

Washington, D. C. -- Mrs. Betty Ford today presented the American Cancer Society's Courage Award to golfing ace Gene Littler who conducted a personal battle against cancer.

In a White House ceremony launching the Society's 1976 Educational and Fund Raising Crusade, the First Lady gave Littler a special plaque, honoring him for "his personal courage and the hope he has given to all Americans."

During his regular checkup in the Spring of 1972, Littler's doctor found a tiny tumor under his left arm. The tumor was removed and a biopsy revealed it was malignant melanoma. After the doctor informed Littler that extensive surgery was needed, the golfing champ told him to "get on with it as it was his family that was the only consideration and not his golf career."

A major operation left Littler with much muscle weakness, but as his doctor put it, "his determination to recover was incredible." Littler began outpatient therapy, swiming and weight training and he also began swinging his golf club. In a few months, he played in the Armstrong Cork Co. 18-hole Invitational Tournament. Last year, he won three major PGA tournaments.

When he won the \$50,000 Westchester Classic last August, he said, "Three years ago I didn't know if I'd ever play again...I don't mind talking about it. I figure if I'm out there playing pretty good, and people who have had the same trouble see me, it may help them just a little. It's a nice thought. I'd like to help a little if I can."

When he received \$8,000 for a hole-in-one in that tournament, he promptly gave it to the American Cancer Society calling it "a pretty good shot."

Mrs. Ford underwent breast cancer surgery in the fall of 1974 and was honored by the ACS for alerting millions of women to the importance of early detection and prompt treatment. She is National Honorary Chairman of the 1976 Cancer Crusade.

The American Cancer Society is seeking to top last year's \$109 million raised in Crusade and legacies, according to ACS Chairman of the Board, Thomas P. Ulmer, and about 2,000,000 volunteers are expected to visit more than 40 million homes with life saving leaflets about cancer this April.

The full text of the plaque awarded to Littler said: "The American Cancer Society salutes Gene Littler for his personal courage in his battle against cancer; for the hope and inspiration he has given all Americans in the fight for life and health." It was signed by President Ford, ACS President, Benjamin F. Byrd, Jr., M.D.; and ACS Board Chairman, Mr. Ulmer.



A BACKGROUNDER ON GENE LITTLER

When Gene Littler won the \$50,000 Westchester Classic golf tournament in Harrison, N.Y. last August, he also received an extra \$8,000 for a hole-in-one at the 14th hole.

He promptly gave the \$8,000 to the American Cancer Society in the name of Gary Sanders, a 25 year-old on the PGA tour who had died the following Friday, and had been scheduled for cancer surgery the next day after Gene's spectacular win.

Littler, whose dramatic comeback from cancer surgery in 1972 said, "Three years ago I didn't know if I'd ever play again...I don't mind talking about it. I figure if I'm out there playing pretty good, and people who have had the same trouble see me, it may help them just a little. It's a nice thought. I'd like to help a little if I can."

During his regular check-up in the Spring of 1972, Littler's doctor found a tiny tumor under his left arm - so small he hadn't noticed it. The tumor was removed March 15th and a biopsy proved it to be a malignant melanoma. This is a particularly fast spreading cancer and the earlier it is discovered, the better the patient's chances of recovery.

When Dr. Harvey P. Groesbeck of the San Diego Tumor Institute
"laid it on the line with Gene" telling him that extensive surgery
was needed "in order to have a chance of getting everything", Littler
said without hesitation to "get on with it as it was his family that
was the only consideration and not his golf career."

The operation was done on April 4. A large area of Gene's left axilla (the cavity beneath the shoulder joint involving the armpit, shoulder and chest muscles, nerves, etc.) was removed.

The post-operative prognosis 48 hours later showed no spreading malignancy.

Although Gene experienced much muscle weakness and could not even raise his left arm without holding it with his right hand, "his determination to recover was incredible", Dr. Groesbeck said later.

Gene began outpatient therapy immediately, swimming and weight training and unknown to his doctors, he began swinging his golf club the day he came home to La Jolla, California.

One day six weeks later when he was told he could then try and swing a club, he told the doctors he had played 10 holes of golf that day.

A month later, he played in the Armstrong Cork Company 18 Hole Invitational Tournament. Since then his great will to return to his championship playing which earned him the nickname "Gene the Machine" has brought him to new heights of achievement.

In 1975, the Amazing Gene won three of the major PGA tournaments. They were: 1) the 34th Bing Crosby National Pro-Am at Pebble Beach;

2) the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic; and 3) the Westchester Classic where he made a hole-in-one during the final round to tie Julius Boros before beating him in sudden death. This was the 28th tour victory of his amazing career, and the hole-in-one he said in typical Littler understatement "was a pretty good shot."

He finished among the top 10 players in eight tournaments of the PGA tour, earning \$182,883 in 1975 bringing his career earnings to \$1,203,541. So far, in 1976 he has won \$17,346. In 1973, he won the St. Louis Children's Hospital Golf Classic (the St. Louis Open) earning \$95,308 that year. Although he didn't win in 1974, he earned \$102,308 that year with a form observers said approached his playing when he won the U.S. Open in 1961. He was also a member of the 1975 Ryder Cup Team.

In a recent magazine article in Golf Digest "Why Littler Had His Best Year" by Nick Seitz. he is quoted as saying "I used to say give me five more years and I'll be off this tour so fast. I started saying that about 15 years ago. I don't say that anymore. Maybe I'm on a mission, trying to give some of the people who face the illness I did a little lift. I'm going to play as long as I can play well."
