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




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


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
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
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


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
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
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
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


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
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
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
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


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
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
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
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
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
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#### MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE WASHINGTON HEART ASSOCIATION

I welcome this opportunity to salute the Women's Board of the Washington Heart Association for its enthusiastic and effective support of the struggle against heart disease. I am mindful of the almost half a million dollars raised by the board over the past 25 years on behalf of the Washington Heart Association. Its wisdom as well as its generosity has helped make possible the development of interest in health care and research oriented careers among high school students, a hypertension detection program for District of Columbia teen-agers, the improvement in cardiovascular education for physicians, nurses and paramedical personnel, and most recently, the expansion of a cardiopulmonary resuscitation training program that will ultimately spread to the entire community.

Diseases of the heart and circulation rank number one as killers of Americans with no sex or age group spared. Reduction of this toll requires a broad approach including research and education as well as the delivery of medical care based on existing knowledge. The past 25 years has seen a remarkable explosion of accomplishments in the cardiovascular field from the introduction of corrective cardiac surgery and the development of electronic life-saving devices to the beginning of effective epidemiologic measures to prevent heart disease. We have learned that non-physician allied health personnel can be trained to prevent death outside the hospital as well as in. Indeed lay people have applied cardiopulmonary resuscitation successfully in selected situations.

Although our ultimate goal is prevention of heart disease, reduction of the disability and death is already a reality to some extent. It is certainly premature to be complacent but we have a momentum going now that will require extensive and intensive effort to maintain and even accelerate. Heart disease, high blood pressure and stroke are everyone's problem and their control should be everyone's concern. The Heart Association as a voluntary health organization with its unique blend of physicians and lay volunteers, is engaged in a multi-faceted effort through research, education, and community service to eradicate our nation's leading health problem. Money alone cannot be the solution, but people working together can be.


