WOMEN OF THE YEAR

NEW YORK (AP) -- IT TOOK THE NATIONAL LABOR RELATIONS BOARD AND A FEDERAL COURT JUDGE TO CLEAR THE WAY FOR FIRST LADY BETTY FORD TO PERSONALLY ACCEPT ON TELEVISION AN AWARD AS ONE OF 10 'WOMEN OF THE YEAR'' DESPITE A STRIKE BY NATIONAL BROADCASTING CO. TECHNICIANS.

MRS. FORD SPELLED OUT HER DILEMMA TO REPORTERS THURSDAY NIGHT AS SHE ENTERED THE ED SULLIVAN THEATER ON BROADWAY THROUGH AN ENTRANCE CLEARED OF PICKETS BY COURT ORDER.

'I HAD PROMISED TO BE HERE,'' SHE SAID ON ARRIVING FOR THE TAPING OF THE SHOW. ''I CERTAINLY DID NOT WANT TO CROSS THE PICKET LINE.''

CONNECTICUT GOV. ELLA GRASSO, ALSO AN AWARD WINNER, AND REP. BELLA ABZUG, D-N.Y., WHO WAS TO MAKE A PRESENTATION, REFUSED TO ATTEND TAPING OF THE AWARDS SHOW, TELECAST BY NBC SEVERAL HOURS LATER.

THE WEEK-LONG STRIKE BY THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF BROADCAST EMPLOYES AND TECHNICIANS HAS FORCED THE NETWORK TO USE SUPERVISORY EMPLOYES IN UNION MEMBERS' JOBS.

THE UNION HAD ASKED THE 'WOMEN OF THE YEAR' WINNERS, INCLUDING THE FIRST LADY, NOT TO CROSS ITS PICKET LINES TO ATTEND THE TAPING. NABET REMOVED ITS PICKET LINES AT NBC'S WASHINGTON STUDIOS LAST SUNDAY WHEN DEMOCRATIC PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE MORRIS UDALL WAS INVITED TO APPEAR ON THE NETWORK'S 'MEET THE PRESS.'

THE NATIONAL LABOR RELATIONS BOARD, ACTING ON A COMPLAINT FILED BY THE PRODUCER OF THE SHOW AND BY CBS, WHICH LOANED THE THEATER TO NBC, SOUGHT IN COURT TO BAR PICKETING AT ALL THREE ENTRANCES TO THE THEATER. THEY CALLED THE PICKETING AN UNFAIR LABOR PRACTICE.

U.S. DISTRICT COURT JUDGE MORRIS LASKER DID NOT RULE ON THAT CONTENTION, SIGNING INSTEAD AN ORDER LIMITING PICKETING TO ONE ENTRANCE AND MAKING THE ORDER EFFECTIVE FOR 24 HOURS ONLY.
