Four ambassadors will present diplomatic credentials to the President today.

DR. FRANCIS MADING DENG
Ambassador of the Democratic Republic of the Sudan

Dr. Deng, 36, studied law at Khartoum, London University and Yale Law School. From 1967 to 1972 he served in the United Nations in the field of human rights. During that time he participated in a number of international conferences and also lectured in law at New York, Yale and Columbia Universities. Most recently he has been Ambassador to Sweden. Dr. Deng has written several articles and books on African law and society.

ROBERTO CAPRILES
Ambassador of the Republic of Bolivia

Ambassador Capriles, 54, studied civil engineering in Bolivia and Chile. In the early 1950's he worked in private industry in New York, but the bulk of his career has been spent as a senior administrator of various Bolivian Government enterprises. Most recently he served as Minister of Coordination and, prior to that, as Minister of Energy and Hydrocarbons.

DR. HORACIO VICIOSO SOTO
Ambassador of the Dominican Republic

Ambassador Vicioso, 59, is a career diplomat with extensive service in the United States. Beginning his career as Second Secretary in Washington in 1941, he served also as Minister in Washington, and was Chief of the American Division in the Secretariat of Foreign Affairs, and most recently headed the Juridical Affairs Division of the Secretariat of Foreign Affairs.

JOSE CORSINO CARDENAS
Ambassador of the Republic of Ecuador

Ambassador Cardenas, 59, is a economist who has a long career as an educator and public servant. He did post-graduate work in economics at the University of Michigan (1948-1950) and holds an M. A. in Public Administration from Harvard (1951). He has lived for many years in Washington, D. C., as an officer and his country's representative at the Inter-American Development Bank
