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



You requested (Tab C) NSC staff comments on draft replies (Tab B) to questions posed to Senator Dole by Mrs. Farrell Sullivan (Tab A). The NSC staff has reviewed the draft language and offers the following comments:

-- Answer no. 3 states that "these negotiations are going on through the State Department." In fact, there are no talks in progress at this time. It may, therefore, be better to change this wording to read "the State Department is currently involved in exchanges with the Vietnamese government on the MIA question as well as other issues of mutual interest."

-- Answer no. 3 also indicates that the State Department "announced" that the Deputy Chief of Mission in Paris would serve as a negotiator. This designation was contained in one of our private exchanges with the Vietnamese and was not announced publicly. It therefore may be more appropriate to state that the State Department has "appointed the Deputy Chief of our Embassy in Paris as our main negotiator with Vietnamese representatives in Paris."





Russ, Ann Mills Griffiths, Member/Board of Directors, National League of Families and the wife of an MIA, called to ask if there was any possibility of meeting briefly with the President while he is in California.

Ann is a reasonable person and has not been one of the hard liners concerning the MIA matter. At the same time, she does seek an Executive Order and does support the League's desire for a Presidential Task Force and a White House negotiator.

Carter, as you know, did meet with a number of League members, including Earl Hopper, in Phoenix. Following that meeting, he said he would form a Task Force if he is elected. He has since stated that he would also send a Presidential Fact Finding group to Hanoi and the other Southeastern Asia areas to explore the MIA accounting and resumption of relations with those countries.

I do believe if a short, informal meeting with Ann could be arranged, it would produce positive results even though the President could not promise an Executive Order, Task Force or negotiator. Just the opportunity to spend five minutes talking about the emotional factors in this would go a long way.

I leave the possibilities to you and Jack. I'll be out on Monday, atoning for all you sinners, but will check with you on Tuesday.

Jack, while this may not be one of the most pressing or predominent issues, I believe, and so does Roger Shields, that the President can show a special degree of compassion and morality in taking several important steps concerning the accounting of our Missing in Action. His past performance in this has been excellent and has enjoyed the support of the families. However, there are two points for which they have pressed and which have not been satisfied.

We did announce that our Deputy Chief of Mission would be the negotiator named to meet with the Vietnamese in Paris. We have not made this a firm commitment in terms of giving the DCM positive direction. The President could now announce that the DCM has not only been named the negotiator, but has been told to begin to work toward regular meetings with the Vietnamese in order to effect an accounting of our MIA's as quickly as possible. An announcement such as this could also include some of the past positive action the President has taken.

The second step would be the issuance of an Executive Order to stop all changes in status for the time being. Obviously, that order could be rescinded at any time it was no longer necessary. Both State and Defense have been telling the families that a change in status does not mean we will not continue to press for an accounting. The families have consistently maintained that once the status of a man has been changed, interest in an accounting for that individual will diminish. They use as proof of this our continued reduction of numbers of MIA's as changes take place. The League of Families believe we should be talking in terms of 2,500 MIA's for whom an accounting is required. The other night, the President used the figure of 800 which is approximately the number remaining which are still in the hard core MIA classification.

I also wish we had done something about the Presidential Task Force so that Carter could not have been the one to surface that. However, on our side is the fact that we are working on it and have been for the past month. 2

Jack, today - October 16th - I met with the Board of Directors of the National League of Families at their request. The meeting was a typical one full of pressure for two things. They desparately want the President to announce a Presidential Task Force on MIA's and they want an Executive Order to stop all changes in status from MIA to KIA or PFOD.

They were promised nothing although I did tell them that we are exploring the Task Force matter because it was a part of the Republican Platform. Last night, during the Vice Presidential Debates, as you may know, Senator Dole said that one of his prime assignments after taking over as Vice President would be a direct responsibility in seeking an accounting of the MIA's and POW's. This has led the League to believe that the President has discussed this with Senator Dole and has some plan in mind.

They believe that we are not moving toward negotiations even though we have announced that the Deputy Chief of Mission in Paris would be our negotiator and the Vietnamese have announced their negotiator. They now want to know why negotiations haven't moved ahead since August.

They also were concerned about the President's mention of 800 MIA's when they consider the figure to be more appropriately 2,500 which would cover those who were at one time in the MIA/ POW category and have now been moved into the KIA or PFOD category.

They are also adament about an Executive Order to stop changes in status maintaining that the rights of the men are being violated by changes without additional evidence.

I don't want to be a bleeding heart about this, but, we should at least move ahead with the Task Force so that we have taken some positive step. It's quite possible that this issue will again surface during the next debate.
