## A PROCLAMATION

Of all of the eventful days to be celebrated during America's Bicentennial, none is more worthy of special observance than Veterans Day, October 27, 1975.

For had not the patriotic men and women, to whom we pay deserved and grateful tribute on Veterans Day, heard and answered freedom's call during the past 200 years, there would be no American Bicentennial of freedom.

From Concord in 1775 to Cambodia in 1975, these courageous, selfless patriots served and sacrificed and died so that their fellowcitizens could live under a government that is still in the full tide of successful experiment and is still the world's best hope.

Knowing it is both fitting and proper that a special day be set aside to honor our veterans,

I, Gerald R. Ford, President of the United States of America, do hereby invite and urge you, my fellow-Americans, to observe Monday, October 27, 1975, as Veterans Day.
