THE WHITE HOUSE

The President today announced his intention to nominate five persons to be Members of the National Council on Educational Research for terms of three years expiring on June 11, 1977. They are:

Larry A. Karlson, of Spokane, Washington; Instructor in the Human Services Program, Spokane Falls Community College, Spokane, Washington. He succeeds James S. Coleman, whose term has expired.

Arthur M. Lee, of Flagstaff, Arizona; Head of the American Enterprise Program for Northern Arizona University. He succeeds Vincent J. McCoola, whose term has expired.

James Gardner March, of Stanford, California; Professor of Higher Education and Political Science in the School of Education of Stanford University. He succeeds Vera Martinez, whose term has expired.

Carl H. Pforzheimer, Jr., of Purchase, New York; Senior Partner of Carl Pforzheimer and Company. This is a reappointment.

Wilson C. Riles, of Sacramento, California; Superintendent of Public Instruction for the State of California. This is a reappointment.

The National Council on Educational Research was established by the Education Amendments of 1972 (Public Law 92-318), which also established the National Institute of Education in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The purpose of the Council is to establish policies for the Institute and advise the Assistant Secretary for Education and the Director of the NIE on development of the Institute's programs. The Council is to report annually to the President and the Congress.
