL REPRESENTATIVE FOR TRADE NEGOTIATIONS

The bill includes \$1,850,000 for expenses of the Office of the Special Representative for Trade Negotiations, which supervises and coordinates certain aspects of U.S. trade policy, consistent with overall international economic objectives. The Office administers the trade agreements program and directs U.S. participation in trade negotiations with other countries. The amount included in the bill for this Office is an increase of \$331,000 over the current year appropriation. The increase is primarily for the computer program and uncontrollable costs. No additional positions were requested or allowed.

TARIFF COMMISSION

For salaries and expenses of the Tariff Commission, the Committee recommends the sum of \$8,900,000, an increase of \$1,500,000 over the fiscal year 1974 appropriation. The increase is primarily for annualization of additional positions granted in fiscal year 1974 and other mandatory costs.

United States Information Agency

A total of \$239,538,000 is provided in the bill in four separate appropriations items for the activities of the United States Information Agency. This total is an increase of \$18,624,000 over the total funds appropriated for these activities for the current fiscal year.

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

The bill includes \$228,368,000 for salaries and expenses of the United States Information Agency to carry out international information activities as authorized by law. This amount is made up of \$219,668,000 carried in the "Salaries and Expenses" item and \$8,700,-

000 carried in "Salaries and Expenses (special foreign currency program)." The total amount is \$19,306,000 more than the funds appropriated for this purpose for the current fiscal year.

SPECIAL INTERNATIONAL EXHIBITIONS

The sum of \$6,770,000 is recommended for the dollar account of the special international exhibitions program. This program includes labor missions to selected fairs and exhibitions, and exhibits at major international trade fairs.

ACQUISITION AND CONSTRUCTION OF RADIO FACILITIES

The bill includes \$4,400,000 for acquisition and construction of radio facilities. This includes funds for the improvement of antenna complements of the Voice of America relay stations at Dixon and Delano, California.

TITLE VI—FEDERAL PRISON INDUSTRIES, INCORPORATED

The bill places a limitation of \$1,804,000 on the amount of funds available for administrative expenses of this corporation and a limitation of \$5,051,000 on the amount for vocational training of

prisoners.

This is a wholly owned Government corporation. A board of six directors, appointed by the President, controls its policies. Supervision is by the Director of the Bureau of Prisons who has jurisdiction over all industrial enterprises and vocational training programs in all Federal penal and correctional institutions. Products manufactured by inmates are sold only to institutions in the Federal Prison System and to other Government agencies. Earnings, in excess of operating requirements, are paid as dividends into the U.S. Treasury.

The Corporation is authorized, under the Attorney General, to establish and operate industries in Federal penal and correctional institutions and disciplinary barracks (18 U.S.C. 4121-4128). Its purposes are to provide employment for inmates, provide maximum vocational training for qualified inmates in connection with regular institutional and industrial activities, and to operate a placement

service to assist released inmates to secure jobs.

LIMITATIONS AND LEGISLATIVE PROVISIONS

The following limitations and legislative provisions not heretofore carried in connection with any appropriation bill are recommended:

On page 13, in connection with Salaries and expenses, general administration:

not to exceed \$2,500 for official reception and representation expenses;

On page 15, in connection with Fees and expenses of witnesses: including advances

On page 16, in connection with the Federal Bureau of Investigation: purchase, lease, hire, maintenance, operation and storage of aircraft;

On page 21, in connection with the Drug Enforcement Administration:

benefits in accordance with those provided under 22 U.S.C. 1136(9)-(11), under regulations prescribed by the Secretary of State;

On page 24, in connection with Domestic and International Business Administration:

full medical coverage for dependent members of immediate families of employees stationed overseas;

On page 28, in connection with National Bureau of Fire Prevention:

NATIONAL BUREAU OF FIRE PREVENTION
OPERATIONS, RESEARCH, AND ADMINISTRATION

For expenses necessary to carry out the provisions of the Federal Fire Prevention and Control Act of 1974, to remain available until expended, \$7,000,000.

- On page 34, in connection with Care of the Building and Grounds: to remain available until expended: Provided, That not to exceed \$371,500 of the unobligated balance of the appropriation under this head for the fiscal year 1974 is hereby continued available until expended.
- On page 38, in connection with Space and Facilities, the Judiciary: to be available for transfer to the General Services Administration which shall be responsible for administering the program in compliance with standards or guidelines prescribed by the Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts under the supervision and direction of the Judicial Conference of the United States.

On page 39, in connection with Expenses, United States Court Facilities:

to be available for transfer to the General Services Administration which shall be responsible for administering the program in compliance with standards or guidelines prescribed by the Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts under the supervision and direction of the Judicial Conference of the United States.

- On page 41, in connection with Federal Maritime Commission: Provided, That not to exceed \$1,500 shall be available for official reception and representation expenses.
- On page 43, in connection with Small Business Administration: not to exceed \$1,500 for official reception and representation expenses,

SEC. 706. No part of any appropriation contained in this Act shall be available for paying to the Administrator of the General Services Administration in excess of 90 per centum of the standard level user charge established pursuant to section 210(j) of the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949, as amended, for space and services.

For Payment to the Foreign Service Retirement and Disability Fund the Committee recommends \$20,535,000 the full amount of the budget estimate. This sum is the same as approved by the House and

the 1974 appropriation.

Included in the amount recommended is \$15,600,000, as required by law, to cover costs related to Agency for International Development career Foreign Service employees who are now covered under the Foreign Service Retirement Fund. This annual payment is required to cover the unfunded liability created in the Fund due to the transfer of AID employees.

The Committee believes that payments related to employees of the Agency For International Development should be included in the budget request for AID. However, for fiscal 1975, the Committee believes that the \$15,600,000 should be appropriated under this head since the sum was not requested in the budget for AID.

For Contributions to International Organizations the Committee recommends \$205,903,000. This sum represents a reduction of \$12,634,-000 below the fiscal 1974 appropriation and \$8,176,000 below the budget request. The amount recommended is the same as approved by the House.

In October 1972 (P.L. 92-544, Oct. 25, 1972), the Congress established a maximum United States contribution of 25 percent of the total annual assessment of the United Nations and its affiliated agencies effective January 1974. This limitation applies to all these organizations except the International Atomic Energy Agency and the joint financing program of the International Civil Aviation Organization.

The Department has requested exemptions from this 25 percent limitation for the calendar year 1974 United States contributions to the World Health Organization, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization and the regular program of the Inter-

national Civil Aviation Organization.

The Committee believes that adequate notice was given in October 1972 that the United States contribution had to be reduced. Therefore the Committee does not concur in the Department's request for an exception for calendar year 1975. The Committee also notes that other member nations of each of the three organizations are in arrears in their contributions. Accordingly, the Committee has not recommended restoration of the \$8.2 million House reduction.

As the Committee stated last year in its 1974 Report, No. 93-390, the Department of State should assume responsibility for funding all official delegations to conferences under this head. During its hearings the Committee determined that other departments and agencies are still financing the expenses of delegates and observers from their appropriations. The Committee was informed that only one-half of the United States conference delegations are financed from this appropriation. This hampers the Department's ability to maintain tight conference control and guidance over these conference activities.

The Committee expects the Department to request, for fiscal 1976, full funding for United States participation in these multilateral international conferences. This will permit the Committee to evaluate the management of these activities on a government-wide basis. Increased costs to provide adequate funds for this purpose will be more than offset by reductions in other department and agency appropriations.

For a new appropriation, for the International Commission of Control and Supervision, Viet-Nam, the Committee recommends \$5,658,-000, a reduction in the Budget amendment of \$22,068,000. Of this sum. \$11,200,000 was to reimburse the Agency for International Development by the Department of State for money advanced in fiscal 1974 by AID to pay the United States contribution to the Commission. The Committee was informed that this advance was made largely from the contingency fund available to AID, which is an annual appropriation. This request is not authorized. However, S. 3562, introduced by request to authorize the full amount, in addition to authorizing the reimbursement of fiscal 1974 funds to AID, also provides that the \$11,200,000 may be credited to applicable appropriations of AID and shall be available for the fiscal 1975. This provision in the authorizing bill, if approved, would in effect increase the budget for AID by \$11,200,000, without reference to the two subcommittees on appropriations for Foreign Operations.

The amount recommended is to provide only the U.S. share of the Commission cost. It does not include any funds for the shares of North Viet-Nam or the Peoples Revolutionary Government as requested in

the amendment.

For the Immigration and Naturalization Service, the Committee recommends \$176,350,000 and 100 additional new positions (lapsed 50 percent) for the Border Patrol. The 100 positions when added to the House allowance of 50 new positions will provide a total of 150 positions. The sum recommended is \$1,000,000 over the House allowance, \$7,750,000 under the budget and an increase of \$22,646,000 over the adjusted appropriation for 1974. This increase in addition to funding the 150 new positions, will provide for certain equipment purchases, increased detention and deportation costs, construction and repairs, as well as the annualization of 300 additional positions which were provided in the First Supplemental Appropriation Act of 1974, and other uncontrollable increases.

During its hearings the Committee was informed by the Commissioner of the Immigration Service that approximately 99 percent of the illegal aliens entering the United States do so to secure gainful empolyment at wages higher than those prevailing in their country of origin. To assist in curtailing this situation, the Committee urges the Senate Judiciary Committee to expedite its consideration of legislation, which has passed the House, and which would make it unlawful for an employer to knowingly employ an alien illegally in this country.

The \$3,500,000 reduction in the budget estimate is due to delays in the activation of the new facilities and the general reduction of ten percent in the request in rental costs to be paid to the General Services Administration.

During its hearing the Committee heard extensive testimony from concerned citizens on the need for a moratorium on funding new prison construction by the Federal Government so as to determine the possibilities of placing greater emphasis on rehabilitation of prisoners rather than incarceration. The Committee recognizes that some prisoners cannot be rehabilitated for a variety of reasons. However the Committee was informed that approximately 75 percent of the prison population at any one time can be rehabilitated, if the prison system uses existing and newly developing methods and techniques. For these reasons the Committee is recommending that the \$39,350,000 contained in the budget for planning, site acquisition and construction be deleted.

This increase includes funds for uncontrollable increases such as annualization of positions, increased pay costs and a net transfer of \$6,330,000 to GSA for space rental and other tenant services.

On August 5, 1974, the building housing the DEA Regional Office and Laboratory in Miami, Florida physically collapsed. Seven DEA employees died in this tragedy and a number of people were injured. An an aftermath, it has become necessary to relocate the Regional Office and the Regional Laboratory, first into temporary quarters to continue operations, and later this fiscal year into new permanent locations.

On August 8, 1974, the Department requested that \$2,841,000 be made available within the sum reduced by the House and not appealed. The Committee is fully aware of the need for additional funds. However, the Committee believes that this request should be processed through the normal budgetary channels and has instructed the Department to request the Office of Management and Budget to submit a supplemental budget estimate in whatever amout is finally determined to be needed. In the meantime, the budgtary apportionment process will temporarily provide funding for DEA's immediate needs.

GENERAL PROVISIONS—DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Section 203, the language of which has been carried in the bill under General Provisions for several years, requires that from moneys on deposit in the U.S. Treasury to the credit of the District of Columbia, there shall be transferred to the General Fund of the Treasury, 53 percent of the total annual cost of U.S. Attorneys and U.S. Marshals

serving in the District of Columbia, for services rendered the District. The transfer has no effect on the annual total appropriations for U.S. Attorneys and U.S. Marshals. Reimbursement to the Treasury from District funds has been made pursuant to an estimate furnished by the Department of Justice as to the dollar amount necessary to equal 53 percent. The D.C. Appropriation Act of 1975 carries a proviso limiting the amount that can be reimbursed to the United States to \$1,159,800.

Therefore, in order to bring Section 203, which carries a percentage limitation, in conformance with the dollar limitation included in the 1975 D.C. Appropriation Act, the Committee has added a proviso reading as follows:

: Provided, That notwithstanding the provisions of this section, not to exceed \$1,159,800 from any funds in the Treasury of the United States to the credit of the District of Columbia shall be available for reimbursement to the United States pursuant to this section.

The Committee has been informed that contained in the D.C. Budget was the sum of \$5,732,500. This estimate is being reduced by \$4,572,694 to offset overpayments in 1971 (\$676,803), 1972 (\$1,898,363) and 1973 (\$1,997,528) when the 75 percent requirement was in effect.

The Committee had before it Senate Amendment No. 1612 introduced on July 25, 1974, and referred to the Committee. This amendment would preclude the Department of Justice from using appropriated funds in this bill for installation and maintenance of wiretaps which do not have the prior authorization of a judicial warrant.

The Committee after discussion reached the conclusion that this amendment should be referred to the Senate for its consideration and decision.

Products manufactured by inmates are sold only to the institutions in the Federal Prison System and to other Government agencies. Earnings in excess of operating requirements are paid as dividends into the U.S. Treasury.

The Corporation is authorized, under the Attorney General, to establish and operate industries in Federal penal and correctional institutions and disciplinary barracks (18 U.S.C. 4121-4128). Its purposes are to provide employment for inmates; to provide maximum vocational training for qualified inmates in connection with regular institutional and industrial activities; and to operate a placement service

to assist released inmates to secure jobs.

CONFERENCE REPORT

[To accompany H.R. 15404]

The committee of conference on the disagreeing votes of the two Houses on the amendments of the Senate to the bill (H.R. 15404) "making appropriations for the Departments of State, Justice, and Commerce, the Judiciary, and Related Agencies for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1975, and for other purposes," having met, after full and free conference, have agreed to recommend and do recommend to their respective Houses as follows:

That the Senate recede from its amendments numbered 23 and 27. That the House recede from its disagreement to the amendments of the Senate numbered 9, 12, 13, 15, 17, 20, 25, 26, 29, 36, and 38, and agree to the same.

Amendment numbered 2:

Making appropriations for the Departments of State, Justice, and Commerce, the Judiciary, and related agencies for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1975, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following sums are appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the Departments of State, Justice, and Commerce, the Judiciary, and related agencies for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1975, and for other purposes, namely:

TITLE I—DEPARTMENT OF STATE

Administration of Foreign Affairs

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses of the Department of State, not otherwise provided for, including expenses authorized by the Foreign Service Act of 1946, as amended (22 U.S.C. 801-1158), and allowances as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 5921-5925; expenses of binational arbitrations arising under international air transport agreements; expenses necessary to meet the responsibilities and obligations of the United States in Garmany (including these origing under the garmany cuthority). Germany (including those arising under the supreme authority assumed by the United States on June 5, 1945, and under contractual arrangements with the Federal Republic of Germany); hire of passenger motor vehicles; services as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109; dues for library membership in organizations which issue publications to members only, or to members at a price lower than to others; expenses authorized by section 2 of the Act of August 1, 1956 (22 U.S.C. 2669), as amended; refund of fees erroneously charged and paid for pass-ports; radio communications; payment in advance for subscriptions to commercial information, telephone and similar services abroad; care and transportation of prisoners and persons declared insane; expenses, as authorized by law (18 U.S.C. 3192), of bringing to the United States from foreign countries persons charged with crime; expenses necessary to provide maximum physical security in Governmentowned and leased properties abroad; and procurement by contract or otherwise, of services, supplies, and facilities, as follows: (1) translating, (2) analysis and tabulation of technical information, and (3) preparation of special maps, globes, and geographic aids; \$349,650,000: Provided, That passenger motor vehicles in possession of the Foreign Service abroad may be replaced in accordance with section 7 of the Act of August 1, 1956 (22 U.S.C. 2674), and the cost, including the exchange allowance, of each such replacement shall not exceed \$4,900 in the case of the chief of mission automobile at each diplomatic mission (except that four such vehicles may be purchased at not to exceed \$9,000 each) and such amounts as may be otherwise provided by law for all other such vehicles: *Provided further*, That in addition, this appropriation shall be available for the purchase (not to exceed thirtythree), replacement, rehabilitation, and modification of passenger motor vehicles for protective purposes without regard to any maximum price limitations otherwise established by law.

For payment to the Foreign Service Retirement and Disability Fund, as authorized by the Foreign Service Act of 1946, as amended (22 U.S.C. 1105-1106), \$20,535,000.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS

For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary to meet annual obligations of membership in international multilateral organizations, pursuant to treaties, conventions, or specific Acts of Congress, \$205,903,000.

MISSIONS TO INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS

For expenses necessary for permanent representation to certain international organizations in which the United States participates pursuant to treaties, conventions, or specific Acts of Congress, including expenses authorized by the pertinent Acts and conventions provided for such representation; salaries and expenses of personnel and dependents as authorized by the Foreign Service Act of 1946, as amended (22 U.S.C. 801–1158); allowances as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 5921–5925; and expenses authorized by section 2 (a) and (e) of the Act of August 1, 1956, as amended (22 U.S.C. 2669); \$6,600,000.

INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCES AND CONTINGENCIES

For necessary expenses of participation by the United States, upon approval by the Secretary of State, in international activities which arise from time to time in the conduct of foreign affairs and for which specific appropriations have not been provided pursuant to treaties, conventions, or special Acts of Congress, including personal services without regard to civil service and classification laws; salaries and expenses of personnel and dependents as authorized by the Foreign Service Act of 1946, as amended (22 U.S.C. 801–1158); allowances as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 5921–5925; hire of passenger motor vehicles; contributions for the share of the United States in expenses of international organizations; and expenses authorized by section 2(a) of the Act of August 1, 1956, as amended (22 U.S.C. 2669); \$6,400,000, of which not to exceed a total of \$105,000 may be expended for representation allowances as authorized by section 901 of the Act of August 13, 1946, as amended (22 U.S.C. 1131) and for official entertainment.

For salaries and expenses not otherwise provided for, including examinations, preliminary surveys, and investigations, and operation and maintenance of projects or parts thereof, as enumerated above, including gaging stations, \$4,701,000: Provided, That expenditures for the Rio Grande bank protection project shall be subject to the provisions and conditions contained in the appropriation for said project as provided by the Act approved April 25, 1945 (59 Stat. 89).

CONSTRUCTION

For detailed plan preparation and construction of projects authorized by the convention concluded February 1, 1933, between the United States and Mexico, the Acts approved August 19, 1935, as amended (22 U.S.C. 277–277f), August 29, 1935 (49 Stat. 961), June 4, 1936 (49 Stat. 1463), June 28, 1941 (22 U.S.C. 277f), September 13, 1950 (22 U.S.C. 277d–1–9), October 10, 1966 (80 Stat. 884), October 25, 1972 (86 Stat. 1161), and the project stipulated in the treaty between the United States and Mexico signed at Washington on February 3, 1944, to remain available until expended, \$6,231,000: Provided, That no expenditures shall be made for the Lower Rio Grande flood-control project for construction on any land, site, or easement in connection with this project except such as has been acquired by donation and the title thereto has been approved by the Attorney General of the United States: Provided further, That the Anzalduas diversion dam shall not be operated for irrigation or water supply purposes in the United States unless suitable arrangements have been made with the prospective water users for repayment to the Government of such portions of the costs of said dam as shall have been allocated to such purposes by the Secretary of State.

AMERICAN SECTIONS, INTERNATIONAL COMMISSIONS

For expenses necessary to enable the President to perform the obligations of the United States pursuant to treaties between the United States and Great Britain, in respect to Canada, signed January 11, 1909 (36 Stat. 2448), and February 24, 1925 (44 Stat. 2102); and the treaty between the United States and Canada, signed February 27, 1950; including services as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109; hire of passenger motor vehicles; \$1,350,000, to be disbursed under the direction of the Secretary of State and to be available also for additional expenses of the American Sections, International Commissions, as hereinafter set forth:

International Joint Commission, United States and Canada, the salary of the Commissioners on the part of the United States who shall serve at the pleasure of the President; salaries of clerks and other employees appointed by the Commissioners on the part of the United States with the approval solely of the Secretary of State; travel expenses and compensation of witnesses in attending hearings of the Commission at such places in the United States and Canada as the Commission or the American Commissioners shall determine to be necessary; and special and technical investigations in connection with matters falling within the Commission's jurisdiction: *Provided*, That transfers of funds may be made to other agencies of the Government for the performance of work for which this appropriation is made

for the performance of work for which this appropriation is made.

International Boundary Commission, United States and Canada, the completion of such remaining work as may be required under the award of the Alaskan Boundary Tribunal and the existing treaties

between the United States and Great Britain; commutation of subsistence to employees while on field duty at not to exceed the authorized prevailing daily rate; hire of freight and passenger motor vehicles from temporary field employees; and payment for timber necessarily cut in keeping the boundary line clear.

INTERNATIONAL FISHERIES COMMISSIONS

For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary to enable the United States to meet its obligations in connection with participation in international fisheries commissions pursuant to treaties or conventions, and implementing Acts of Congress, \$4,030,000: Provided, That the United States share of such expenses may be advanced to the respective commissions.

EDUCATIONAL EXCHANGE

MUTUAL EDUCATIONAL AND CULTURAL EXCHANGE ACTIVITIES

For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary to enable the Secretary of State to carry out the functions of the Department of State under the provisions of the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act of 1961, as amended (22 U.S.C. 2451–2458), and the Act of August 9, 1939 (22 U.S.C. 501), including expenses authorized by the Foreign Service Act of 1946, as amended (22 U.S.C. 801–1158); expenses of the National Commission on Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Cooperation as authorized by sections 3, 5, and 6 of the Act of July 30, 1946 (22 U.S.C. 2870, 287q, 287r); hire of passenger motor vehicles; not to exceed \$1,000 for representation expenses; not to exceed \$1,000 for official entertainment within the United States; services as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109; and advance of funds notwithstanding section 3648 of the Revised Statutes, as amended (31 U.S.C. 529); \$54,000,000, of which not less than \$2,000,000 shall be used for payment in foreign currencies which the Treasury Department determines to be excess to the normal requirements of the United States: Provided, That not to exceed \$3,252,000 may be used for administrative expenses during the current fiscal year.

CENTER FOR CULTURAL AND TECHNICAL INTERCHANGE BETWEEN EAST AND WEST

To enable the Secretary of State to provide for carrying out the provisions of the Center for Cultural and Technical Interchange between East and West Act of 1960, by grant to any appropriate agency of the State of Hawaii, \$7,400,000: Provided, That none of the funds appropriated herein shall be used to pay any salary, or to enter into any contract providing for the payment thereof, in excess of the highest rate authorized in the General Schedule of the Classification Act of 1949, as amended.

GENERAL PROVISIONS—DEPARTMENT OF STATE

SEC. 102. Appropriations under this title for "Salaries and expenses", "International conferences and contingencies", and "Missions to international organizations" are available for reimbursement of the General Services Administration for security guard services for protection of confidential files.

Sec. 103. No part of any appropriation contained in this title shall be used to pay the salary or expenses of any person assigned to or serv-

ing in any office of any of the several States of the United States or any

political subdivision thereof.

Sec. 104. None of the funds appropriated in this title shall be used (1) to pay the United States contribution to any international organization which engages in the direct or indirect promotion of the principle or doctrine of one world government or one world citizenship; (2) for the promotion, direct or indirect, of the principle or doctrine of one world government or one world citizenship.

This title may be cited as the "Department of State Appropriation Act. 1975"

TITLE II—DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

LEGAL ACTIVITIES AND GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES, GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

For expenses necessary for the administration of the Department of Justice, including hire of passenger motor vehicles; not to exceed \$2,500 for official reception and representation expenses; and miscellaneous and emergency expenses authorized or approved by the Attorney General or the Assistant Attorney General for Administration; \$21,850,000, of which \$2,804,000 is for the Watergate Special Prosecution Force.

SALARIES AND EXPENSES, GENERAL LEGAL ACTIVITIES

For expenses necessary for the legal activities of the Department of Justice, not otherwise provided for, including miscellaneous and of Justice, not otherwise provided for, including miscellaneous and emergency expenses authorized or approved by the Attorney General or the Assistant Attorney General for Administration; not to exceed \$30,000 for expenses of collecting evidence, to be expended under the direction of the Attorney General and accounted for solely on his certificate; and advances of public moneys pursuant to law (31 U.S.C. 529); \$59,000,000: Provided, That not to exceed \$125,000 may be transferred to this appropriation from the "Alien Property Fund, World War II", for the general administrative expenses of alien property activities, including rent of private or Government-owned space in the District of Columbia. space in the District of Columbia.

SALARIES AND EXPENSES, ANTITRUST DIVISION

For expenses necessary for the enforcement of antitrust, consumer protection and kindred laws, \$16,762,000: Provided, That none of this appropriation shall be expended for the establishment and maintenance of permanent regional offices of the Antitrust Division.

SALARIES AND EXPENSES, UNITED STATES ATTORNEYS AND MARSHALS

For necessary expenses of the offices of the United States attorneys and marshals, including purchase of firearms and ammunition; \$126,600,000: Provided, That of the amount herein appropriated not to exceed \$200,000 shall be available for payment of compensation and expenses of Commissioners appointed in condemnation cases under Rule 71A(h) of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure.

FEES AND EXPENSES OF WITNESSES

For expenses, mileage, and per diems of witnesses and for per diems in lieu of subsistence, as authorized by law, and not to exceed \$1,500,000

for such compensation and expenses of expert witnesses pursuant to section 524 of title 28, United States Code, and sections 4244-48 of title 18, United States Code, including advances; \$14,200,000: Provided, That no part of the sum herein appropriated shall be used to pay any witness more than one attendance fee for any one calendar day.

SALARIES AND EXPENSES, COMMUNITY RELATIONS SERVICE

For necessary expenses of the Community Relations Service established by title X of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. 2000g–2000g–2), \$3,750,000.

FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For expenses necessary for the detection and prosecution of crimes against the United States; protection of the person of the President of the United States; acquisition, collection, classification and preservation of identification and other records and their exchange with, and for the official use of, the duly authorized officials of the Federal Government, of States, cities, and other institutions, such exchange to be subject to cancellation if dissemination is made outside the receiving departments or related agencies; and such other investigations regarding official matters under the control of the Department of Justice and the Department of State as may be directed by the Attorney General, including purchase for police-type use without regard to the general purchase price limitation for the current fiscal year not to exceed one thousand one hundred and seventy-nine (for replacement only) and hire of passenger motor vehicles; purchase (two), lease, hire, maintenance, operation and storage of aircraft; firearms and ammunition; not to exceed \$10,000 for taxicab hire to be used exclusively for the purposes set forth in this paragraph; payment of rewards; and not to exceed \$70,000 to meet unforeseen emergencies of a confidential character, to be expended under the direction of the Attorney General, and to be accounted for solely on his certificate; \$433,100,000.

None of the funds appropriated for the Federal Bureau of Investigation shall be used to pay the compensation of any civil-service employee.

Immigration and Naturalization Service

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary for the administration and enforcement of the laws relating to immigration, naturalization, and alien registration, including advance of cash to aliens for meals and lodging while en route; payment of allowances (at a rate not in excess of \$1 per day) to aliens, while held in custody under the immigration laws, for work performed; payment of rewards; not to exceed \$50,000 to meet unforeseen emergencies of a confidential character, to be expended under the direction of the Attorney General and accounted for solely on his certificate; purchase for police-type use without regard to the general purchase price limitation for the current fiscal year (not to exceed three hundred and seventy-five, of which three hundred and ten shall be for replacement only) and hire of passenger motor vehicles; purchase (not to exceed eight, of which two shall be for replacement only), lease, maintenance and operation of aircraft; firearms and ammunition, attendance at firearms matches;

refunds of head tax, maintenance bills, immigration fines, and other items properly returnable, except deposits of aliens who become public charges and deposits to secure payment of fines and passage money; operation, maintenance, remodeling, and repair, of buildings and the purchase of equipment incident thereto; acquisition of land as sites for enforcement fence and construction incident to such fence; reimbursement of the General Services Administration for security guard services for protection of confidential files; \$175,850,000: Provided, That of the amount herein appropriated, not to exceed \$50,000 may be used for the emergency replacement of aircraft upon certificate of the Attorney General.

FEDERAL PRISON SYSTEM

SALARIES AND EXPENSES, BUREAU OF PRISONS

For expenses necessary for the administration, operation, and maintenance of Federal penal and correctional institutions, including supervision of United States prisoners in non-Federal institutions; purchase of (not to exceed thirty-four, of which eighteen are for replacement only), and hire of passenger motor vehicles; compilation of statistics relating to prisoners in Federal penal and correctional institutions; assistance to State and local governments to improve their correctional systems; firearms and ammunition; medals and other awards; payment of rewards; purchase and exchange of farm products and livestock; construction of buildings at prison camps; and acquisition of land as authorized by section 4010 of title 18, United States Code, \$169,000,000: Provided, That there may be transferred to the Health Services Administration such amounts as may be necessary, in the discretion of the Attorney General, for direct expenditures by that Administration for medical relief for inmates of Federal penal and correctional institutions.

BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES

For planning, acquisition of sites and construction of new facilities and constructing, remodeling, and equipping necessary buildings and facilities at existing penal and correctional institutions, including all necessary expenses incident thereto, by contract or force account, \$27,690,000, to remain available until expended: *Provided*, That labor of United States prisoners may be used for work performed under this appropriation.

SUPPORT OF UNITED STATES PRISONERS

For support of United States prisoners in non-Federal institutions, including necessary clothing and medical aid, payment of rewards, and reimbursement to St. Elizabeths Hospital for the care and treatment of United States prisoners, at per diem rates as authorized by law (24 U.S.C. 168a), \$26,200,000: Provided, That not to exceed \$1,500,000 shall be available for expenses incurred in the fiscal year 1974.

LAW ENFORCEMENT ASSISTANCE ADMINISTRATION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For grants, contracts, loans, and other law enforcement assistance authorized by title I of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, as amended, including departmental salaries and other expenses in connection therewith, \$880,000,000, to remain available until expended.

DRUG ENFORCEMENT ADMINISTRATION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses of the Drug Enforcement Administration, including hire of passenger motor vehicles; payment in advance for special tests and studies by contract; not to exceed \$70,000 to meet unforeseen emergencies of a confidential character, to be expended under the direction of the Attorney General, and to be accounted for solely on his certificate; purchase of not to exceed 441 passenger motor vehicles (of which 406 are for replacement only) for police-type use without regard to the general purchase price limitation for the current fiscal year; payment of rewards; payment for publication of technical and informational material in professional and trade journals; purchase of chemicals, apparatus, and scientific equipment; payment for necessary accommodations in the District of Columbia for conferences and training activities; acquisition (purchase of one), lease, maintenance, and operation of aircraft; employment of aliens by contract for services abroad; research related to enforcement and drug control; benefits in accordance with those provided under 22 U.S.C. 1136(9)-(11), under regulations prescribed by the Secretary of State; \$135,000,000, of which not to exceed \$4,500,000 for research shall remain available until expended.

GENERAL PROVISIONS—DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

SEC. 202. None of the funds appropriated by this title may be used to pay the compensation of any person hereafter employed as an attorney (except foreign counsel employed in special cases) unless such person shall be duly licensed and authorized to practice as an attorney under the laws of a State, territory, or the District of Columbia.

SEC. 203. Fifty-three per centum of the expenditures for the offices of the United States Attorney and the United States marshal for the District of Columbia from all appropriations in this title shall be reimbursed to the United States from any funds in the Treasury of the United States to the credit of the District of Columbia: Provided, That notwithstanding the provisions of this section, not to exceed \$1,159,800 from any funds in the Treasury of the United States to the credit of the District of Columbia shall be available for reimbursement to the United States pursuant to this section.

SEC. 204. Appropriations and authorizations made in this title which are available for expenses of attendance at meetings shall be expended for such purposes in accordance with regulations prescribed by the Attorney General.

SEC. 205. Appropriations and authorizations made in this title for salaries and expenses shall be available for services as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109.

SEC. 206. Appropriations for the current fiscal year for "Salaries and expenses, general administration," "Salaries and expenses, United States attorneys and marshals," "Salaries and expenses, Federal Bureau of Investigation", "Salaries and expenses, Immigration and Naturalization Service", and "Salaries and expenses, Bureau of Prisons", shall be available for uniforms and allowances therefor as authorized by law (5 U.S.C. 5901-5902).

Sec. 207. Appropriations made in this title shall be available for the purchase of insurance for motor vehicles operated on official Government business in foreign countries.

ernment business in foreign countries.

This title may be cited as the "Department of Justice Appropriation Act, 1975".

TITLE III—DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For expenses necessary for the general administration of the Department of Commerce, including not to exceed \$1,500 for official entertainment, \$10,200,000.

SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC STATISTICS ADMINISTRATION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For expenses necessary for collecting, compiling, analyzing, preparing, and publishing statistics, provided for by law, and modernization or development of automatic data processing equipment, \$47,977,000.

PERIODIC CENSUSES AND PROGRAMS

For expenses necessary to prepare for taking, compiling, and publishing the censuses of business, transportation, manufactures, and mineral industries; the census of governments; the census of agriculture; the census of population and housing; and periodic surveys, as provided for by law, \$22,250,000, to remain available until expended.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

For economic development assistance as authorized by titles I, II, III, and IV of the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965, as amended, \$184,200,000: Provided, That upon enactment of the Indian Tribal Government Grant Act the unobligated balances of the amounts appropriated for Indian tribes under Title I, section 101(a) and Title II, section 201(a) shall be transferred to carry out such purposes of the Indian Tribal Government Grant Act.

ADMINISTRATION OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

For necessary expenses of administering the economic development assistance programs, not otherwise provided for, \$17,625,000, of which not to exceed \$300,000 may be advanced to the Small Business Administration for processing of loan applications.

REGIONAL ACTION PLANNING COMMISSIONS

REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

For expenses necessary to carry out the programs authorized by title V of the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965, as amended, \$34,995,000, to remain available until expended.

DOMESTIC AND INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

OPERATIONS AND ADMINISTRATION

For necessary expenses of domestic business activities of the Department of Commerce; necessary expenses for international business activities, including trade promotional activities abroad without regard to the provisions of law set forth in 41 U.S.C. 5 and 13, and 44 U.S.C. 501, 3702, and 3703; full medical coverage for dependent members of

immediate families of employees stationed overseas; purchase of commercial and trade reports; employment of aliens by contract for services abroad; rental of space abroad, for periods not exceeding five years, and expenses of alteration, repair, or improvement; purchase or construction of temporary demountable exhibition structures for use abroad; advance of funds under contracts abroad; payment of tort claims, in the manner authorized in the first paragraph of 28 U.S.C. 2672 when such claims arise in foreign countries; and, not to exceed \$4,200 for official representation expenses abroad; and necessary expenses for carrying out the Export Administration Act of 1969, as amended and extended by the Equal Export Opportunity Act, including awards of compensation to informers under said Act and as authorized by 22 U.S.C. 401(b); \$58,750,000, to remain available until expended, of which not to exceed \$600,000 may be advanced to the Bureau of Customs, Treasury Department, for enforcement of the export administration program: *Provided*, That the provisions of the first sentence of section 105(f) and all of section 108(c) of the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2455(f) and 2458(c)) shall apply in carrying out the activities concerned with international business activities.

MINORITY BUSINESS ENTERPRISE

MINORITY BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

For necessary expenses of the Department of Commerce in fostering, promoting, and developing minority business enterprise, \$52,000,000, of which \$42,347,000 shall remain available until expended: *Provided*, That not to exceed \$10,653,000 shall be available for program development and management.

UNITED STATES TRAVEL SERVICE

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses to carry out the provisions of the International Travel Act of 1961, as amended, including employment of aliens by contract for service abroad; rental of space abroad, for periods not exceeding five years, and expenses of alteration, repair, or improvement; advance of funds under contracts abroad; payment of tort claims, in the manner authorized in the first paragraph of section 2672 of title 28 of the United States Code, when such claims arise in foreign countries; and not to exceed \$3,500 for representation expenses abroad; \$11,250,000.

NATIONAL OCEANIC AND ATMOSPHERIC ADMINISTRATION

OPERATIONS, RESEARCH, AND FACILITIES

For expenses necessary for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, including research and development; testing and evaluation of new operational systems and equipment; including purchase (one), maintenance, operation, and hire of aircraft; acquisition and installation of research instrumentation; expenses of an authorized strength of 358 commissioned officers on the active list; pay of commissioned officers retired in accordance with law and payments under the Retired Serviceman's Family Protection and the Survivors Benefit plans; observation of environmental conditions from space satellites, and reporting and processing of the data obtained for use in environmental forecasting; and construction of facilities, including initial

equipment; alteration, modernization, and relocation of facilities; and acquisition of land for facilities; \$434,300,000, to remain available until expended: Provided, That this appropriation shall be available for payment to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration for procurement, in accordance with the authority available to that Administration, of such equipment or facilities as may be necessary, for the purposes of this appropriation: Provided further, That the sum of \$500,000 shall be made available to the following Commissions for fact gathering leading to the development of a national fisheries policy: the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission, \$175,000; the Gulf States Marine Fisheries Commission, \$200,000; and the Pacific Marine Fisheries Commission, \$125,000: Provided further, That the amount appropriated for "Operations, Research, and Facilities" in the Special Energy Research and Development Appropriation Act, 1975 (Public Law 93–322, approved June 30, 1974) shall be merged without limitation with this appropriation.

COASTAL ZONE MANAGEMENT

For carrying out the provisions of Public Law 92–583, approved October 27, 1972, \$12,000,000, to remain available until expended.

ADMINISTRATION OF PRIBILOF ISLANDS

For carrying out the provisions of the Act of November 2, 1966 (80 Stat. 1091–1099), \$3,937,000, of which so much as may become available during the current fiscal year shall be derived from the Pribilof Islands fund.

FISHERMEN'S GUARANTY FUND

For payment to the Fishermen's Guaranty Fund, established pursuant to the Act of August 12, 1968 (82 Stat. 729), \$61,000, to remain available until expended.

NATIONAL BUREAU OF FIRE PREVENTION

OPERATIONS, RESEARCH, AND ADMINISTRATION

For expenses necessary to carry out the provisions of the Federal Fire Prevention and Control Act of 1974, to remain available until expended, \$6,000,000.

PATENT OFFICE

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses of the Patent Office, including defense of suits instituted against the Commissioner of Patents, \$76,300,000.

Science and Technical Research

SCIENTIFIC AND TECHNICAL RESEARCH AND SERVICES

For necessary expenses of the National Bureau of Standards, including the acquisition of buildings, grounds, and other facilities; the National Technical Information Service; and the Office of Telecommunications; to remain available until expended, \$61,400,000, of which not to exceed \$2,100,000 may be transferred to the "Working Capital Fund," National Bureau of Standards, for additional capital.

MARITIME ADMINISTRATION

SHIP CONSTRUCTION

For construction-differential subsidy and cost of national-defense features incident to construction of ships for operation in foreign commerce (46 U.S.C. 1152, 1154); for construction-differential subsidy and cost of national-defense features incident to the reconstruction and reconditioning of ships under title V of the Merchant Marine Act, 1936, as amended (46 U.S.C. 1154); and for acquisition of used ships pursuant to section 510 of the Merchant Marine Act, 1936, as amended (46 U.S.C. 1160); to remain available until expended, \$275,000,000.

OPERATING-DIFFERENTIAL SUBSIDIES (LIQUIDATION OF CONTRACT AUTHORITY)

For the payment of obligations incurred for operating-differential subsidies granted on or after January 1, 1947, as authorized by the Merchant Marine Act, 1936, as amended, and in appropriations heretofore made to the United States Maritime Commission, \$242,800,000, to remain available until expended.

RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

For expenses necessary for research, development, fabrication, and test operation of experimental facilities and equipment; collection and dissemination of maritime technical and engineering information; studies to improve water transportation systems; \$25,900,000, to remain available until expended.

OPERATIONS AND TRAINING

For expenses necessary for carrying into effect the Merchant Marine Act, 1936, as amended, and the training of cadets as officers of the Merchant Marine, including not to exceed \$1,125 for entertainment of officials of other countries when specifically authorized by the Maritime Administrator; not to exceed \$1,250 for representation allowances; not to exceed \$2,500 for contingencies for the Superintendent, United States Merchant Marine Academy to be expended in his discretion; and uniform and textbook allowances for cadet midshipmen at the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy at an average yearly cost of not to exceed \$575 per cadet; \$40,333,000, to remain available until expended: Provided, That reimbursement may be made to this appropriation for expenses in support of activities for National Maritime Research Centers financed from the appropriation for "Research and development": Provided further, That reimbursements may be made to this appropriation from receipts to the "Federal ship financing fund" for administrative expenses in support of that program.

GENERAL PROVISIONS-MARITIME ADMINISTRATION

No additional vessel shall be allocated under charter, nor shall any vessel be continued under charter by reason of any extension of chartering authority beyond June 30, 1949, unless the charterer shall agree that the Maritime Administration shall have no obligation upon redelivery to accept or pay for consumable stores, bunkers, and slop-chest items, except with respect to such minimum amounts of bunkers as the Maritime Administration considers advisable to be retained on the vessel and that prior to such redelivery all consumable stores, slop-

chest items, and bunkers over and above such minimums shall be removed from the vessel by the charterer at his own expense.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act, the Maritime Administration is authorized to furnish utilities and services and make necessary repairs in connection with any lease, contract, or occupancy involving Government property under control of the Maritime Administration and payments received by the Maritime Administration for utilities, services, and repairs so furnished or made shall be credited to the appropriation charged with the cost thereof: Provided, That rental payments under any such lease, contract, or occupancy on account of items other than such utilities, services, or repairs shall be covered into

the Treasury as miscellaneous receipts.

No obligations shall be incurred during the current fiscal year from the construction fund established by the Merchant Marine Act, 1936, or otherwise, in excess of the appropriations and limitations contained in this Act, or in any prior appropriation Act, and all receipts which otherwise would be deposited to the credit of said fund shall be covered

into the Treasury as miscellaneous receipts.

GENERAL PROVISIONS—DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

Sec. 302. During the current fiscal year applicable appropriations and funds available to the Department of Commerce shall be available for the activities specified in the Act of October 26, 1949 (15 U.S.C.

1514), to the extent and in the manner prescribed by said Act.

SEC. 303. During the current fiscal year appropriations to the Department of Commerce which are available for salaries and expenses shall be available for hire of passenger motor vehicles; services as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109; and uniforms, or allowances therefor, as authorized by law (5 U.S.C. 5901-5902).

SEC. 304. No part of any appropriation contained in this title shall be used for construction of any ship in any foreign country.

SEC. 305. None of the funds appropriated in this title for the Mari-

time Administration shall be available for obligation for ship construction, operating-differential subsidies, research and development, nor operations and training, except upon enactment into law of authorizing legislation.

This title may be cited as the "Department of Commerce Appropria-

tion Act, 1975".

TITLE IV—THE JUDICIARY

SUPREME COURT OF THE UNITED STATES

SALARIES

For the Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, and all other officers and employees, whose compensation shall be fixed by the Court, except as otherwise provided by law, and who may be employed and assigned by the Chief Justice to any office or work of the Court, \$4,450,000.

PRINTING AND BINDING SUPREME COURT REPORTS

For printing and binding the advance opinions, preliminary prints, and bound reports of the Court, \$565,000.

MISCELLANEOUS EXPENSES

For miscellaneous expenses, to be expended as the Chief Justice may approve, \$642,000.

AUTOMOBILE FOR THE CHIEF JUSTICE

For purchase, exchange, lease, driving, maintenance, and operation of an automobile for the Chief Justice of the United States, \$16,300.

BOOKS FOR THE SUPREME COURT

For books and periodicals for the Supreme Court to be purchased by the Librarian of the Supreme Court, under the direction of the Chief Justice, \$63,000.

CARE OF THE BUILDING AND GROUNDS

For such expenditures as may be necessary to enable the Architect of the Capitol to carry out the duties imposed upon him by the Act approved May 7, 1934 (40 U.S.C. 13a-13b), including improvements, maintenance, repairs, equipment, supplies, materials, and appurtenances; special clothing for workmen; and personal and other services (including temporary labor without reference to the Classification and Retirement Acts, as amended), and for snow removal by hire of men and equipment or under contract without compliance with section 3709 of the Revised Statutes, as amended (41 U.S.C. 5); \$687,300, to remain available until expended: *Provided*, That not to exceed \$371,500 of the unobligated balance of the appropriation under this head for the fiscal year 1974 is hereby continued available until expended.

COURT OF CUSTOMS AND PATENT APPEALS

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For salaries of the chief judge, four associate judges, and all other officers and employees of the court, and necessary expenses of the court, including exchange of books, and traveling expenses, as may be approved by the chief judge, \$782,000.

CUSTOMS COURT

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For salaries of the chief judge and eight judges; salaries of the officers and employees of the court; services as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109; and necessary expenses of the court, including exchange of books and traveling expenses, as may be approved by the court; \$2,479,000: Provided, That traveling expenses of judges of the Customs Court shall be paid upon written certificate of the judge.

COURT OF CLAIMS

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For salaries of the chief judge, six associate judges, and all other officers and employees of the court, and for other necessary expenses, including stenographic and other fees and charges necessary in the taking of testimony, and travel, \$2,341,000.

COURTS OF APPEALS, DISTRICT COURTS, AND OTHER JUDICIAL SERVICES

SALARIES OF JUDGES

For salaries of circuit judges; district judges (including judges of the district courts of the Virgin Islands, the Panama Canal Zone, and Guam); justices and judges retired or resigned under title 28, United

States Code, sections 371, 372, and 373; and annuities of widows of Justices of the Supreme Court of the United States in accordance with title 28, United States Code, section 375; \$27,975,000.

SALARIES OF SUPPORTING PERSONNEL

For salaries of all officials and employees of the Federal Judiciary, not otherwise specifically provided for, \$101,822,000: Provided, That the salaries of secretaries to circuit and district judges shall not exceed the compensation established in chapter 51 of title 5, United States Code, for General Schedule grade (GS) 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, or 10, and that the salaries of law clerks to circuit and district judges shall not exceed the compensation established in chapter 51 of title 5, United States Code, for General Schedule grade (GS) 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, or 12: Provided further, That (exclusive of step increases corresponding with those provided for by chapter 53 of title 5 of the United States Code, and of compensation paid for temporary assistance needed because of an emergency) the aggregate salaries paid to secretaries and law clerks appointed by each of the circuit and district judges shall not exceed \$57,714 and \$34,988 per annum, respectively, except in the case of the chief judge of each circuit and the chief judge of each district court having five or more district judges, in which case the aggregate salaries shall not exceed \$71,093 and \$44,957 per annum, respectively: Provided further, That the chief judge of each circuit may appoint a senior law clerk to the court at not more than \$30,000 per annum, without regard to the limitations referred to above.

REPRESENTATION BY COURT-APPOINTED COUNSEL AND OPERATION OF DEFENDER ORGANIZATIONS

For the operation of Federal Public Defender and Community Defender organizations, and the compensation and reimbursement of expenses of attorneys appointed to represent persons under the Criminal Justice Act of 1964 (18 U.S.C. 3006A, as amended by Public Law 91–447, October 14, 1970), \$15,700,000.

FEES OF JURORS

For fees, expenses, and costs of jurors; and compensation of jury commissioners; \$18,500,000.

TRAVEL AND MISCELLANEOUS EXPENSES

For necessary travel and miscellaneous expenses, not otherwise provided for, incurred by the Judiciary, including the purchase of firearms and ammunition, \$15,100,000.

ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE OF THE UNITED STATES COURTS

For necessary expenses of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts, including travel, advertising, and rent in the District of Columbia and elsewhere, \$5,090,000: Provided, That not to exceed \$100,000 of the appropriations contained in this title shall be available for the study of rules of practice and procedure.

SALARIES AND EXPENSES OF UNITED STATES MAGISTRATES

For compensation and expenses of United States Magistrates, including secretarial and clerical assistance, as authorized by 28 U.S.C. 634-635, \$8,764,000.

SALARIES OF REFEREES

For salaries of referees as authorized by the Act of June 28, 1946, as amended (11 U.S.C. 68), not to exceed \$6,990,000, to be derived from the Referees' salary and expense fund established in pursuance of said Act, and, to the extent of any deficiency in said fund, from any monies in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

EXPENSES OF REFEREES

For expenses of referees as authorized by the Act of June 28, 1946, as amended (11 U.S.C. 68, 102), not to exceed \$14,000,000, to be derived from the Referees' salary and expense fund established in pursuance of said Act, and, to the extent of any deficiency in said fund from any monies in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated: *Provided*, That \$440,000 shall be transferred to the appropriation for "Administrative Office of the United States Courts" for general administrative expense of the bankruptcy system.

FEDERAL JUDICIAL CENTER

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses of the Federal Judicial Center, as authorized by Public Law 90–219, \$2,400,000.

SPACE AND FACILITIES, THE JUDICIARY.

SPACE AND FACILITIES

For the rental of space, tenant alterations, and related services for the United States Courts of Appeals and District Courts, the Court of Customs and Patent Appeals, the Customs Court, the Court of Claims, the Administrative Office of the United States Courts and the Federal Judicial Center, pursuant to the Public Buildings Amendments of 1972, Public Law 92–313, June 16, 1972 (86 Stat. 216), \$66,100,000, to be available for transfer to the General Services Administration which shall be responsible for administering the program in compliance with standards or guidelines prescribed by the Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts under the supervision and direction of the Judicial Conference of the United States.

EXPENSES, UNITED STATES COURT FACILITIES

FURNITURE AND FURNISHINGS

For necessary expenses, not otherwise provided for, to provide furniture and furnishings for the United States Courts, including the Administrative Office of the United States Courts and the Federal Judicial Center, \$2,675,000, to be available for transfer to the General Services Administration which shall be responsible for administering the program in compliance with standards or guidelines prescribed by the Director of the Administrative Office of the United States Courts under the supervision and direction of the Judicial Conference of the United States.

GENERAL PROVISIONS—THE JUDICIARY

SEC. 402. The reports of the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia shall not be sold for a price exceeding that approved by the court and for not more than \$9.00 per volume.

Sec. 403. None of the funds contained in this title shall be available for the salaries or expenses of deputy clerks in any office that has discontinued the taking of applications for passports subsequent to October 31, 1968, and has not resumed such service on a permanent basis.

This title may be cited as the "Judiciary Appropriation Act, 1975".

TITLE V—RELATED AGENCIES

ARMS CONTROL AND DISARMAMENT AGENCY

ARMS CONTROL AND DISARMAMENT ACTIVITIES

For necessary expenses, not otherwise provided for, for arms control and disarmament activities authorized by the Act of September 26, 1961, as amended (22 U.S.C. 2551 et seq.), \$9,250,000.

BOARD FOR INTERNATIONAL BROADCASTING

GRANTS AND EXPENSES

For expenses of the Board for International Broadcasting, including grants to Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty, \$49,800,000.

COMMISSION ON CIVIL RIGHTS

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For expenses necessary for the Commission on Civil Rights, including hire of passenger motor vehicles, \$6,850,000.

Commission on the Organization of the Government for the Conduct of Foreign Policy

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses of the Commission on the Organization of the Government for the Conduct of Foreign Policy, authorized by title VI of the Foreign Relations Authorization Act of 1972, \$1,594,000, to remain available until July 30, 1975.

EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY COMMISSION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission established by fitle VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, including services as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109; hire of passenger motor vehicles; and not to exceed \$3,500,000 for payments to State and local agencies for services to the Commission pursuant to title VII of the Civil Rights Act, \$53,597,000.

FEDERAL MARITIME COMMISSION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses of the Federal Maritime Commission, including services as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109; hire of passenger motor vehicles; and uniforms or allowances therefor, as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 5901–5902; \$7,300,000: *Provided*, That not to exceed \$1,500 shall be available for official reception and representation expenses.

FOREIGN CLAIMS SETTLEMENT COMMISSION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For expenses necessary to carry on the activities of the Foreign Claims Settlement Commission, including services as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109; allowances and benefits similar to those provided by title IX of the Foreign Service Act of 1946, as amended, as determined by the Commission; expenses of packing, shipping, and storing personal effects of personnel assigned abroad; rental or lease, for such periods as may be necessary, of office space and living quarters for personnel assigned abroad; maintenance, improvement, and repair of properties rented or leased abroad, and furnishing fuel, water, and utilities for such properties; insurance on official motor vehicles abroad; advances of funds abroad; advances or reimbursements to other Government agencies for use of their facilities and services in carrying out the functions of the Commission; hire of motor vehicles for field use only; and employment of aliens; \$1,240,000.

MARINE MAMMAL COMMISSION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses of the Marine Mammal Commission to carry out the provisions of title II of the Act of October 21, 1972 (Public Law 92–522), establishing the Marine Mammal Commission, \$750,000: Provided, That, notwithstanding section 207 of Public Law 92–522, not to exceed \$300,000 may be used for administrative expenses.

NATIONAL COMMISSION FOR THE REVIEW OF FEDERAL AND STATE LAWS RELATING TO WIRETAPPING AND ELECTRONIC SURVIELLANCE

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses of the National Commission for the Review of Federal and State Laws Relating to Wiretapping and Electronic Surveillance, established by the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (84 Stat. 224), \$332,000, to remain available until expended.

SMALL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses, not otherwise provided for, of the Small Business Administration, including hire of passenger motor vehicles, not to exceed \$1,500 for official reception and representation expenses, and not to exceed \$5,000,000 for expenses necessary to carry out the provisions of section 406 of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, as amended, \$26,500,000, and in addition there may be transferred to this appropriation not to exceed a total of \$85,415,000 from the "Disaster loan fund", the "Business loan and investment fund", and the "Lease and surety bond guarantees revolving fund", in such amounts as may be necessary for administrative expenses in connection with activities respectively financed under said funds: *Provided*, That 10 per centum of the amount authorized to be transferred from these revolving funds shall be apportioned for use, pursuant to section 3679 of the Revised Statutes, as amended, only in such amounts and at such times as may

be necessary to carry out the business and disaster loan, and lease and surety bond guarantee programs.

DISASTER LOAN FUND

BUSINESS LOAN AND INVESTMENT FUND

LEASE AND SURETY BOND GUARANTEES REVOLVING FUND

The Small Business Administration is hereby authorized to make such expenditures, within the limits of funds and borrowing authority available to the following funds, and in accord with the law, and to make such contracts and commitments without regard to fiscal year limitations as provided by section 104 of the Government Corporation Control Act, as amended, as may be necessary in carrying out the programs set forth in the budget for the current fiscal year for the "Disaster loan fund," the "Business loan and investment fund," and the "Lease and surety bond guarantees revolving fund."

BUSINESS LOAN AND INVESTMENT FUND

For additional capital for the "Business loan and investment fund," authorized by the Small Business Act, as amended, \$327,500,000, to remain available without fiscal year limitation.

DISASTER LOAN FUND

For additional capital for the "Disaster loan fund," authorized by the Small Business Act, as amended, \$90,000,000, to remain available without fiscal year limitation.

Special Representative for Trade Negotiations

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For expenses necessary for the Special Representative for Trade Negotiations, including hire of passenger motor vehicles, and services as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109, \$1,850,000: Provided, That none of the funds contained in this paragraph shall be made available for the collection and preparation of information which will not be available to Committees of Congress in the regular discharge of their duties.

TARIFF COMMISSION

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses of the Tariff Commission, not to exceed \$150,000 for expenses of travel, hire of passenger motor vehicles, and services as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109, \$8,900,000: Provided, That no part of this appropriation shall be used to pay the salary of any member of the Tariff Commission who shall hereafter participate in any proceedings under sections 336, 337, and 338 of the Tariff Act of 1930, wherein he or any member of his family has any special, direct, and pecuniary interest, or in which he has acted as attorney or special representative: Provided further, That no part of the foregoing appropriation shall be used for making any special study, investigation, or report at the request of any other agency of the executive branch of the Government unless reimbursement is made for the cost thereof.

United States Information Agency

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For expenses necessary to enable the United States Information Agency, as authorized by Reorganization Plan No. 8 of 1953, the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act (22 U.S.C. 2451 et seq.), and the United States Information and Educational Exchange Act, as amended (22 U.S.C. 1431 et seq.), to carry out international information activities, including employment, without regard to the civil service and classification laws, of persons on a temporary basis (not to exceed \$20,000), and aliens within the United States; salaries, expenses, and allowances of personnel and dependents as authorized by the Foreign Service Act of 1946, as amended (22 U.S.C. 801-1158); entertainment within the United States not to exceed \$500; hire of passenger motor vehicles; services as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109; advance of funds notwithstanding section 3648 of the Revised Statutes, as amended (31 U.S.C. 529); dues for library membership in organizations which issue publications to members only, or to members at a price lower than to others; purchase of uniforms for not to exceed thirteen guards; radio activities and acquisition and production of motion pictures and visual materials and purchase or rental of technical equipment and facilities therefor, narration, script-writing, translation, and engineering services, by contract or otherwise; and purchase of objects for presentation to foreign governments, schools, or organizations; \$218,462,000: Provided, That not to exceed \$150,000 may be used for representation abroad: Provided further, That passenger motor vehicles used abroad exclusively for the purposes of this appropriation may be exchanged or sold pursuant to section 201(c) of the Act of June 30, 1949 (40 U.S.C. 481(c)), and the exchange allowances or proceeds of such sales shall be available for replacement of an equal number of such vehicles and the cost, including the exchange allowance of each such replacement, shall not exceed such amounts as may be otherwise provided by law: Provided further, That, notwithstanding

SALARIES AND EXPENSES (SPECIAL FOREIGN CURRENCY PROGRAM)

For payments in foreign currencies which the Treasury Department determines to be excess to the normal requirements of the United States, for necessary expenses of the United States Information Agency, as authorized by law, \$8,377,000, to remain available until expended.

SPECIAL INTERNATIONAL EXHIBITIONS

For expenses necessary to carry out the functions of the United States Information Agency under section 102(a)(3) of the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2451 et seq.), \$6,770,000, to remain available until expended: *Provided*, That not to exceed a total of \$6,500 may be expended for representation.

ACQUISITION AND CONSTRUCTION OF RADIO FACILITIES

For an additional amount for the purchase, rent, construction, and improvement of facilities for radio transmission and reception, purchase and installation of necessary equipment for radio transmission chase and installation of necessary equipment for radio transmission and reception, without regard to the provisions of the Act of June 30, 1932 (40 U.S.C. 278a), and acquisition of land and interests in land by purchase, lease, rental, or otherwise, \$4,400,000, to remain available until expended: *Provided*, That this appropriation shall be available for acquisition of land outside the continental United States without regard to section 355 of the Revised Statutes (40 U.S.C. 255) and title to any land so acquired shall be approved by the Director of the United States Information Agency.

TITLE VI—FEDERAL PRISON INDUSTRIES, INCORPORATED

The following corporation is hereby authorized to make such expenditures, within the limits of funds and borrowing authority available to such corporation, and in accord with the law, and to make such contracts and commitments, without regard to fiscal year limitations as provided by section 104 of the Government Corporation Control Act, as amended, as may be necessary in carrying out the program set forth in the budget for the current fiscal year for such corporation, including purchase of not to exceed five (for replacement only) and hire of passenger motor vehicles, except as hereinafter provided:

LIMITATION ON ADMINISTRATIVE AND VOCATIONAL TRAINING EXPENSES, FEDERAL PRISON INDUSTRIES, INCORPORATED

Not to exceed \$1,804,000 of the funds of the corporation shall be available for its administrative expenses, and not to exceed \$5,051,000 for the expenses of vocational training of prisoners, both amounts to be available for services as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 3109, and to be computed on an accrual basis and to be determined in accordance with the corporation's prescribed accounting system in effect on July 1, 1946, and shall be exclusive of depreciation, payment of claims, expenditures which the said accounting system requires to be capitalized or charged to cost of commodities acquired or produced, including selling and shipping expenses, and expenses in connection with acquisition, construction, operation, maintenance, improvement, protection, or disposition of facilities and other property belonging to the corporation or in which it has an interest.

TITLE VII—GENERAL PROVISIONS

Sec. 701. No part of any appropriation contained in this Act shall be used for publicity or propaganda purposes not authorized by the

Sec. 702. No part of any appropriation contained in this Act shall be used to administer any program which is funded in whole or in part from foreign currencies or credits for which a specific dollar appropriation therefor has not been made.

Sec. 703. No part of any appropriation contained in this Act shall remain available for obligation beyond the current fiscal year unless

expressly so provided herein.

SEC. 704. No part of the funds appropriated by this Act shall be used to pay the salary of any Federal employee who is finally convicted in any Federal, State, or local court of competent jurisdiction, of inciting, promoting, or carrying on a riot resulting in material damage to property or injury to persons, found to be in violation of Federal, State, or local laws designed to protect persons or property in the compensation.
