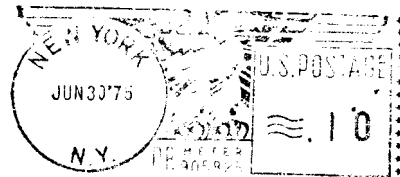

Dear Sir:

I have just listened to David Brinkley's remarks concerning Ron Nessin's outburst of anger at questioning by the media.



Mr. Brinkley defended the media's incessant questioning by alluding to ten years of evasive news releases by White House press secretaries. He suggested that Mr. Nessin and future press secretaries, might do well to take swims in the White House pool until they are experienced enough to deal with the press.

If Mr. Brinkley is truly interested in assuring that the public has full access to the facts, he should review some of the opinionated reporting that he has presented over the years.

With reference to his suggestion to Mr. Nessin to take a swim in the pool, I believe that this paraphrasing of the childish remark, "go jump in the lake," can only compound the communication gap between the White House and the media. 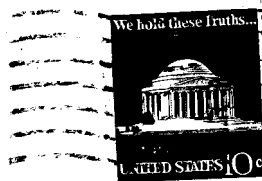

Johnson or the Kennedys!

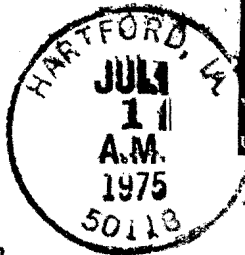

My best to you and your family and keep the good news coming from 1600.

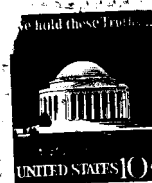
