BACKGROUNDER on Greek Festival Ribbon Cutting

This is the 12th annual festival the Greek community has had. It has become a tradition, and now attracts some 15,000 people from the Washington, D.C., area during its three days.

The purpose of the festival is to raise funds for the church's educational activities -- for support of its parochial school and for support of the classes the church sponsors in public schools (they hold Greek language and cultural classes in schools and churches throughout Washington).

It is very much a light-type of event, with lots and lots of people and kids running around, lots of noise and dancing and Greek food (the women spend weeks baking their pastries and other foods, and it is a source of great pride for them. They would probably be flattered beyond belief if it turns out to be appropriate to taste something.)

Father Kalaris himself is a died-in-the-wool Democrat but a great Betty Ford fan. He has stressed over and over how impressed he was that in spite of what he termed 'the world coming down around you' on August 8, you kept your commitment to meet with him and do the publicity for the Festival.

The people in your audience and at the fair generally are a real cross-section of ages. Everything from early Greek immigrants in their 60s or 70s, to second and third generation Greek families to children who attend the parish school, Father Thomas Daniels Parochial School, who will attend the ribbon cutting and sing a hymn.

Father Kalaris himself has a father from Greece, a mother from Italy. He has been in the Washington, D.C. area for 21 years.

Father Kalaris voiced the hope that because of the Greek political situation, he particularly hoped you might make mention of your high esteem of Greek-Americans and what they contribute to this country. It would mean much to the Greek community, he said.
