Dear Ferd:

While I am sorry that I was unable to attend the breakfast with you in San Diego on April 3, Margita White tells me that the morning, and in fact the whole conference, went smoothly and was beneficial to all concerned. Overall, I feel that it was perhaps the best such conference we have had, even though some attention was understandably diverted from domestic issues.

Since the overriding concern at the conference was the increasingly troublesome situation in Vietnam, I felt it might be helpful to follow up the President's San Diego appearance and his State of the World address with a copy of the speech he made to the Daughters of the American Revolution on April 15, and a transcript of the President's televised conversation Monday night, April 21, with representatives of CBS. Despite the situation in South Vietnam, President Ford has cited his optimism for better world relations based upon a reassessment of the United States international role, and in the enclosed texts he addresses both his immediate and long-term concerns.

In addition to the foreign policy information, I have included materials to follow up the energy session of the San Diego conference. From all reports, I gather that Frank Zarb and Mike Duval did an excellent job describing the latest developments and responding to questions of interest to the Pacific Coast. I feel, however, that the background, the nature of the energy problem and its future implications, bears repeating so that the American people can be better informed about the national debate.

The speech Administrator Zarb gave before the Town Hall in Los Angeles presents a very good overview of the problem, and makes some points that need to be reiterated. The central issue, of course, is that the absence of an oil embargo does not mean the resolution of an energy crisis, a crisis that will continue to trouble us until we once again become energy self-sufficient.

While cleaning up my files, I discovered I had buried a memo from the Lee Elder Golf Tournament which I had intended to give you just as the Mayaguez incident developed.

After playing in that tournament, you may remember, Flip Wilson announced that he had made a bet with the President on the 18th hole -- that he would hold a fund raiser for the President if the President won the hole, and that the President would appear on one of Flip's TV specials if the President lost the hole. Well, the President won, and Flip so told the crowd.

But, in the helicopter on the way back, the President said that he wanted to do a 5 minute-or-so TV appearance with Flip, if Flip came to Washington to do one of his specials if it could be arranged.

I've told Rustand's office about it, but thought you ought to know as well. Rustand's office suggested since there has been no approach from Flip, we wait until Flip does a show here, which he is supposed to do, and put forth a proposition to the President at that time.
