## POOL REPORT # 4

Picnic at Kirchgoens, Germany July 27, 1975

The President arrived at 2:20 pm and spent 1 hour 30 minutes at the picnic site. He was greeted by the Brigade Commander, Colonel Louis C. Wagner, and by General Alexander Haig and Mrs. Haig, who was given an enthusiastic kiss by the President.

The President was wearing a blue windbreaker with the Presidential seal on the left breast.

The pool estimates approximately 4,000 to 5,000 people at the picnic, which was held on the brigade parade field and was reminiscent of a country fair, or carnival atmosphere.

As the President made his way through the crowd, the scene was hectic as the servicemen and their families pressed in to shout a greeting or shake his hand. The President eventually worked his way to a small tent where a number of families were eating a meal. Then he made his way to a volleyball game and watched for several minutes. The gameson that court and an adjoining court were held up from time to time because of all the spectators and press following the President.

Then the President and his party made their way to a larger tent which served primarily as a beer garden. The President spent several minutes inside shaking hands and occasionally sipping from a beer. He then walked across the width of the parade field to a line of military vehicles on display. He climbed aboarda M-60 American tank, chatted with the crew, and leaned over the turret to get a look inside. He also asked several questions about the characteristics of the tank. One of the poolers saw a trooper hand the President another beer, which he sipped from time to time.

Then the President walked a few yards to a platform, where he made his remarks which generally followed the advance text, and were translated into German as he went along. There was a huge roar when he gave the brigade tomorrow off under his powers as Commander-in-Chief.

When he completed his remarks, he made his way about 200 yards to the waiting helicopter and shook a few more hands before leaving.
