I am confident that America's leaders -- in business and in government -- will respond to that challenge. Their efforts will be spurred on by the same formula that has always made this nation great -- free men and women enjoying the fruits of limited government and unlimited opportunity.

The Young President's Organization, with its emphasis on education and idea exchange, plays a vital role in this process. You provide leaders who can insure that we continue to move forward in the best traditions of the free enterprise system.

I hope all of you have enjoyed your visit to Washington. I understand that tomorrow you will have a meeting with the leaders of Congress. Someone told me that the schedule says it will include "Five Congressmen and Five Senators each speaking for five minutes." All I can say is ... Good Luck. My good friend, Hubert Humphrey takes five minutes just to say hello.

And now, why don't you all join me in the State Dining Room for some refreshments and a chance to get to talk to each other.
