RI CHOU-SUCCESSOR

TOKYO (AP) -- DEPUTY PREMIER TENG HSIAO-PING, WHO WAS PRESIDENT FORD'S OFFICIAL HOST ON HIS VISIT TO PEKING LAST MONTH, IS THE MOST TALKED-ABOUT PERSONALITY IN THE CHINESE HIERARCHY TO SUCCEED PREMIER CHOU EN-LAI.

TENG, BELIEVED TO SUPPORT CHOU'S MODERATE LINE, FAVORS CONTINUING GOOD TIES WITH THE UNITED STATES, BUT HE MADE IT CLEAR TO FORD DURING THE VISIT THAT CHINA WAS OPPOSED TO U.S. DETENTE WITH THE SOVIET UNION.

TENG IS 71 AND AN OLD PROTEGE OF CHOU. HE CARRIED OUT THE DAY-TO-DAY FUNCTIONS OF GOVERNMENT WHILE CHOU WAS AILING IN A HOSPITAL.

THE DEPUTY PREMIER, HOWEVER, WAS LISTED FOURTH TODSY IN THE 107-MEMBER FUNERAL COMMITTEE FOR CHOU, BEHIND CHAIRMAN MAO TSE-TUNG, WANG HUNG-WEN AND YEH CHIEN-YING. WHETHER THERE WAS ANY SIGNIFICANCE IN THE ORDER OF NAMES LISTED ON THE FUNERAL COMMITTEE COULD NOT BE IMMEDIATELY DETERMINED.

WANG, 40, HAS BEEN MENTIONED AS A POSSIBLE SUCCESSOR TO MAO, WHO IS 82. WANG HAS BEEN REFERRED TO BY WESTERN EXPERTS ON CHINA AS AN UP-AND-COMING "WHIZ KID" IN THE HIERARCHY. YEH, WHO IS 79, IS THE DEFENSE MINISTER.

TENG (PRONOUNCED DUNG) FELL INTO DISGRACE IN 1967 DURING THE HEIGHT OF THE GREAT PROLETARIAN CULTURAL REVOLUTION EVEN THOUGH HE WAS SECRETARY GENERAL OF THE CHINESE COMMUNIST PARTY, A MEMBER OF THE POLITBURO AND A DEPUTY PREMIER. HIRZLAUPN):4858: 2- )8, 08-9, THEN DEFENSE MINISTER AND THE MAN DESIGNATED AS MAO'S HEIR APPARENT.

BUT LIN DIED IN A PLANE CRASH EN ROUTE TO THE SOVIET UNION IN 1971 AND THIS PAVED THE WAY FOR CHOU TO BRING ABOUT TENG'S REHABILITATION IN 1973.

BOTH MAO AND CHOU LOOKED TO TENG IN THE FORMATIVE YEARS OF THE CHINESE COMMUNIST PARTY FOR ADMINISTRATIVE AND POLITICAL DIRECTION. CHOU AND TENG STUDIED IN FRANCE TOGETHER IN THE EARLY 1920S AND

WHILE THERE FORMED A BRANCH OF THE CHINESE COMMUNIST PARTY. TENG HAS BEEN A SHARP CRITIC OF THE SOVIET UNION AND IS SAID TO

BELIEVE THAT CHINA HAS A FUTURE IN DETENTE WITH THE UNITED STATES AND THE WEST.

IN ADDITION TO SERVING AS DEPUTY PREMIER, TENG IS A DEPUTY CHAIRMAN OF THE COMMUNIST PARTY, DEPUTY CHAIRMAN OF THE MILITARY AFFAIRS COMMISSION, A MEMBER OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE OF THE POLITBURO AND CHIEF OF STAFF OF THE PEOPLE'S LIBERATION ARMY.

RW U.S.-CHINA AN AP NEWS ANALYSIS

WASHINGTON (AP) -- THE DEATH OF CHINESE PREMIER CHOU EN-LAI IS NOT EXPECTED TO AFFECT EFFORTS TO IMPROVE AMERICAN RELATIONS WITH THE CHINESE GOVERNMENT IN PEKING.

THE PREMIER'S DEATH WAS REPORTED WEDNESDAY BY THE CHINESE NEWS AGENCY HSINHUA AND WAS MONITORED BY THE STATE DEPARTMENT IN WASHINGTON AND RADIO PRESS, A JAPANESE NEWS AGENCY IN TOKYO.

EVEN THOUGH HE WAS THE ARCHITECT OF THE CHINESE POLICY OF CREATING RELATIONS WITH THE UNITED STATES, THE DRIVE FOR FRIENDLIER CONTACTS EXPANDED BEYOND HIS PERSONAL EFFORTS.

U.S. OFFICIALS IN MAKING THIS ANALYSIS POINTED OUT THAT CHOU HAS NOT EXERCISED ANY REAL LEADERSHIP IN PEKING SINCE HE BECAME SERIOUSLY ILL 15 MONTHS AGO.

NEVERTHELESS, THE CHINESE CONTINUED THE POLICY OF SEEKING BETTER RELATIONS WITH WASHINGTON, INCLUDING INVITING SECRETARY OF STATE HENRY A. KISSINGER AND PRESIDENT FORD TO VISIT THE ASIAN NATION.

THE MAN EXPECTED TO TAKE CHOU'S PLACE, DEPUTY PREMIER TENG HSIAO-PING, IS CONSIDERED A STRONG SUPPORTER OF INCREASED CONTACTS WITH THE UNITED STATES.

TENG HAS EXERCISED THE EFFECTIVE DAY-TO-DAY LEADERSHIP OF CHINA SINCE CHOU BECAME ILL. HIS POSITION IS FULLY SUPPORTED BY COMMUNIST PARTY LEADER MAO TSE-TUNG, WHO HIMSELF HAS GIVEN INCREASING RESPONSIBILITY TO TENG IN RECENT MONTHS.

THE CHINESE ATTITUDE TOWARD THE UNITED STATES HAS BECOME INSTITUTIONALIZED, U.S. OFFICIALS SAID, AND HAS OUTSTRIPPED THE PERSONALITIES IN THE GOVERNMENT LEADERSHIP.

IN EFFECT, ANY STRUGGLE FOR LEADERSHIP TOOK PLACE MORE THAN A YEAR AGO WHEN IT WAS APPARENT THAT CHOU WOULD NOT RECOVER FROM HIS ILLNESS, U.S. OFFICIALS ADDED.

THIS MEANS THE UNITED STATES CAN BE REASONABLY CONFIDENT THAT CHINA WILL CONTINUE ITS INTEREST IN AVOIDING CONFLICT WITH THE UNITED STATES.

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(REACTION) WASHINGTON (UPI) -- PRESIDENT FORD TODAY PAID TRIBUTE TO THE "REMARKABLE" CHOU EN-LAI, AND TOLD PEKING THE DEATH OF THE CHINESE PREMIER IS NO BAR TO CONTINUING THE SINO-AMERICAN COOPERATION HE HELPED ESTABLISH.

"PREMIER CHOU EN-LAI WILL BE LONG REMEMBERED AS A REMARKABLE LEADER WHO HAS LEFT HIS IMPRINT NOT ONLY ON THE HISTORY OF MODERN CHINA BUT ALSO ON THE WORLD SCENE," FORD SAID IN A STATEMENT ISSUED AT THE WHITE HOUSE.

"WE AMERICANS WILL REMEMBER HIM ESPECIALLY FOR THE ROLE HE PLAYED IN BUILDING A NEW RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA AND THE UNITED STATES. WE ARE CONFIDENT THAT THIS RELATIONSHIP WILL CONTINUE TO DEVELOP ON THE FOUNDATION OF UNDERSTANDING AND COOPERATION WHICH HE HELPED TO ESTABLISH.

"THE UNITED STATES OFFERS ITS CONDOLENCES TO THE GOVERNMENT AND PEOPLE OF THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA."

SECRETARY OF STATE HENRY KISSINGER EXPRESSED SORROW AT CHOU'S DEATH, BUT LIKE FORD PREDICTED IT WILL PRODUCE NO CHANGE IN U.S.-CHINESE RELATIONS.

PRESS SECRETARY RON NESSEN SAID FORD PLANS TO WRITE LETTERS OF CONDOLENCE TO COMMUNIST PARTY CHAIRMAN MAO TSE-TUNG, TO CHOU'S WIDOW, TENG YING-CHAO, AND TO TENG HSIAO-PING, CHINA'S CHIEF VICE PREMIER AND DAY-TO-DAY RULER.

THE WHITE HOUSE SAID IT WAS AWAITING WORD ON PEKING'S PLANS FOR CHOU'S LAST RITES BEFORE DECIDING IF AMERICA COULD AND WOULD BE REPRESENTED.

FORD VISITED CHINA EARLY IN DECEMBER, BUT DID NOT SEE THE AILING CHOU. HE DID MEET WITH THE PREMIER DURING A 1972 VISIT WHEN HE WAS STILL IN CONGRESS.

"I HAVE ALWAYS THOUGHT OF PRIME MINISTER CHOU EN-LAI AS A VERY CONSIDERABLE MAN AND A GREAT LEADER," KISSINGER TOLD REPORTERS AT THE STATE DEPARTMENT. "I REGRET HIS DEATH."

"THE RELATIONS BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA ARE DETERMINED BY PERMANENT INTERESTS," HE SAID, "AND THEREFORE WILL CONTINUE ON THEIR PRESENT COURSE."

"I ADMIRED CHOU EN-LAI VERY MUCH," KISSINGER SAID. ASKED WHAT EFFECT HIS DEATH MIGHT HAVE ON INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS GENERALLY, HE RESPONDED: "I DON'T THINK IT'S GOING TO CHANGE THE WORLD'S BALANCE OF POWER."

SEN. EDWARD KENNEDY, D-MASS., IN A STATEMENT RELEASED BY HIS OFFICE HERE, SAID:

"THE DEATH OF PREMIER CHOU EN-LAI REMOVES FROM THE WORLD SCENE A MAN WHO HELPED TO MOVE AND SHAPE HIS NATION OF 800 MILLION PEOPLE AND TO CHANGE FUNDAMENTALLY THE POLITICAL FACE OF ASIA.

"ALONG WITH OUR ALLIANCE WITH JAPAN, U.S.-CHINESE RELATIONS ARE VITAL TO THE FUTURE OF ASIA AND TO PROSPECTS FOR PEACE AND DEVELOPMENT IN THAT PART OF THE WORLD.

"WITH NEW LEADERS COMING TO POWER IN CHINA IT IS ALL THE MORE IMPORTANT FOR THE UNITED STATES TO BUILD ON THE NEW RELATIONSHIP THAT SO MANY AMERICANS HAVE WORKED FOR IN RECENT YEARS."

THE DEFENSE DEPARTMENT PLANS AN OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT LATER IN THE DAY.

SECRETARY OF STATE HENRY KISSINGER SAID IN PEKING THE CHINESE HAD REPORTED ON SEVEN AMERICAN PERSONNEL. THE FIGURE INCLUDED THE FOUR DECEASED AMERICANS, AS WELL AS DOWNEY AND FECTEAU. THE CHINESE ALSO MENTIONED CMDR. ROBERT FLYNN, WHO WAS DOWNED WITH BUCKLEY AND RELEASED IN 1973.

THE STATE DEPARTMENT HAD BEEN PRESSING SINCE 1973 FOR INFORMATION ABOUT U.S. PERSONNEL THOUGH TO BE MISSING IN CHINA. THE CHINESE MADE THE ANNOUNCEMENT AS A GOOD WILL GESTURE DURING PRESIDENT FORD'S VISIT TO PEKING.

WASHINGTON (UPI) -- CHINA IS RETURNING THE ASHES OF TWO U.S. PILOTS -- LT. CMDR. JAMES L. BUCKLEY AND PRCS KENNETH W. PUGH -- WHO WERE LOST DURING THE VIETNAM WAR IN 1967 AND 1966, ADMINISTRATION SOURCES DISCLOSED TODAY.

THE CHINESE ALSO REPORTED TO PRESIDENT FORD THIS WEEK IN PEKING THAT THE BODIES OF PILOT ROBERT C. SNODDY, OF ROSEBURG, ORE., AND CO-PILOT NORMAN A. SCHWARTZ, OF LOUISVILLE, KY., WERE BURIED AT THE SITE WHERE THEIR C47 WAS SHOT DOWN ON AN ILL-FATED CIA COVERT FLIGHT OVER CHINA NOV. 29, 1952.

A SEARCH WAS MADE OF THE CRASH SITE, THE SOURCES SAID, BUT THE BODIES WERE NOT RECOVERED.

THIS FLIGHT CARRIED CIA EMPLOYES JOHN T. DOWNEY AND RICHARD G. FECTEAU ON A FLIGHT TO PICK UP AGENTS WHO HAD BEEN DROPPED INTO CHINA. THEIR AIRCRAFT WAS SHOT DOWN BY SMALL ARMS FIRE, AND DOWNEY AND FECTEAU WERE TAKEN PRISONER.

BOTH DOWNEY AND FECTEAU WERE SEIZED, TRIED AND IMPRISONED. FECTEAU WAS RELEASED DEC. 13, 1971, AFTER SERVING MOST OF A 20-YEAR TERM. DOWNEY, NOW A STUDENT AT THE HARVARD LAW SCHOOL, WAS RELEASED MARCH 12, 1973 AFTER PRESIDENT NIXON PUBLICLY ACKNOWLEDGED THAT HE HAD BEEN ON A CIA MISSION.

WASHINGTON (UPI) -- AS PRESIDENT FORD'S ADVANCE TEAM PREPARED TO LEAVE FOR PEKING, A GEORGIA CONGRESSMAN SAID TODAY HE HAD GATHERED 203 CO-SPONSORS FOR A RESOLUTION URGING CONTINUED SUPPORT FOR TAIWAN.

"WE HAVE 203 CO-SPONSORS, AND WE ARE HOPING FOR 218 BEFORE PRESIDENT FORD LEAVES FOR PEKING," AN AIDE TO REP. DAWSON MATHIS, D-GA., SAID.

THE RESOLUTION URGES PRESIDENT FORD TO DO NOTHING TO COMPROMISE THE FREEDOM OF NATIONALIST CHINA WHEN HE MAKES HIS FIRST PRESIDENTIAL TRIP TO PEKING.

IT SAYS: "IT IS THE SENSE OF CONGRESS THAT THE UNITED STATES, WHILE ENGAGED IN A LESSENING OF TENSIONS WITH THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA, DO NOTHING TO COMPROMISE THE FREEDOM OF OUR FRIEND AND ALLY, THE REPUBLIC OF CHINA AND ITS PEOPLE."

NEW YORK (UPI) -- ASIAN AFFAIRS EXPERTS SAID TODAY CHINA IS IN SUCH A STATE OF TURMOIL THAT PRESIDENT FORD'S FORTHCOMING VISIT TO PEKING WILL BE ONLY A SYMBOLIC REAFFIRMATION OF LONG-RANGE INTENTIONS AND WILL SHOW THE VERY SHALLOWNESS OF SINO-AMERICAN RELATIONS.

THEY SAID IT IS A VISIT THAT NEITHER CHINA NOR THE UNITED STATES REALLY WANTS BUT ARE POWERLESS TO CALL OFF LEST THE WORLD MISINTERPRET A CANCELLATION AS A WORSENING OF THESE TENUOUS TIES.

THE FORD VISIT BEGINNING NOV. 29 COMES AT A PARTICULARLY AWKWARD TIME FOR THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC BECAUSE IT IS FACED WITH QUESTIONS OF ITS OWN LEADERSHIP, INTERNATIONAL SECURITY AND ECONOMIC WOES.

HERE IS A RUNDOWN OF THE TROUBLES BESETTING CHINA AS OUTLINED BY ASIAN AFFAIRS EXPERTS:

LEADERSHIP -- THE MEN WHO LED THE CHINESE REVOLUTION IN THE 1930-49 ERA ARE AGING BUT HESITATE TO GIVE POWER TO THE YOUNG. SECURITY -- STRATEGY IS TO BE ABLE TO INFLICT SUCH UNACCEPTABLE DAMAGE AS THE DESTRUCTION OF VLADIVOSTOK AND TO ACCEPT AN INVASION II

WOULD DEFEAT BY SHEER MASS OF HUMANITY.

ECONOMY -- IT HAS PERFORMED WELL FOR A DECADE AND AGRICULTURE HAS KEPT PACE WITH POPULATION GROWTH. INDUSTRIAL PRODUCTION SPEARHEADED BY OIL PRODUCTION IS UP 10 PER CENT. BUT THE RATE OF GROWTH IS SLOWING DANGEROUSLY. THERE ARE SIGNS OF WORKER DISCONTENT WITH FROZEN WAGES AND DEMANDS FOR CONSUMER GOODS THAT ARE NOT AVAILABLE.

FOREIGN POLICY -- CHINA IS WORRIED BY THE RAPID RISE OF THE SOVIET UNION, WHICH IT SEES AS DOMINATED BY A RAPACIOUS BUREAUCRACY BENT ON SPREADING ITS INFLUENCE EVERYWHERE IN A THREAT TO WORLD PEACE. TAIWAN -- THE KEY ISSUE PREVENTING FULL U.S.-CHINESE DIPLOMATIC

RELATIONS.

ASKED AT A WHITE HOUSE NEWS BRIEFING IF FORD WOULD MEET WITH CHINESE COMMUNIST PARTY CHAIRMAN MAO TSE-TUNG AND PREMIER CHOU EN-LAI IN PEKING, PRESS SECRETARY RON NESSEN SAID "WE ASSUME THE PRESIDENT WILL BE RECEIVED BY THE HIGHEST OFFICIALS." WASHINGTON (UPI) -- PRESIDENT FORD SAID TODAY HIS JOURNEY TO CHINA NEXT WEEK HAS "GREAT SIGNIFICANCE" AND REPRESENTS ANOTHER STEP IN A CONTINUING EFFORT TO STABILIZE SINO-AMERICAN RELATIONS.

FORD SPENT MOST OF FRIDAY GOING THROUGH BRIEFING BOOKS FOR THE LO-DAY ASIAN TOUR WHICH BEGINS WITH A ONE-DAY STOP IN ALASKA TOMORROW. HE TOOK TIME OUT TO WELCOME THE NATIONAL WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

TEAM OF THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA IN A ROSE GARDEN CEREMONY. SPEAKING OF HIS VISIT TO CHINA, FORD SAID: "IT IS A TRIP OF GREAT SIGNIFICANCE. IT WILL BE ANOTHER STEP IN THE EFFORT ON THE PART OF THE TWO GOVERNMENTS TO EXPAND OUR RELATIONS AND TO BROADEN THE NORMALIZATION" BETWEEN PEKING AND WASHINGTON.

ADMINISTRATION OFFICIALS ALREADY HAVE RULED OUT ANY DIPLOMATIC BREAKTHROUGH IN RELATIONS BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND CHINA OR ANY RESOLUTION OF THE TAIWAN QUESTION.

"I WOULD NOT LOOK FOR A BREAKTHROUGH OR MAJOR NEW DEVELOPMENTS," WHITE HOUSE PRESS SECRETARY RON NESSEN TOLD REPORTERS. "AT THE SAME TIME, THE PRESIDENT CONSIDERS IT IMPORTANT TO MAINTAIN CONTINUITY...AND TO CONTINUE DISCUSSIONS WHERE THERE IS AGREEMENT AND WHERE THEY HAVE DIFFERING VIEWS."

THERE HAS BEEN SOME PUBLIC CRITICISM OF THE TRIP AS UNNECESSARY AND PROBABLY NONPRODUCTIVE. REP. DAWSON MATHIS, D-GA. CLAIMS SUPPORT OF NEARLY HALF OF THE HOUSE FOR A RESOLUTION TELLING FORD "TO DO NOTHING TO COMPROMISE" THE FREEDOM OF NATIONALIST CHINA WHEN HE VISITS PEKING.

FORD FLIES TO FAIR BANKS, ALASKA, TOMORROW TO VIEW THE CONSTRUCTION SITE OF THE ALASKA PIPELINE AND DELIVER WHAT NESSEN SAID WOULD BE A "SUBSTANTIVE SPEECH" DEALING WITH THE U.S. ENERGY SITUATION, ALASKA'S NEWLY DEVELOPING RESOURCES AND THE AMERICAN ROLE IN THE PACIFIC.

LATER, THE PRESIDENT ATTENDS A BIRTHDAY PARTY FOR SEN. TED STEVENS, R-ALASKA, IN ANCHORAGE AND SPENDS THE NIGHT THERE BEFORE FLYING ON TO JAPAN FOR A REFUELING STOP EN ROUTE TO A MONDAY ARRIVAL IN PEKING.

FORD WILL BE ACCOMPANIED BY HIS WIFE BETTY AND DAUGHTER SUSAN. THE FORDS TRAVELED TO CHINA IN THE SUMMER OF 1972 WHEN HE WAS THE REPUBLICAN HOUSE LEADER.

SECRETARY OF STATE HENRY KISSINGER AND A NUMBER OF TOP WHITE HOUSE STAFF MEMBERS ALSO WILL ACCOMPANY THE PRESIDENT. TWO PRESS CHARTERS CARRYING NEARLY 200 NEWSPAPER AND BROADCAST CORRESPONDENTS AND TECHNICIANS WILL BE IN THE TRAVELING PARTY.

FORD WILL STOP IN INDONESIA, THE PHILIPPINES AND HAWAII BEFORE RETURNING TO WASHINGTON DEC. 8.

BUDGET DIRECTOR JAMES T. LYNN WILL ACCOMPANY THE PRESIDENT TO CHINA. WHITE HOUSE SPOKESMEN HAVE SAID LYNN AND THE PRESIDENT WILL SPEND BETWEEN THREE AND FOUR HOURS EACH DAY WORKING ON THE FISCAL 1977 BUDGET.

IT WILL BE ANOTHER STEP IN THE EFFORT ON THE PART OF THE TWO GOVERNMENTS TO EXPAND OUR RELATIONS AND TO BROADEN THE NORMALIZATION" BETWEEN PEKING AND WASHINGTON, HE SAID IN GREETING 19 MEMBERS OF THE NATIONAL WOMEN'S BASKETBALL TEAM OF THE PEOPLES REPUBLIC OF CHINA.

"IT IS VITAL FROM OUR POINT OF VIEW THAT THIS DIALOGUE, THESE DISCUSSIONS CONTINUE," HE TOLD THE VISITORS IN THE WHITE HOUSE ROSE GARDEN.

FORD LEAVES SATURDAY ON A 10-DAY TRIP TO CHINA AND THE FAR EAST. A SENIOR U.S. OFFICIAL TOLD REPORTERS EARLIER THAT ONLY TALKS WITH CHINESE LEADERS BY FORD AND SECRETARY OF STATE HENRY KISSINGER CAN PRODUCE THE RESULTS THE ADMINISTRATION SEEKS FROM ITS RELATIONS WITH PEKING.

WASHINGTON (AP) -- TENG HSIAO-PING, WHO MAY SUCCEED MAO TSE-TUNG, REPORTEDLY IS STRENGTHENING HIS POWER BASE AND U.S. INTELLIGENCE OFFICIALS SAY PRESIDENT FORD SHOULD PAY CLOSE ATTENTION TO HIM DURING HIS TRIP NEXT WEEK TO THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA.

TENG IS CONSIDERED BY MANY ANALYSTS AS THE MOST POWERFUL LEADER IN CHINA, SECOND ONLY TO MAO.

NOW VICE PREMIER AND NOMINALLY SUBORDINATE TO AILING PREMIER CHOU EN-LAI, TENG HAS BEEN SLOWLY BUILDING HIS POWER BASE.

FOR EXAMPLE, U.S. INTELLIGENCE SOURCES SAY TENG RECENTLY WAS INSTRUMENTAL IN MOVING CHEN HSI-LIEN, THE PEKING REGION MILITARY COMMANDER AND A TENG ALLY, INTO POSITION TO BECOME DEFENSE MINISTER.

AL O, TENG HAS BEEN SHIFTING CERTAIN PROVINCIAL LEADERS AROUND TO PREVENT THEM FROM ESTABLISHING THEIR OWN POWER BASES, ANALYSTS SAY.

THE CURRENT READING BY U.S. INTELLIGENCE IS THAT TENG AT THE LEAST WILL BECOME THE TOP FIGURE IN A COLLECTIVE LEADERSHIP AFTER THEDEATHS OF MAO, 82, AND CHOU, 77.

HOWEVER, THE ANALYSTS BELIEVE TENG IS LIKELY TO EMERGE AS DOMINANT IF HE IS ABLE TO CON OLIDATE HIS POWER BASE ENOUGH TO REPEL CHALLENGES, PRINCIPALLY FROM THE RADICAL WING OF THE CHINESE COMMUNIST PARTY.

BASED ON HIS PAST PERFORMANCE, IT APPEARS THAT TENG WOULD CONTINUE CHINA'S ESTRANGEMENT FROM THE SOVIET UNION.

IN THE EARLY YEARS OF THE CHINESE-SOVIET SPLIT, TENG PUBLICLY ACCUSED THE SOVIET UNION OF WEAKENING THE INTERNATIONAL COMMUNIST MOVEMENT. ONE U.S. INTELLIGENCE APPRAISAL OF TENG SAID THAT BY THE NEARINEIREDSTRIIONHOB BEING A MAN ABLE TO

STAND UP TO AND INFURIATE THE SOVIET LEADERS."

TENG WAS IN DISGRACE FOR ABOUT SIX YEARS AFTER FALLING VICTIM TO THE "CULTURAL REVOLUTION" ENGINEERED BY THE RADICALS. BUT HE WAS RESTORED TO POWER NEAR THE TOP IN 1973.

LAST YEAR, TENG BECAME THE FIRST HIGH-LEVEL CHINESE COMMUNIST OFFICIAL TO VISIT THE UNITED STAES WHEN HE LED HIS COUNTRY'S DELEGATION TO A SPECIAL UNITED NATIONS GENERAL ASSEMBLY MEETING ON WORTD RESOURCES.

AT 71, TENG IS HARDLY A "YOUNG TURK." HE WAS ONE OF THE EARLY ACTIVISTS IN THE CHINESE COMMUNIST PARTY ABOUT 50 YEARS AGO AND JOINED MAO IN THE "LONG MARCH" OF THE 1930S.

HE STUDIED IN FRANCE AND RUSSIA, SPEAKS FRENCH FLUENTLY AND REPORTEDLY HAS RECENTLY LEARNED A SMATTERING OF ENGLISH.

INTELLIGENCE EXPERTS DESCRIBE HIM AS SHORT, HEAVY SET AND TOUGH. THEY SAY HE HAS ALWAYS BEEN AN ENERGETIC LEADER WITH A KEEN MIND AND A TALENT FOR ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION.

MEANWHILE, AN AMERICAN HISTORIAN WHO INTERVIEWED MAO'S WIFE, CHIANG CHING, DECLINED TO COMMENT ON REPORTS THAT THE RADICAL LEADER OF THE CULTURAL REVOLUTION HAS COME UNDER ATTACK BECAUSE OF INFORMATION DISCLOSED TO THE AMERICAN SCHOLAR.

"I WOULD NOT WANT TO COMMENT UNLESS SOMETHING WAS SAID BY THE PARTY IN CHINA ABOUT A CHANGE IN MISS CHIANG'S STATUS, IF THERE HAS BEEN ANY CHANGE, AND RELATING THAT CHANGE TO HER EXTRAORDINARY INTERVIEWS," SAID ROXANE WITKE, ASSISTANT PROFESSOR AT THE STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK AT BINGHAMPTON.

THE NEW YORK TIMES REPORTED TODAY THAT MISS CHIANG CAME INTO DISFAVOR BECAUSE OF THE INTERVIEWS WITH PROFESSOR WITKE.;

AS ALWAYS, MAO'S VISITORS WERE SUMMONED WITHOUT ADVANCE WARNING, AND NOTHING WAS DISCLOSED ABOUT THE SUBJECTS DISCUSSED. BUT SENIOR U.S. OFFICIALS HAD SAID EARLIER THAT "THE MEETING IS THE MESSAGE," SIGNIFICANT IN ITSELF IN REFLECTING CHINA'S ABSORBING INTEREST IN CONTINUED FRIENDSHIP AND COOPERATION WITH THE UNITED STATES.

OTHER WESTERN DIPLOMATS SAID MAO SEEMED TO BE INTERJECTING HIMSELF MORE DIRECTLY INTO CHINESE NEGOTIATIONS WITH A FOREIGN VISITOR, POSSIBLY BECAUSE OF THE URGENCY OF HIS CONCERN OVER SOVIET INTENTIONS AND THE PITFALLS OF FORD'S POLICY OF DETENTE WITH THE RUSSIANS.

THE PRESIDENT BEGAN HIS SECOND DAY IN PEKING WITH 2 1-2 HOURS OF TALKS IN A SALON OF THE GREAT HALL OF THE PEOPLE WITH TENG, ACTING HEAD OF THE CHINESE GOVERNMENT IN THE ABSENCE OF HOSPITALIZED PREMIER CHOU EN-LAI.

U.S. OFFICIALS SAID FORD AND THE CHINESE NEGOTIATORS "SILENTLY AGREED TO DISAGREE" ON DETENTE, WHICH PEKING VIEWS AS AN ILLUSION HIDING SOVIET PLANS FOR WORLD DOMINATION, AND TO TURN TO OTHER ISSUES.

THESE COULD INCLUDE TAIWAN, THE MAIN OBSTACLE TO FORMAL DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS BETWEEN THE TWO COUNTRIES, KOREA AND THE U.S. ROLE IN THE FAR EAST FOLLOWING THE VIETNAM WAR.

THE CHAIRMAN ALSO MET BETTY FORD, HER 18-YEAR-OLD DAUGHTER SUSAN, SECRETARY OF STATE HENRY A. KISSINGER, GEORGE BUSH, CHIEF OF THE U.S. LIAISON OFFICE IN PEKING; BRENT SCOWCROFT, THE PRESIDENT'S NATIONAL SECURITY ADVISER; JOSEPH J. SISCO, UNDERSCRETARY OF STATE; PHILIP HABIB, ASSISTANT SECRETARY OF STATE FOR EAST ASIAN AND PACIFIC AFFAIRS; WINSTON LORD, DIRECTOR OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT POLICY STAFF; AND RICHARD SOLOMON, SENIOR STAFF MEMBER OF THE NATIONAL SECURITY COUNCIL.

THE TALK WAS HELD IN THE PRESENCE OF FORD, KISSINGER, BUSH, SCOWCROFT AND LORD.

MRS. FORD AND THE OTHERS SHOOK HANDS WITH MAO AND POSED FOR A PHOTOGRAPH, THEN LEFT.

THE PHRASEOLOGY OF THE COMMUNIQUE ISSUED BY THE CHINESE GOVERNMENT SUGGESTED THAT THE DISCUSSIONS WERE MORE THAN USUALLY CORDIAL. NO DETAILSWERE GIVEN EITHER BY THE WHITE HOUSE OR BY THE CHINESE.

FIRST VICE PREMIER TENG HSIAO-PING, VICE PREMIER LI HSIEN-NIEN, FOREIGN MINISTER CHIAO KUAN-HUA, HUANG CHEN, CHIEF OF THE CHINESE LIAISON OFFICE IN WASHINGTON, WANG HAI-JUNG, VICE FOREIGN MINISTER, AND TWO DEPUTY DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS, TANG WEN-SHENG AND CHANG HAN-CHIH, REPRESENTED THE CHINESE SIDE.

PEKING (UPI) -- CHAIRMAN MAO TSE-TUNG, REPORTED LOOKING SURPRISINGLY FIT, HOSTED PRESIDENT FORD IN HIS FORBIDDEN CITY HOME TODAY AND HELD NEARLY TWO HOURS OF TALKS OFFICIALLY DESCRIBED AS "SIGNIFICANT AND EARNEST ... IN A FRIENDLY ATMOSPHERE."

THE MEETING, CLEARLY A DIPLOMATIC FEATHER IN FORD'S CAP, RAN ONE HOUR AND 50 MINUTES -- AN UNUSUALLY LONG MEETING FOR THE AILING, 81-YEAR-OLD MAO AND NEARLY TWICE THE TIME HE SPENT WITH PRESIDENT RICHARD M. NIXON DURING HIS HISTORIC 1972 VISIT.

HOURS AFTER THE EVENT, THE CHINESE ISSUED A STATEMENT APPROVED BY THE WHITE HOUSE WHICH SAID:

"AFTER SHAKING HANDS WITH EACH OF THE AMERICAN GUESTS, CHAIRMAN MAO HAD EARNEST AND SIGNIFICANT DISCUSSIONS WITH PRESIDENT FORD ON WIDE-RANGING ISSUES IN A FRIENDLY ATMOSPHERE."

THERE WAS NO ELABORATION ON SPECIFIC TOPICS DISCUSSED, BUT THE VERY LENGTH OF THE MEETING SEEMED TO INDICATE CHINA WANTS TO MAINTAIN STRONG AND DIPLOMATICALLY CORDIAL TIES WITH WASHINGTON IN SPITE OF ITS OPPOSITION TO U.S.-SOVIET DETENTE.

DIPLOMATS SAID THE TERMS "WIDE-RANGING" AND "SIGNIFICANT" INDICATED MAO AND FORD PROBABLY INCLUDED DETENTE, KOREA AND THE THORNY PROBLEM OF U.S. SUPPORT FOR THE NATIONALIST GOVERNMENT IN TAIWAN IN THEIR LATE AFTERNOON DISCUSSION.

DEPUTY WHITE HOUSE SECRETARY WILLIAM GREENER CALLED THE CHINESE STATEMENT "A FAIR DESCRIPTION" OF THE TALKS.

U.S. OFFICIALS MADE CLEAR LONG AGO FORD WOULD NOT HAVE COME TO CHINA HAD A VISIT WITH MAO -- THE ULTIMATE DIPLOMATIC COMPLIMENT CHINA CAN PAY -- NOT BEEN PROMISED.

BUT THE TIMING OF THE VISIT WAS KEPT A MYSTERY UNTIL THE PRESIDENT, MRS. FORD, DAUGHTER SUSAN AND FORD'S ADVISERS SPED OFF TO MAO'S RESIDENCE IN PEKING'S FORBIDDEN CITY IN THE AFTERNOON.

AND THE LENGTH AND CORDIALITY OF THE MEETING SEEMED TO UNDERSCORE CHINA'S AIM OF TREATING FORD PERSONALLY WITH WARMTH WHILE SCOLDING THE UNITED STATES FOR ITS DETENTE POLICY.

MAO HAS REPORTEDLY SUFFERED A SERIES OF STROKES AND GRANTS SUCH AUDIENCES SELECTIVELY, BUT A SENIOR AMERICAN OFFICIAL IN FORD'S PARTY SAID THE CHAIRMAN WAS MENTALLY SHARP AND SEEMED SURPRISINGLY FIT.

THIS OFFICIAL SAID MAO WALKED THE FORD PARTY TO THE DOOR AT THE END OF THE VISIT AND SAID RUMORS THE CHAIRMAN WAS WHEELCHAIR-RIDDEN WERE UNTRUE.

AFTER INTRODUCTIONS, HANDSHAKES AND SOME SMALL TALK, MRS. FORD AND SUSAN LEFT, ACCOMPANIED BY SISCO, HABIB AND SOLOMON. KISSINGER, BUSH, SCOWCROFT AND LORD REMAINED FOR FORD'S TALK WITH MAO.

A U.S. SPOKESMAN SAID THE VISIT LASTED AN HOUR AND 55 MINUTES. DETAILS WERE TO BE ANNOUNCED LATER.

MRS. FORD BOUGHT CHINESE GINGER JARS, TINY STUFFED ANIMALS TO HANG ON THE WHITE HOUSE CHRISTMAS TREE, QUARTZ GRAPES AND A QUARTZ EGG. BUT SHE VETOED SUSAN'S PROPOSAL THEY TAKE HOME A \$300 ORIENTAL CARPET. TOO COSTLY, SHE SAID.

SUSAN, 18, A TRAINEE PROFESSIONAL PHOTOGRAPHER, LEARNED ABOUT MEDICAL ACUPUNCTURE BY WATCHING AND PHOTOGRAPHING OPERATIONS AT A PEKING HOSPITAL.

SHE WATCHED DOCTORS REMOVE AN OVARIAN CYST AND PULL A TOOTH WITH THE PATIENTS ANESTHET IZED BY THE ORIENTAL NEEDLE TECHNIQUE. "I'M NOT SQUEAMISH," SHE TOLD REPORTERS, AND PRONOUNCED THE EXPERIENCE "FANTASTIC" AND "NEAT."

FORD'S DAY, HOWEVER, DEALT MAINLY WITH THE SERIOUS BUSINESS OF EXPLAINING HIS VISIT IN TERMS THAT WOULD DISPEL SKEPTICISM AT HOME AS TO ITS ACCOMPLISHMENTS. SEATED ACROSS FROM EACH OTHER AT THE GREAT HALL CONFERENCE TABLE THIS MORNING, HE AND TENG GOT RIGHT TO THAT WORK.

WHEN REPORTERS RIBBED FORD GOOD-NATUREDLY ABOUT THE SECRECY AND LACK OF INFORMATION DURING THE VISIT, THE PRESIDENT SMILED AND SAID, "ALL TO THE GOOD!"

TURNING SERIOUS, HE SAID "WE'VE HAD A VERY, VERY CONSTRUCTIVE SERIES OF MEETINGS AND I THINK THE RESULT WILL BE VERY BENEFICIAL."

THE FORDS WILL STAY OVERNIGHT IN JAKARTA FRIDAY AND COMPLETE THEIR 10-DAY, 24,000-MILE TOUR WITH STOPOVERS IN THE PHILIPPINES AND PEARL HARBOR.

THE CHINESE WASTED NO TIME MONDAY IN RESTATING THEIR POSITION ABOUT AMERICAN DETENTE WITH THE SOVIET UNION. VICE PREMIER TENG HS A0-PING TOLD FORD AT THE CHINESE STATE BANQUET, "RHETORIC ABOUT DETENTE OWINGODAGGEEROEPWIRE'STARK REALITY OF THE G

THEN, HE GOT DOWN TO SOME INTENSIVE TALKS WITH THE PRESIDENT WHICH WOUND UP THURSDAY. IN THEM FORD ADVISED HIS CHINESE HOSTS THE UNITED STATES WILL CONTINUE TO PRESS FOR AGREEMENT ON NUCLEAR ARMS CONTROL WITH MOSCOW NO MATTER HOW DEEPLY THE CHINESE BELIEVE THAT THIS IS A DDANGEROUS COURSE. S MADE AMPLY EVIDENT TUESDAY AFTERNOON WHEN 81-YEAR-OLD CHAIRMAN MAO TSE-TUNG GAVE AN HOUR AND 50 MINUTE AUDIENCE TO THE AMERICANS. ITS LENGTH, AND HIS CORDIALITY, PUT THE CHINESE SEAL OF APPROVAL ON THE FORD MISSION.

THE CHINESE LATER DESCRIBED THE MEETING, WHICH LASTED NEARLY TWICE AS LONG AS THE 1972 TALKS WITH RICHARD M. NIXON, AS EARNEST, SIGNIFICANT AND FRIENDLY. WHAT THE CHINESE THINK OFFICIALLY IS REFLECTED IN THEIR SOMETIMES STILTED WRITTEN STATEMENTS. "FRANK AND SERIOUS," THE WORDS USED TO CHARACTERIZE THE NIXON MEETING, MEANT THERE WERE DIFFERENCES. SOME OF FORD'S PARTY FELL BACK FROM THE GROUP, SHOWING SIGNS THEY HAD LITTLE INTEREST IN SUCH ATTRACTIONS AS A REPORT ON HOW THE FARMERS' TIGER HEAD MOUNTAIN PRODUCTION BRIGADE BOOSTED SORGHUM HARVEST.

SHOWING SIGNS OF FATIGUE FROM HIS BUSY PACE OF DIPLOMACY AND SIGHTSEEING, FORD MET FOR 2 1-2 HOURS OF "SIGNIFICANT DISCUSSIONS ON A WIDE RANGE OF ISSUES" WITH ACTING PREMIER TENG HSIAO-PING OVER TEA AT THE PRESIDENT'S GUEST HOUSE.

WHITE HOUSE AIDES CONFIRMED THERE WOULD BE NO FINAL COMMUNIQUE MARKING ANY NEW BREAKTHROUGHS IN U.S.-CHINESE RELATIONS, BUT TOOK PAINS TO STRESS THAT FORD'S FOUR DAYS OF TALKS WERE GOING WELL.

"YOU SHOULD NOT TAKE THE ABSENCE OF A COMMUNIQUE AS A NEGATIVE FACTOR," WHITE HOUSE PRESS SECRETARY RON NESSEN TOLD REPORTERS. "THE ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND PURPOSES OF THIS MEETING HAVE NOTHING TO DO WITH A SIGNED DOCUMENT."

VENTURING OUT SEPARATELY, MRS. FORD MARVELED AT PRICELESS JADES AND GOLD-SPLASHED PAGODAS IN THE ANCIENT IMPERIAL FORBIDDEN CITY AND THEN, AT THE CENTRAL MAY 7 ART COLLEGE, KICKED OFF HER SHOES AND JOINED A TROUPE OF YOUNG FEMALE DANCERS IN HER STOCKINGED FEET.

LIKE HER FATHER, SUSAN FORD, 18, SEEMED TO BE FEELING THE TOLL. SHE TOOK HER CAMERAS TO A COMMUNE, THE TEMPLE OF HEAVEN AND THE SUMMER PALACE TO WORK ON A COLLEGE PHOTO ESSAY, BUT BOWED OUT OF THE EVENING DINNER AND SPORTS EXHIBITION.

"SUSAN IS JUST TIRED," THE WHITE HOUSE SAID.

THE PEKING PEOPLE'S DAILY CONTINUED ITS PROMINENT COVERAGE OF FORD'S VISIT WITH A FRONT PAGE PICTURE OF THE PRESIDENT AND MAO. CHINESE TELEVISION SHOWED A FILM OF THE TWO LEADERS GREETING EACH OTHER WARMLY AT MAO'S HOME.

EXCHANGING CHAMPAGNE TOASTS AT THE FORMAL CONCLUSION OF FORD'S FOUR-DAY VISIT, ACTING PREMIER TENG HSIAO-PING AGREED THAT RELATIONS BETWEEN THE TWO ARE "FULL OF VITALITY" -- AND HE DROPPED ALL MENTION OF THE DETENTE ISSUE THAT SO ANGERS THE CHINESE, INSTEAD REFERRING SOFTLY TO "DIFFERENCES OF PRINCIPLE."

THE CHINESE TOOK PAINS TO SUPPORT FORD'S ASSESSMENT THAT HIS VISIT WAS A SUCCESS EVEN WITHOUT PROGRESS ON SPECIFIC ISSUES LIKE DETENTE OR ANY OFFICIAL COMMUNIQUE TO BACK IT UP.

EARLIER, AT THE START OF HIS FINAL TALKS WITH FORD, TENG SAID THE VISIT HAD BOTH STRENGTHENED TIES AND INTRODUCED "A NEW STYLE" OF DISCREET SECRECY IN WASHINGTON-PEKING RELATIONS.

CONCEDING IN HIS BANQUET TOAST THAT CHINA AND AMERICA "NATURALLY HAVE DIFFERENCES OF PRINCIPLE," TENG SAID, "BUT AT THE SAME TIME ... OUR TWO NATIONS HAVE PROBLEMS OF MUTUAL CONCERN AND HAVE MANY COMMON POINTS."

HE SAID BOTH SIDES STILL REGARD THE 1972 SHANGHAI COMMUNIQUE ISSUED AT THE END OF PRESIDENT RICHARD NIXON'S VISIT AS "THE BASIS FOR U.S.-CHINESE RELATIONS.

"IT REMAINS FULL OF VITALITY TODAY."

FORD HOSTED THE FAREWELL BANQUET IN THE GREAT HALL OF THE PEOPLE, WHERE A PARTY OF 700 DINED ON CONSOMME, FRIED DUCK CUTLETS, BRAISED SHARK'S FIN AND STRAWBERRY MOUSSE WASHED DOWN WITH CALIFORNIA CHAMPAGNE.

"IT HAS BEEN A SIGNIFICANT VISIT," FORD SAID.

"THE WIDE-RANGING TALKS WHICH I HAVE HELD WIH CHAIRMAN MAO TSE-TUNG AND WITH VICE PREMIER TENG HAVE BEEN FRIENDLY, CANDID, SUBSTANTIAL AND CONSTRUCTIVE.

"WE DISCUSSED OUR DIFFERENCES, WHICH ARE NATURAL IN A RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN TWO COUNTRIES WHOSE IDEOLOGIES, SOCIETIES AND CIRCUMSTANCES DIVERGE. BUT WE ALSO CONFIRM THAT WE HAVE IMPORTANT COMMON POINTS ...

"ALT HOUGH OUR RELATIONS ARE NOT YET NORMALIZED, THEY ARE GOOD," FORD SAID. "THEY WILL BE GRADUALLY IMPROVED ..."

THERE WAS A SMALL DIPLOMATIC BOUQUET FOR THE CHINESE AMONG THE "COMMON POINTS" OF INTEREST FORD MENTIONED -- A CONFIRMATION THAT --LIKE CHINA -- THE UNITED STATES OPPOSES "THE EFFORTS OF OTHERS TO IMPOSE HEGEMONY (MILITARY DOMINATION) IN ANY PART OF THE WORLD."

IN U.S.-CHINESE DIPLOMATIC PARLANCE, "OTHERS" ARE THE SOVIETS.

"THE UNITED STATES IS COMMITTED TO COMPLETE THE NORMALIZATION OF RELATIONS," WITH PEKING, FORD SAID, SIMPLY OMITTING ANY REFERENCE TO U.S. SUPPORT FOR THE TAIWAN GOVERNMENT WHICH BLOCKS ESTABLISHMENT OF FULL RELATIONS WITH CHINA.

BUT FORD DID MAKE CLEAR, GENTLY, THAT THE UNITED STATES WILL GO ITS OWN WAY AND CONTINUE TO SEEK AGREEMENTS ON PEACEFUL RELATIONS WITH THE SOVIETS DESPITE CHINA'S BITTER OPPOSITION.

WASHINGTON (UPI) -- THE UNITED STATES AND CHINA HAVE SETTLED THEIR DIFFERENCES OVER PRESIDENT FORD GOING TO PEKING AND AGREED THE JOURNEY WILL TAKE PLACE AT THE END OF THE MONTH, WHITE HOUSE OFFICIALS SAID TODAY.

AN EXCHANGE OF MESSAGES BETWEEN SECRETARY OF STATE HENRY KISSINGER AND CHINESE FOREIGN MINISTER CHAIO KUAN-HUA FIXED ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE TRIP, DIPLOMATIC SOURCES SAID.

THE COUNTRIES HAVE AGREED TO JOINTLY ANNOUNCE THE VISIT AND DATES. THE WHITE HOUSE OFFICIALS SAID THE ANNOUNCEMENT WILL COME SHORTLY.

THE TRIP HAD BEEN AGREED UPON IN PRINCIPLE DURING KISSINGER'S DECEMBER 1974 PEKING VISIT BUT RAN INTO TROUBLE. DURING KISSINGER PEKING VISIT LAST MONTH HE WAS EXPECTED TO REACH AGREEMENT ON THE DATES. INSTEAD, HE RETURNED TO WASHINGTON WITH PUBLIC AND PRIVATE CHINESE CRITICISM OF AMERICA'S DETENTE POLICY TOWARD RUSSIA, PEKING'S ARCH FOE.

DIPLOMATIC EXCHANGES LED WASHINGTON TO BELIEVE TWO WEEKS AGO THAT THE VISIT WAS WRAPPED UP AND THE WHITE HOUSE ORDERED AN ADVANCE PLANNING PARTY TO LEAVE FOR THE CHINESE CAPITAL NOV. 3.

BUT FINAL PEKING AGREEMENT ON DATES DID NOT COME; THE ADVANCE PARTY WAS ABOARD ITS AIR FORCE JET PLANE AT ANDREWS AIR FORCE BASE OUTSIDE WASHINGTON WHEN ORDERS CAME FOR THE MEMBERS TO RETURN TO THEIR OFFICES.

KISSINGER WENT BACK TO WORK ON PEKING AND FINAL AGREEMENT WAS REACHED THIS WEEK, THE SOURCES SAID.

AN INFORMED SOURCE DECLINED TO IDENTIFY THE JAPANESE OFFICIAL, BUT TOSHIO KOMOTO, MINISTER OF INTERNATIONAL TRADE AND INDUSTRY, WAS THE LAST GOVERNMENT OFFICIAL TO VISIT CHINA.

DIPLOMATIC SOURCES HAVE SAID THE PRESIDENT WAS CONSIDERING STOPPING IN INDONESIA AND THE PHILIPPINES.

ACCORDING TO ADMINISTRATION SOURCES, KISSINGER WON ASSURANCE DURING HIS PEKING VISIT OF ONE VITAL REQUIREMENT FOR A FORD VISIT --THAT CHINESE COMMUNIST PARTY CHAIRMAN MAO TSE-TUNG WOULD PERSONALLY GREET THE PRESIDENT. OTHERWISE, THE SOURCES SAID, FORD WOULD NOT PLAN THE JOURNEY.

ACCORDING TO THE DIPLOMATIC SOURCES, THE FORD VISIT TO PEKING WILL LAST FOUR DAYS. ORIGINALLY IT HAD BEEN SCHEDULED TO RUN SIX DAYS. THE SOURCES SAID TAKING OFF TWO DAYS FOR VISITS TO OTHER COUNTRIES WAS DESIGNED AS A DIPLOMATIC METHOD OF SHOWING THE CHINESE THAT WASHINGTON DID NOT APPRECIATE PEKING'S WORDS ON AMERICAN POLICY TOWARD RUSSIA.

DIPLOMATIC SOURCES SAID THEY EXPECTED NO DRAMATIC AGREEMENTS OR NEGOTIATIONS TO TAKE PLACE IN THE VISIT.

KISSINGER SAID THERE WILL BE NO MAJOR BREAKTHROUGHS DURING THE TRIP, ADDING THAT HIGH-LEVEL U.S.-CHINESE CONSULTATIONS ARE JUSTIFIED WHETHER OR NOT IMPORTANT AGREEMENTS ARE SIGNED.

GREENER SAID HE HAD NO WORD ON WHEN AN AMERICAN ADVANCE TEAM WOULD LEAVE FOR PEKING. IT WAS SCHEDULED TO LEAVE WASHINGTON A WEEK AGO. SOME SOURCES SAID THEY UNDERSTOOD THE ADVANCE TEAM WOULD NOT LEAVE UNTIL FORD RETURNS NOV. 18 FROM AN INTERNATIONAL ECONOMIC SUMMIT.

FORD HAS SCHEDULED SEVERAL FUND-RAISING APPEARANCES THIS WEEK BEFORE LEAVING FOR THE ECONOMIC SUMMIT, INCLUDING A FRIDAY MORNING VISIT TO NORTH CAROLINA CENTRAL UNIVERSITY IN DURHAM.

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WASHINGTON (UPI) -- DIFFERENCES STILL REMAIN BETWEEN WASHINGTON AND PEKING ON PRESIDENT FORD'S PROPOSED TRIP TO CHINA, THE WHITE HOUSE REPORTED THURSDAY.
