I. PURPOSE



II. BACKGROUND, INVITEES & PRESS PLAN

A. Background: For many years there existed the tradition of an annual White House dinner/reception honoring Federal judges. This practice was discontinued in the last Administration, apparently resulting in some adverse comments within the judicial community. The reinstitution of the event should be well received by the judiciary and by Members of Congress and the public interested in the operations of the Federal courts. Particular attention should be given to the event due to the recent retirement of Justice Douglas and public speculation on potential appointees to fill this vacancy. Of course, the dinner was set prior to the resignation of Justice Douglas.

B. Invitees:

1. The invitation list included: (1) the Justices of the Supreme Court; (2) the Chairmen and ranking Republicans on the Senate and House Judiciary Committees; (3) all of the Chief Judges of the various Circuit Courts and other distinguished members of the Federal bench; (4) the Chairman of the Conference of State Chief Justices; (5) the Attorney General.



Deputy Attorney General and Solicitor General;
and (6) Phil Buchen, Jack Marsh, Ed Schmuts,
Ken Lazarus and Dick Parsons of the White
House staff. Spouses were included.

2. A list of attendees will be provided by Maria Downs.

3. A majority of the individuals mentioned in press
accounts as possible successors to Justice Douglas
will be in attendance.

Dress: Black Tie ... long dresses for the ladies

Entrance:

-- Approximately 8:10 p.m. ... the Military Aide will escort you and Mrs. Ford via elevator to the State Floor and through the Red Room into the Blue Room where you will greet Chief Justice and Mrs. Burger and Attorney General and Mrs. Levi. The official photograph will be taken at this time.

NOTE: This will also serve as a press photo opportunity.

-- The Attorney General and Mrs. Levi and the Chief Justice and Mrs. Burger will be escorted to the East Room where they will be announced and take their positions in the receiving line.

-- You and Mrs. Ford will be escorted to the red carpet facing the East Room where the Color Guard will be awaiting you ... pause for Ruffles and Flourishes and announcement.

-- Follow Color Guard into East Room when "Hail to the Chief" is played.

Receiving Line:

-- Take position just inside door of East Room (Mrs. Ford to your right ... then Chief Justice Burger ... then Mrs. Burger ... then Attorney General Levi ... then Mrs. Levi). Military Social Aide will present your guests.

-- After receiving line, follow guests into the State Dining Room.

Dinner:

- Round tables
- The Army Strolling Strings will play during dessert.
- After dessert, you will rise and make remarks ... Chief Justice Burger will also make remarks.
- No press coverage of dinner; toasts will be piped to the press ... transcripts will be released to the press ... there will be mini-camera coverage of the toasts with a small photo pool.

After-Dinner:

- 10:00 p.m. ... guests proceed to parlors for demitasse, liqueurs, and cigars. You and Mrs. Ford will mingle informally with your guests.
- You and Mrs. Ford will invite your guests to join you in the East Room for dancing.
- The Marine Dance Orchestra will provide the dance music ... the orchestra will be positioned on a platform along the center of the east wall.
- There will be champagne and mixed drinks for your guests.
- There will be small round tables in the East Room.

- Military Social Aides will be present.

- A Marine Harpist will be playing in the Diplomatic Reception Room as your guests arrive.

TEXT OF
PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS
TOAST TO THE JUDICIAL DINNER

It has been said that law is the only profession in which the practitioner can produce something that is 200 pages in length -- and still have it called a brief. Well, tonight, let me assure you, that the brief I am about to present -- will be very.

This dinner revives an annual White House custom of past years to recognize the vital contribution of the Federal Judiciary to the maintenance of a free republic. Mrs. Ford and I are delighted and honored by the presence of so many distinguished jurists and their spouses.

It is appropriate to restore this custom as we approach our Bicentennial. Let us renew our gratitude to the great Americans who conceived the American system of government. They understood that government under law, with its proven checks and balances, is the firmest pillar of this Nation's freedom.

With a clear understanding of history, the framers knew that an independent judiciary -- the guardian of a written constitution -- is essential to the preservation of individual liberties under a government of limited powers.

Our strong judicial system offers the world an example of how an independent judiciary can restrain the other branches of government when they overreach, and, on occasion, force them to meet their responsibilities under the constitution.

The American legal system has produced many giants of law: both of the bar and the bench. They symbolize the genius and wisdom that two centuries of jurisprudence have produced from men and women of widely differing political philosophies.

But our great pride is not only in a few outstanding individuals, it is in the many able and honest jurists whose daily performance gives our entire judiciary a well deserved reputation for competence and integrity.

The judiciary truly deserves the respect of the American people. As one of the three separate branches of the Federal government, the judiciary also deserves the highest respect of the Congress and of the Executive Branch.

In this spirit, I propose a toast to you for your dedicated work and, on behalf of all Americans, I thank you and your colleagues not with us tonight. You have kept the constitution alive and vigorous for 186 years and it remains our strongest guarantee of freedom in the future.



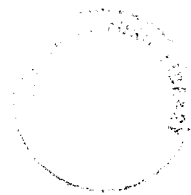


