





On behalf of the President I want to thank you for your recent letter expressing concern about the present organizational location of the Federal Preparedness Agency.

In amnouncing to the Congress in January 1973 that the functions of the Office of Emergency Preparedness (OEP) were being transferred, it was stated that this reorganization was aimed at a new approach to emergency preparedness. It was felt then, and is still felt now, that OEP and its predecessor agencies had performed valuable functions in developing plans for emergency preparedness, in administering Federal disaster relief, and in everseeing and assisting the other Federal departments and agencies in this area. However, it was also determined at that time that the line departments and agencies, which in the past had shared in the performance of the various preparedness functions, possessed the capability to assume full responsibility for those functions.

As indicated in Executive Order 11735, it was never the intent of the Administration to downgrade or diminish the responsibilities and functions of the MEP staff in moving to the General Services Administration (CSA). In fact, with the exception of the disaster program, the oil import program, and other energy related programs, the present Federal Proparedness Agency has all the emergency proparedness authorities it had as OEP. The programs mentioned above, which were transferred, were essentially operating programs, and not those of policy-making and planning as normally associated with FPA.





Following a comprehensive study, the Administrator of GSA established in June, 1975 a subordinate agency within GSA bearing the name of the Federal Preparedness Agency. Several program and administrative innovations are currently underway which will enhance its programs in the future. Experience has shown that this agency is fully capable of coordinating and directing all civil emergency preparedness functions of the Enecutive Branch as intended by the President and Congress. All other Federal departments and agencies have been quite responsive to FPA, and no change in its organizational location is presently contemplated.

You may be assured that we will be continually following the progress of the Federal Proparadness Agency, as presently structured within GSA, with the objective of improving its effectiveness and assessing any problems which may arise that could affect both the integrity of the Agency and the security of our Nation.



the Secretary of Defense and the Secretary of State. These should be the only three persons reporting directly to you at that time. All agencies of the federal government will report to the ODR and liaison with state governments will be conducted by the ODR.

If this organization is to assume such a vital role in an emergency, it is imperative that every effort be made, before any nuclear confrontation arises, to insure that the Office of Defense Resources is prepared to meet its responsibilities.

I am quite certain that you realize that the attention and effort given by the different agencies of a bureaucracy to any activity are in direct proportion to the relative position of the agency requesting performance. It is not likely that the various federal agencies will give the necessary attention and effort required in planning for a nuclear emergency when it is requested to do so by the present Federal Preparedness Agency, given its current position in the Federal hierarchy. A corollary of this would be: The ability of an agency to secure the voluntary participation of capable, top management personnel of civilian organizations to participate in exercises to develop a high level of proficiency so that, in the event of an emergency, they will be well-prepared to assume responsible positions, is directly proportional to the importance that is attached to that agency.

For these reasons, it is of utmost urgency that expeditious effort be given to the organizational upgrading of the Federal Preparedness Agency.

To facilitate this evaluation, we have prepared the attached checklist to be used in developing a security program to safe-guard each personal data system against anticipated accidents, errors, and omissions resulting from uncontrolled system access. Using this checklist, please select the appropriate combination of managerial, administrative, technical, and physical safeguards to ensure the security and confidentiality of those records for which you are responsible.

To ensure compliance with the provisions of the Act which become effective September 27, 1975, it will be necessary to have your reply no later than September 8. Your reply should indicate that a risk assessment and a compliance analysis have been performed. It should also indicate that existing administrative, technical, and computer system controls either are adequate safeguards for the personal data system for which you are responsible or are inadequate. If inadequate, be specific as to the additional protective measures required. Please address your reply and direct any questions you might have to Emily Karam, FPA/EDM, telephone number 343-6213.

MEMORANDUM FOR ALL EMERGENCY COORDINATORS

The critique of REX-76 has raised anew questions about a major shortcoming of the Federal Civil Emergency Actions Guidelist -- the time-lag in keeping the FCEAG actions/ measures and supporting fact sheets current and consistent with existing policy and authorities.

As a result of FPA readiness reviews, we have recognized the need for restating the responsibility for updating the Guidelist in time for annual revision. The Introduction to the 1976 Guidelist clearly states that the department or agency identified in the Guidelist as having primary responsibility for a particular measure is responsible for submitting necessary revisions according to the described procedure.

We intend to reissue the Guidelist and fact sheets in January, 1977. The number of copies of the Guidelist and fact sheets to be mailed to departments and agencies in January, 1977, will be based on their stated requirements for the 1976 issue, unless a change is submitted.

At this time each department and agency is requested to review the entire 1976 document with special emphasis on Guidelist items for which it is listed as having primary or coordinating responsibility. Comments and fact sheets should be submitted to the FPA/GSA action officer, Mr. Hagan, by September 15. Departments and agencies are also encouraged to check their stated requirements for number of copies and advise of changes, where appropriate.



MEMORANDUM TO MS. CONNIE GERRARD, THE WHITE HOUSE PRESS OFFICE

Reference is made to your memorandum of July 29, 1976, transmitting a communication received from Mr. Travis Cross.

The National Defense Executive Reserve program and its members are one very vital component of national strength in emergencies. Federal departments and agencies with mobilization responsibilities enroll members from business, government, labor, agriculture, the professions, and the academic communities, to perform executive work in Government should an emergency occur requiring their service.

In spirit and substance, the Executive Reservist exemplifies the constructive cooperation between the private and public sector of our society. As members, representative of the private sector, they are important to us.

Under delegations of responsibility by Executive order, departments and agencies are required to develop plans for implementation in emergencies. The Reservist is asked to serve as additional supportive staff or may be designated as a staff member of a stand-by organization. The latter applies to Mr. Cross.

As is true in all planning, there must be a periodic review and update in light of new thinking and new emphasis. My staff has been engaged in this effort and, after careful deliberation, recommending actions for redesignation or termination of a member, specifically where there has developed an imbalance in personnel expertise.



Mr. Cross was originally designated as a member of the Reserve in 1966, in our Everett, Washington, office (now located in Seattle, Washington, Region 10). In 1969, Mr. Cross transferred to California to serve as Vice President, University Relations, Office of the President, University of California. As a valued member of the Reserve, he was continued in designation with Region 9, San Francisco, California, even though the staffing pattern in the Public Information field was sufficiently manned, with ceiling allotment being temporarily increased.

Periodic reviews to assure that the Reserve strength is kept within a specific ceiling sometimes necessitate releasing a member of long standing who has voluntarily participated in a program supportive of Government. Mr. Cross has made significant contributions over the period of time he has served, and it was with regret that I concurred in the recommendation of my Regional Director that his appointment be terminated.

I feel sure, however, that you can appreciate the reason for the action. I deeply regret that Mr. Cross is left with a feeling of annoyance, because his good will about the program and toward the Government is important.

EXECUTIVE ORDER

RELATING TO VOLUNTARY AGREEMENTS

Sqd. 1/12/17 By virtue of the authority vested in me by section 708 of the Defense Production Act of 1950, as amended (50 U.S.C. App. 2158) and section 301 of title 3 of the United States Code, and as President of the United States of America, section 501 of Executive Order No. 10480 of August 14, 1953, as amended, is amended to read as follows:

> "Sec. 501 (a) The functions conferred upon the President by section 708 (c) (l) and (d) of the Defense Production Act, as amended, are hereby delegated to the Administrator of General Services and, subject to the provisions of section 101 of this order, to the Secretary of Defense, the Secretary of the Interior, the Secretary of Agriculture, the Secretary of Commerce, and the Secretary of Transportation, except that for the purposes of carrying out the objectives of Title I of the Act, the authority granted in section 708 (c) (1) of the Act shall be exercised only by the Administrator of General Services.

"(b) The functions conferred upon the President by section 708 (d) of the Defense Production Act and delegated under section 501 (a) of this order, relating to the establishment of advisory committees, shall be exercised only after consultation with, and in accordance with guidelines and procedures established by, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget.".
