





A graduate of Medill School of Journalism at Northwestern University in 1951 with a master of science degree, Perry has worked as a city editor and political writer for the Tampa (Fla.) <u>Times</u>, editorial writer and political writer for the St. Petersburg (Fla.) <u>Times</u>, assistant state news editor and general-assignment reporter for the Tampa (Fla.) <u>Tribune</u> and reporter for the Buffalo (N.Y.) Evening News.

Perry is a former secretary-treasurer and academic fellow of the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions, Santa Barbara, California, and assistant to the president of the National Association of Broadcasters. He joined the Council's Washington office in August, 1974, as senior communications associate.
