SOUTHERN GOVERNORS RECOMMENDATION ON FED SPENDING

Yesterday the Southern Governors Conference passed a resolution supporting a constitutional amendment to impose a limit on Federal spending to a certain percentage of the gross national product, except in times of war or national emergency.

How would the President feel about such a constitutional amendment?_____

ANSWER: As you know, the President has been waging a long and intensive camapgin against the growth of Federal spending, and feels that his budgetary plan will provide a balanced budget by FY 1979. While we haven't yet seen a copy of the Southern Governors resolution, it appearns that the resolution is based on the same philosophy asthe President's program, and that is good news.

MEETING WITH THE APPALACHIAN REGIONAL COMMISSION GOVERNORS IN KNOXVILLE

Following the White House Conference in Knoxville tomorrow, the President will join the Appalachian Regional Commission meeting already in progress. As you know, this is a regularly scheduled meeting of the Commission.

The Appalachian Regional Commission consists of all of West Virginia and parts of twelve other states straddling the Appalachian Mountains. Other states, in addition to West Virginia are: New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Maryland, Virginia, Kentucky, North Carolina, Tennessee, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, and Mississippi.

Governors expected to attend tomorrow's meeting include: Blanton (Tennessee), Busbee (Georgia), Carroll (Kentucky), Holshouser (North Carolina), Moore (West Virginia), Rhodes (Ohio) and Waller (Mississippi).

Those Governors who have prior commitments and will not attend the Commission meeting include: Carey (New York), Edwards (South Carolina), Godwin (Virginia), and Shapp (Pennsylvania).

It is my understanding that Governors Mandel and Wallace have not yet made their intentions known.

> FYI: Governors Holshouser (NC), Moore (WV), and Rhodes (OH) are Republicans. All of the others are Democrats.
