REPORT

[To accompany S. 3397]

The Committee on the Judiciary, to which was referred the bill (S. 3397) for the relief of Jose Ismarnardo Reyes-Morelos, having considered the same, reports favorably thereon with an amendment and recommends that the bill, as amended, do pass.

AMENDMENT

Beginning on line 1, page 2, strike the language and the provisions of section 245(c) of the Act shall be inapplicable in this case.

PURPOSE OF THE BILL

The purpose of the bill, as amended, is to facilitate the entry of the beneficiary into the United States as an immediate relative of the U.S. citizen parents by whom he is to be adopted. The purpose of the amendment is to delete reference to section 245(c), since the beneficiary is not in the United States.

STATEMENT OF FACTS

The beneficiary of the bill is a 3-year-old native and citizen of Mexico. He currently resides in an orphanage in Morelia, Michoacan, Mexico. He was abandoned at an early age and no information is available concerning his family.

The prospective adoptive father, Lawrence A. Lemmen, is a native and citizen of the United States. His wife is a naturalized U.S. citizen.

The couple resides in Eaton Rapids, Mich. The Lemmens have two other adopted children.

A letter, with attached memorandum, dated July 8, 1974, to the chairman of the Senate Committee on the Judiciary from the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization with reference to the bill reads as follows:

DEAR SENATOR: In Testionise to vour request for a report relative to the bill S. 3397 for the relief of Jose Ismarnardo Reyes-Morelos, there is attached a memorandum of information concerning the beneficiary.

The bill would permit Mr. and Mr. Lawrence A. Lemmen, citizens of the United States, to file an immediate relative petition notwithstanding the fact that they have previously filed and had approved petitions in behalf of other alien children. The bill would also permit the beneficiary, who is a native of the Western Hemisphere, to adjust to that of a permanent resident alien. It further provides that the natural brothers and sisters of the beneficiary shall not by virtue of such relationship be accorded any right, privilege, or status under the to which was referred the tre

Absent enactment of the bill, the beneficiary, a native of Mexico, is thur peuble to the numerical limitation for immigrants from the Western Hemisphere and would be required to obtain a visa outside the United States.

MEMORANDUM OF INFORMATION FROM IMMIGRATION AND NATURALIZATION SERVICE FILES RE S. 3397

Information concerning the case was obtained from Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence A. Lemmen, the prespective adoptive

parents of the beneficiary.

The beneficiary, Jose Ismarnardo Reyes-Morelos, a native and citizen of Mexico, was born on October 4, 1971. He was abandoned sometime after birth and no information is available concerning his parents or other members of his family. He resides in Morelia, Michoacan, Mexico, in an orphanage

operated by the Roman Catholic Church.

Lawrence A. Lemmen is a U.S. citizen by birth in Ionia, Mich, on November 13, 1917. He received a bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Michigan, and is employed as a payroll supervisor at \$21,000 annually. His wife, Christine, is a native of Canada, born on July 7, 1918, and has been neturalized as a U.S. citizen. She is a high school graduate and is not employed outside of their home. They were married on August 15, 1970, and reside in Eaton Rapids, Mich. Mr. Lemmen has not been previously married.

Mrs. Lemmen's first marriage ended in divorce in October 1953. An adult son, born of that marriage, resides in Arizona. Mr. and Mrs. Lemmen have adopted two children, Mary Katherine and Therese Marie, natives of Korea, now ages 12 and 9, who were lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence as eligible orphans on October 26, 1971. They attend the local public school. In 1972, a third child, Anthony Joseph, now age 4, a native-born citizen, was adopted by them in Lansing, Mich. Mr. and Mrs. Lemmen own their home, which is valued at \$60,000. They have stocks and bonds totaling \$40,000, life insurance in the amount of \$125,000, and furniture and personal effects worth \$10,000.

Mr. and Mrs. Lemmen learned of the beneficiary from friends who had previously adopted a child from the same orphanage. They intend to adopt the beneficiary in the United States, and will raise him as their own child. They advised that the beneficiary is being registered for an immigrant visa at an American Consulate in Mexico. The latest information indicates that numbers currently being issued under the Western Hemisphere limitation are for applicants with

priority dates earlier than March 15, 1972.

Senator Robert P. Griffin, the author of the bill, has submitted the following information in connection with the case:

> EATON RAPIDS, MICH., April 20, 1974.

Hon. ROBERT P. GRIFFIN. U.S. Senate. Washington, D.C.

DEAR SENATOR GRIFFIN: Thank you for your reply of April 8, 1974, to my inquiry regarding our desire to adopt a third alien orphan child.

With your reply, you enclosed a copy of the Department of State's communication of March 27, 1974, addressed to you regarding our situation. This letter indicated that the child we wish to adopt (born in New Mexico) could be issued a Western Hemisphere immigrant visa only when a quota number became available. It further states that numbers under the Western Hemisphere numerical limitation will be available in April, 1974 for those who have registration dated

before February 15, 1972.

It's quite disheartening to my wife and myself to think we will be prevented from providing our love and a home to this little 3-year-old boy for a minimum of another 2 years or more because of these official restrictions. We have some friends who formerly lived in Lansing (now of Alma, Mich.) who also had adopted two Korean alien children and wished to adopt another unrelated Korean alien child. Subsequently, through the efforts of Representative Charles Chamberlain, they were successful in obtaining a visa through the passage of a special bill in Congress. Accordingly, we would be very grateful if you would be able to introduce a special bill in Congress, on our behalf, which would authorize the issuance of a visa for the admission of the following alien child:

Jose Ismarnardo Reyes-Morelos

Birth Date: 10-4-71

Morelia, Michoacan, Mexico

Again, my wife and I wish to thank you for your efforts on our behalf and hope you will be able to introduce a special bill that will enable us to obtain a visa for the entry of the little Mexican boy. If you should require any further information that we can furnish, please feel free to contact us by letter or by phone, collect.
