





LA GRANDE MADEMOISELLE

One day in February 1953, newspapers throughout the world carried a first-page announcement: "Chanel reopens her House".

The largest French magazine, Paris-Match, devoted six pages to this event and the American dailies carried the news in their headlines.

Thus, after fifteen years of silence and turmoil, the world had not forgotten the glory of the lady who had so triumphantly revolutionized fashion: Miss Chanel.

One beautiful summer's day at the Longchamp race-track, where the world's most elegant women strutted about in audacious and sumptuous costumes which rivalled each other in extravagance, a thigyoung girl named Gabrielle Chanel made her first appearance in this ultra-chic circle.

She wore the strictest of dresses and the simplest of hats, but they were so well cut and had such personal elegance that she rapidly became the general center of attention. All the other women suddenly seemed flashy and over-dressed and, in a word, already out of style.

Thus began the fabulous career of Chanel, a career which progressed so rapidly that several months later, these same women were clamoring for her advice and her salons had become a fashionable meeting-place.

Yet, only a few months before this memorable day at the race-track, Chanel had opened a small hat shop on the rue Cambon and recently extended her activities to fashion...

In the shop at 31 rue Cambon, Coco Chanel created fashion, which did not mean for her creating models for the privileged few who could afford fabulous prices.

It meant creating a style which could be worn in the street, tour the world and become anyone in any circle.

With a snip of the scissors, Chanel eliminated frou frous and flounces and, as her friend Jean Cocteau liked to say, by a kind of miracle, she applied to fashion laws which had hitherto been applicable only to painting, poetry and music.

Not only did fashion undergo a great change because of this, but there arose a different way of thinking, feeling and a totally new, simplified and purified notion of femininity.

Chanel never presents complicated, exaggerated lines or uncomfortable forms; her style is classic and "a comfortable elegance" is her principle.

Elegance is a personal gift of women. It cannot be bought. Simple and beautiful lines, choice materials, faultless work - these are what one offers her. To quote Chanel:

"I do my best to leave women their own personal arms - youth, grace and allure - and offer them the possibility of selecting, according to the new lines, all the delicious frivolities which are the secret of Paris".

Chanel has always had a preference for jersey, which is ideal for light, comfortable coats and lissome two-piece suits, which are the basis of her collections.

Chanel was the first to create costume jewelry, conceived as accessories for her jerseys. This has become one of the most important French industries. Buyers from the world over come to Paris to get new ideas and carry back models which will be reproduced by the thousands.

But, Chanel's greatest achievement is perhaps perfume. In 1920, while vacationing in the South of France, Chanel visited the Grasse perfume factories and, fascinated by this industry from the first visit, returned time and time again. She obviously had an instinctive and very keen sense of perfume.

She was the first to think of assorting perfume to her collection and set out to find the man who could carry out this idea. She contacted Ernest BEAUX. En 1924, his "liquids" were among the most original.

He presented two numbered series to Coco Chanel, one from 1 to 5, the other from 20 to 24. Coco Chanel selected several bottles, one of which bore the number 5.

There was then the problem of naming the new perfume. Coco Chanel thought for several seconds and then exclaimed, "I am presenting my collection on the 5th of May, which is the fifth month of the year, so we'll keep the number it bears and this number 5 will bring it good luck".

The great lady was right, for Chanel No. 5 was an over-whelming success and the first post-war perfume which has keep its original popularity.

The creation of No. 5 marks a special date in the history of perfumes. The violet and lavander perfumes which were in style disappeared as definitely as the extravagant and unwearable costumes had disappeared a few years before.

And so it was that a thin, fragile country girl, with her large expressive eyes, straight black hair and "tomboy" air, and with no other aid than her great talent, deep artistic sense, unwavering will, courage and dominant personality, imposed a notion of elegance which still reigns over the world of fashion.
