Response to Governor Shapp on Federal Funds

Attached is Roy Ash's response to televised remarks (Today Show) by Governor Shapp alleging that Pennsylvania's share of Federal funds has suffered since the advent of revenue sharing. With it are memoranda which resulted in the Ash reply.

Note that approval includes a recommendation that you release the response, or the substance thereof.

I suggest that alternatives be considered. You would get bogged down in figures if presented at a daily briefing before a generally disinterested press. More mileage could be achieved by passing the story along separately to a couple of the Washington bureaus of Pennsylvania papers or the regional wires. This could be done by the White House press office or OMB Public Affairs

Dear Governor Shapp:

In a recent interview on the Today Show, you expressed the opinion that Pennsylvania has suffered because Federal categorical grants were cut after the enactment of General Revenue Sharing.

The record does not support this assertion, as the enclosed table shows. Total Federal grants to Pennsylvania rose from \$1,621 million in 1972 to \$2,358 million in 1973, and an estimated \$2,470 million in 1974. These figures represent annual increases of 17 percent for 1971-72, 45 percent for 1972-73, and 4.7 percent for 1973-74. Though the increase for 1973-74 may not have met expectations, continued increases in the range of the 1971-73 increases would be unreasonable. The percentage increases for Pennsylvania in 1973-74 is, nonetheless, still higher than the percentage increase for total Federal aid to all states.

If we subtract Pennsylvania's 1973 and 1974 General Revenue Sharing payments of \$347 million and \$318 million from the State's total Federal aid, it received \$2,011 million and \$2,152 million in those two years. Under this assumption, annual increases for Federal aid to Pennsylvania were 17 percent for 1971-72, 24 percent for 1972-73, and 7.1 percent for 1973-74.

These figures, however, are somewhat distorted by unusually high payments in 1973 and 1974 for Federal disaster relief as a result of the storm Agnes. Thus, the relevant base is Federal aid to Pennsylvania net of both General Revenue Sharing and Federal disaster relief.

Subtracting both General Revenue Sharing and Federal disaster relief gives Pennsylvania \$1,621 million in 1972, \$1,813 million in 1973, and an estimated \$2,045 million in 1974. If these figures represent the programs you were discussing, they increased 17 percent in 1971-72, 12 percent in 1972-73, and an estimated 13 percent in 1973-74.

I am respectfully aware of your concern as Governor of one of our most populous and diversified states, and I trust this summary will clarify Pennsylvania's situation with regard to the distribution of Federal funds.
