

Ronald H. Nessen has been Press Secretary to the President since September 20, 1974. Mr. Nessen joined the staff of UPI in Washington in 1956, working there until 1962, when he joined the National Broadcasting Company.

His first NBC assignment was in Washington, where he served from 1962 to 1965 as a White House correspondent during the term of Pres. Johnson. He was assigned to Southeast Asia by NBC in 1965 and covered Vietnam until he was wounded by a grenade fragment in 1966. He returned to Washington and later that year was assigned to New York, where he anchored a weekly Vietnam television report and a five minute daily Vietnam report on the "Today" show.

In 1967, Mr. Nessen received a series of foreign assignments from NBC. He returned to the U.S., where he covered the Presidential campaign of 1968. After that, he was based in Washington, specializing in urban affairs. When Gerald Ford became Vice President, Mr. Nessen was assigned to cover most of the 118,000 miles traveled by the Vice President. When President Ford took office in August, 1974, Mr. Nessen became NBC's White House correspondent.

World Press Institute 15th Anniversary

The World Press Institute was founded 15 years ago on the belief that the best way to understand this complex nation is to experience it in person. Head-quartered at Macalester College, the WPI is a private, non-profit, educational organization sponsored by American corporations and foundations.

Each year, the Institute selects 12 outstanding young journalists, from as many countries, to spend eight months studying first-hand America's history, present realities and future aspirations. Since the program began, more than 190 journalists from 65 countries have returned to their homelands to report on all levels of American life with deeper understanding.

Internships and extensive travel introduce the journalists to the complexities of American society, and give them the opportunity to develop close personal and professional relationships with their WPI colleagues. Though the program changes each year, a basic framework has developed which provides a variety of experiences within the widest spectrum possible.

American Seminars

Macalester College and the Twin Cities of Minneapolis/St. Paul serve as a social laboratory while the journalists engage in interviews and discussions to gain a basic working background on important issues.

Grass Roots Internship

Each journalist lives with a host family in a small Midwestern town and works for a newspaper or broadcast station to learn about life in America's heartland.

Southern To

A five-week, 14-state tour by car through the South where the Fellows encounter many aspects of this section of the country — from poor cotton farmers to the technical marvels of NASA.

Western Tour

A plane and car journey through the West to hear ethnic groups, politicians and entertainers explain their views of the country.

Major Media Internship

A chance for the journalists to work with the people who shape and report the news at major newspapers and television networks.

Independent Travel

Each journalist sets out alone for three weeks to investigate the aspect of American life which arouses his or her particular interest.

Washington Seminars

An opportunity to meet and interview people who make the decisions that affect the entire country, as well as a one-week stint observing in the office of a U.S. Congressman.

Assignment U.S.A.

Each journalist writes an article or series, on a specific area of American life, to be published or broadcast in his or her homeland.

Eastern Tour

Tours of large American cities to observe life in our urban centers, and meetings with leaders in business, politics, education and the mass media.

The WPI Fellows spend the final week of the program participating in year-end activities, which include presentations by the Pulitzer Prize winners in journalism of that year, and an awards dinner marking the completion of the Fellows' experience with the WPI.

1975~76 Fellows

Since the first group of WPI Fellows came to the United States in 1961, 191 young professional journalists from 65 countries have participated in the program. Now in its 15th year, the Institute is proud to introduce the 1975-76 WPI Fellows.



Algeria Djamal Zidi

Djamal Zidi, 24, is the first WPI Fellow from Algeria. He has been a reporter, writer and commentator for the English Service of Radio and Television Algerienne since

1973. Zidi graduated from the Algerian Institute for Interpretors in 1972. While in school, he reported on the Pan-African Art and Music Festival in Algiers. He recently covered several international conferences including the Algiers OPEC summit and the OAU in Uganda. He has traveled extensively in England and France.



Argentina Julio Torre

Julio Torre, 28 is chief editor of the economic section of Argentina's most important newspaper, *Clarin*. Before joining the newspaper in 1970, he studied agriculture

and economics at the University of Bahia Blanca. Torre has traveled to several South American countries to do special reports on agricultural and economic development. He also has a strong interest in political news.



Brazil Selma Santa Cruz

Selma Santa Cruz, 24, is one of the first women reporters for Brazil's most important newspaper, O Estado de S. Paulo. In her second year at the University of Sao Paulo,

where she majored in journalism, she began her professional career working part-time for a small newspaper. After receiving her B.A., Ms. Santa Cruz was a translator on the foreign desk of *O Estado*, and her outstanding work led to appointment as general assignment reporter. She has covered major stories from international conferences to high-rise fires in Sao Paulo. In 1974, she spent a year in Paris, where she wrote regularly for *O Estado* and worked toward her M.A. degree.



Chile Javier Beytia

Javier Beytia, 30, received his B.A. with highest honors in 1967 from the University of Chile School of Journalism. He went on to post-graduate work in advertising communi-

cations at the State Technical University in Santiago. Beytia, who has worked as a national reporter on the news magazine Seven Days as well as El Mercurio and La Estrella newspapers, teaches communications at the University of Chile. He has traveled extensively throughout Latin America as a freelance reporter.



Denmark Karin-Lis Svarre

Karin-Lis Svarre, 29, graduated from the Danish School of Journalism in 1971. She has received certificates from Edinburgh University, Scotland, and Copenhagen University,

where she studied philosophy and law. Her journalism career began in 1969 at the Sjaellands Tidende in Slagelse, Denmark. From there she moved to Copenhagen as education reporter for Kristeligt Dagblad. In 1974, Ms. Svarre became education reporter for Denmark's most influential newspaper, Politiken. She is co-author of a book on women in politics, and has covered a variety of subjects from investigating the Danish world of pornography to learning survival in snow covered Norwegian mountains.



West Germany Margrit Gerste

Margrit Gerste, 31, has been a reporter, writer and commentator for Norddeutscher Rundfunk (North German Radio) for three years. She has her M.A. in sociology from the

University in Konstanz. Her master's thesis on the difficulty of job placement for sociologists in Germany was published as a contribution to a book. Ms. Gerste became acquainted with journalism in 1964 while working as a secretary at the newspaper *Die Ziet* where she continues to contribute freelance articles.



India Emmanuel D'Silva

Emmanuel D'Silva, 25, is a reporter at the *Free Press Journal*, an influential English language daily in Bombay. He is secretary of the Bombay Union of journalists and a committee

member of the Press Club. An investigative reporter, D'Silva has written probing articles dealing with land use, real estate, the public school system and smuggling. In July 1975, he was the first Indian journalist to visit Portugal since diplomatic relations between Delhi and Lisbon were severed 14 years ago.



Japan Hiroki Chiba

Hiroki Chiba, 34, is a political reporter of regional affairs for the largest broadcasting outlet in Northern Japan, the Tohoko Broadcasting Company, Sendai. He has received na-

tional attention with his in-depth analysis of local issues. In 1971, Chiba's reports on a public housing project scandal led to the resignation of a provincial governor. Recently, he produced a nationally televised documentary dealing with the plight of disabled children facing death.



Pakistan Razia Bondrey

Razia Bondrey, 32, has M.A. degrees in English and journalism. She received the highest award in her class for her outstanding performance while working on her journalism de-

gree. In 1967, Ms. Bondrey worked for the *Illustrated Weekly* of Pakistan. She is now assistant editor of the monthly magazine, *The Herald*. She has covered assignments from local features to political interviews and has written a television review for several years.



Poland Franciszek Nietz

Franciszek Nietz, 31, is the first WPI Fellow from Poland. He received his M.A. in journalism from Warsaw University and later joined the Press Agency as a junior reporter.

In 1974, Nietz became secretary and deputy manager on the foreign desk of Warsaw's most important newspaper, *Zycie Warszawy*. He has traveled to Iran, Finland and Sweden on special assignments.



South Africa Enoch Duma

Enoch Duma, 35, is news editor and columnist for the black edition of South Africa's largest newspaper, the Sunday Times in Johannesburg. He earned a diploma in psycholo-

gy from Adams College and attended Sastri College in Natal. In 1961, he joined the Post Newspapers as a writer and columnist. Duma was responsible for uncovering a con-man posing as a minister who swindled an entire community.



Zambia Albert Myula

Albert Mvula, 34, is the first WPI Fellow from Zambia. He holds a degree in English from the University of Rhodesia and Nyasaland, and has been a reporter since 1962 when he

joined the staff of the African Daily News in Salisbury. Mvula has since moved to the Zambia Daily Mail as features editor. Articles written by him in 1973 spurred the government to aid rural people dying of hunger in the border area between Zambia and Rhodesia. In 1973, Mvula visited the People's Republic of China.
