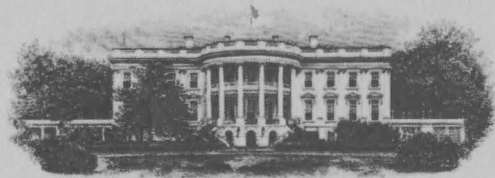

April 6, 7 or 8 would be good dates for Mrs. Ford to see the Visitors Waiting Area which will be established on the Ellipse beginning March 16 through October 23. An invitation would be extended to the members of the Congressional committees which appropriated the funds for this special Bicentennial program to join her. I would suggest the following format.

1. Mrs. Ford could make brief remarks to the visitors assembled in the bleachers. This would provide her with an opportunity to thank the members of the two committees for their support of this special project and would enable her to make some appropriate remarks about the importance of the Bicentennial and to express her interest in sharing the White House with the American people.
2. She could then tour the area and meet the Park Service employees who are running this program.
3. She could also meet the high school or college band which will be performing for the visitors at that time and express her appreciation for their participation in the Bicentennial program.

Mrs. Ford has indicated that she would like to do this, schedule permitting. It would be best to schedule this for early April from the standpoint of inviting the members of the Congressional committees.



If that time should not prove to be convenient for Mrs. Ford, most any day, Tuesday through Saturday, later in the spring would be fine for her to drop by the Ellipse.

I have attached a fact sheet which we have prepared for tours during 1976 as additional background.

SCHEDULE OF WHITE HOUSE TOURS FOR 1976

To better accommodate visitors to the White House during our Bicentennial, the following provides information on tour procedures and scheduled events for 1976.

1. Tuesday, March 16, 1976 - Saturday, October 23, 1976

A Visitors Waiting Area will be established on the Ellipse in cooperation with the National Park Service. During this period, visitors should proceed to the Ellipse south of the White House -- not to the East Gate.

- (a) Visiting hours will be Tuesday through Friday 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. (most days, schedule permitting) and on Saturday 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The White House will be closed on Sunday and Monday.
- (b) Ticket booths will be open at 8:00 a.m. each day, Tuesday through Saturday. Tickets may be obtained from 8:00 a.m. to 12 noon, Tuesday through Friday, and on Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Each member of a family or a group must obtain a ticket for the tour. Tickets are available the day of the tour only.
- (c) Each visitor after being issued a ticket (specifying the time of the tour) may either leave the park to visit other attractions or choose to view the entertainment program (9:30 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. most days) on the Ellipse. Bleachers will be available. Visitors will be escorted from the Ellipse to the White House at the appointed time.

2. Before March 16 and after October 23, 1976

The White House will be open from 10 a.m. to 12 noon Tuesday through Saturday and closed on Sunday and Monday. Visitors should come to the East Gate on East Executive Avenue.

3. Garden Tours

As a special program for the Bicentennial, Mrs. Ford has asked that the gardens and grounds be open to the public on the following days:

Saturday	April 24	Sunday	April 25
Saturday	May 29	Sunday	May 30
Saturday	June 19	Sunday	June 20
Saturday	July 17	Sunday	July 18
Saturday	August 7	Sunday	August 8
Saturday	September 18	Sunday	September 19
Saturday	October 16	Sunday	October 17

Reservations are not required, admission is free. The tour includes the grounds and the State Floor of the White House. Each visitor receives a brochure as a guide to the grounds.

Special Note: On Saturdays the hours will be 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. and the Visitors Waiting Area will be used. On Sundays the hours will be 2:00 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. and the Visitors Waiting Area will not be used. Visitors should come directly to the East Gate on East Executive Avenue.

4. Easter Egg Roll

Children 8 years and younger, accompanied by an adult, are invited to participate on Monday, April 19, 1976 from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. There will be entertainment and an egg rolling contest. Reservations are not required, admission is free. Participants should come to the Southeast Gate which is located at the intersection of East Executive Avenue and Alexander Hamilton Place, N.W.

5. Holidays

The White House will be open the following Monday holidays:

May 31	Memorial Day
September 6	Labor Day
October 11	Columbus Day

Visiting hours will be 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Ticket booths on the Ellipse will be open 8:00 a.m. to 12 noon.

The White House will be closed the following holidays: New Year's Day, Thanksgiving, and Christmas.

SCHEDULE OF WHITE HOUSE TOURS FOR 1976

To better accommodate visitors to the White House during our Bicentennial, the following provides information on tour procedures and scheduled events for 1976.

1. Tuesday, March 16, 1976 - Saturday, October 23, 1976

A Visitors Waiting Area will be established on the Ellipse in cooperation with the National Park Service. During this period, visitors should proceed to the Ellipse south of the White House -- not to the East Gate.

- (a) Visiting hours will be Tuesday through Friday 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. (most days, schedule permitting) and on Saturday 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The White House will be closed on Sunday and Monday.
- (b) Ticket booths will be open at 8:00 a.m. each day, Tuesday through Saturday. Tickets may be obtained from 8:00 a.m. to 12 noon, Tuesday through Friday, and on Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Each member of a family or a group must obtain a ticket for the tour. Tickets are available the day of the tour only.
- (c) Each visitor after being issued a ticket (specifying the time of the tour) may either leave the park to visit other attractions or choose to view the entertainment program (9:30 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. most days) on the Ellipse. Bleachers will be available. Visitors will be escorted from the Ellipse to the White House at the appointed time.

2. Before March 16 and after October 23, 1976

The White House will be open from 10 a.m. to 12 noon Tuesday through Saturday and closed on Sunday and Monday. Visitors should come to the East Gate on East Executive Avenue.

3. Garden Tours

As a special program for the Bicentennial, Mrs. Ford has asked that the gardens and grounds be open to the public on the following days:

BACKGROUND FOR MRS. FORD
WHITE HOUSE VISITORS WAITING AREA
WEDNESDAY, APRIL 14, 1976

The White House has more than one million visitors per year and has previously been known for its long waiting lines in the spring and summer. In order to better accommodate visitors during the Bicentennial, this ticketed system was developed, enabling visitors to secure a definite time for the tour. Visitors are then free to leave and view other places of interest in the area and return at the appointed time, or they may sit in the covered bleachers and enjoy entertainment. Bands of the Armed Services along with choirs, bands, and marching units of high school and college age from all over the country have volunteered to perform this spring and summer. On Wednesday, April 14, between 10:45 and 11:45 a.m. the Larkin High School Chorus of Elgin, Illinois will be performing.

This concept had enthusiastic support from the Senate and House Subcommittees on Appropriations for the White House. The National Park Service personnel have been doing a good job, and this program will be used during the heavy spring and summer months in future years.

BACKGROUND

In late 1974, you and the President, as well as several Members of Congress, expressed an interest in better accommodating the many visitors who would be coming to the White House during the Bicentennial. Since then, the National Park Service, working closely with Mike Farrell and appropriate Members of Congress, has designed, received approval for funding and constructed the new White House Waiting Area on the Ellipse. This improved system makes provision for chairs, bands and marching units of high school and college age from all over the country, as well as the Armed Services, to perform this spring and summer for visitors as they are waiting to tour the White House.

WHITE HOUSE-TOURISTS

BY FRANCES LEWINE

WASHINGTON (AP) -- FIRST LADY BETTY FORD TODAY HAILED A NEW SYSTEM TO MAKE WAITING LESS TIRESOME FOR VISITORS WHO COME BY THE THOUSANDS EACH DAY TO THE WHITE HOUSE.

SHE WENT TO THE ELLIPSE SOUTH OF THE WHITE HOUSE WHERE BLEACHERS WITH RED AND WHITE STRIPED AWNINGS HAVE BEEN SET UP FOR TOURISTS TO WATCH ENTERTAINMENT WHILE THEY WAIT THEIR TURN TO GO THROUGH THE WHITE HOUSE.

BEFORE A CROWD OF ABOUT 2,500 IN THE STANDS, MRS. FORD SAID THE "CROWDS SEEMED TO BE GETTING LARGER EVERY YEAR" AND SHE EXPECTS THE BICENTENNIAL TO DRAW A RECORD TURNOUT.

"I CAN REALLY APPRECIATE THE PROBLEMS OF STANDING IN LINE WITH CHILDREN," SAID MRS. FORD. "IN MY YEARS IN WASHINGTON, I STOOD IN MANY, MANY, LINES, INCLUDING THOSE FOR THE WHITE HOUSE." FOR THE BICENTENNIAL YEAR, THE WHITE HOUSE HAS EXTENDED TOUR HOURS AND ADOPTED A NEW SYSTEM WHEREBY VISITORS CAN GET A TICKET IN ADVANCE FOR A SPECIALTIMED TOUR. THEY MAY WAIT IN THE BLEACHERS OR DO OTHER TOURING UNTIL THEIR VISIT TIME IS CALLED.

THE NATIONAL PARK SERVICE INAUGURATED THE SYSTEM FOR SEVERAL MONTHS LAST FALL, AND IT PROVED SUCCESSFUL.

MARCHING AND MUSIC UNITS FROM HIGH SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES AROUND THE COUNTRY HAVE VOLUNTEERED TO ENTERTAIN.
