Brent Scowcroft told me last Friday that the Canadians have informally asked for U.S. reaction to the idea that they build their new embassy on Pennsylvania Avenue between the White House and Capitol Hill.

The general idea is that a small open square, or park, incorporated into the embassy plan would be Canada's contribution to the U.S. Bicentennial.

Brent asked the Domestic Council to help him get reaction to this.

There could be concern among traditionalists about the interposition of foreign government representation between the White House and Capitol Hill.
